After I advised him of that he continued to look throughthem page per page. After they ran a police check on us, they finally released us.

We then continued to register people at the complex, but they refused to open their doors to us after what they had abserved between us and the police.

After conversing with our member organizations and our fellow werkers here in National City, I have been instructed to convey the following information for the consideration of Mr. Tom Hayden.

Because of the community recall mandated here in National City, we are involved in a "do or die" situation. Right now we are involved in a campaign to recall the Mayor of National City and 2 City Council members, and we are also running 3 candidates for the election scheduled for March 2, 1976.

The Ad Hoc Committee, in attempting to reach its objectives, has involved approximately 200 workers since October 1975 from throughout the San Diego area. Between 45-60 deputy registars have registered 900-1000 new voters in National City. An office with 3 telephones has been established in National City to coordinate our communications with the 1800 residents who signed our recall petitions. To be successful in our recall effort and with our candidates we estimate that 800-1000 new voters must be registered.

To accomplish all this, the voter registration and the campaign for the March 2 election, we will need to raise at least \$5500.

Informed him that we were registering people for el Partido de La Raza Unida and that he could become a registrar if he wanted to help his "people". It was at that time that he filled out the application. This matter was brought to the attention of the District Attorney and the general public at a press conference and most recently to the attention of San Diego Police Chief Bill Kolender. Nothing as far as I know has ever been done about this matter. It is our understanding that this agent is presently working as a community relation officer. N.Y. STATE ASSEMBLY REJECTS BILL PENALIZING EMPLOYERS OF "ILLEGAL ALIENS"

CARTER FAVORS AMNESTY FOR UNDOCUMENTED ALIENS BUT SUPPORTS PENALTY ON EMPLOYERS

Responding to broad opposition, N.Y. State Assembly leaders did not submit to the Assembly for a vote the Field-Knorr Bill, which would penalize employers who knowingly employ persons lacking Immigration Service authorization to work. Unless acted upon when the Legislature reconvenes on July 29 for a few days, the bill is dead for this session.

The penalty issue remains a continuing one, and a demonstration against the bill was held on July 1 outside Gov. Hugh Carey's N.Y. City office. Some 75 demonstrators marched through mid-Manhattan and then picketed the Daily News office, protesting its misstatements and biased presentations regarding overstayed nonresidents. A leaflet distributed by the American Committee pointed out that "the problem is national and should by solved by Congress granting amnesty to 'illegals,' like Canada and Argentina have done."

Coincident with the Assembly rejection, Presidential candidate Carter informed a group of Hispanic leaders (June 30, Houston, Texas) that "first, you have to recognize the permanent residents who came in here originally illegally and not try to root them out." He said he then would set a cutoff date and "put the responsibility on the employer not to hire anyone who has come into this nation illegally."

Commenting on these two developments, Dr. Paul Lehmann, Chairman of the American Committee for Protection of Foreign Born, declared:

"Non-passage of the Field-Knorr Bill in New York is an important rebuff to the forces seeking to make Latin American noncitizens the scapegoat for unemployment and other social problems. The fight against the penalty provision on employers and for amnesty for overstayed or undocumented nonresidents will continue. Hopefully, Governor Carter's support (if he is nominated and elected) will tip the Congressional balance on the side of amnesty. We commend him for his forthright commitment.

"As regards a penalty provision on employers of persons not authorized to work, we believe the proposal is not sound. (See itemization of reasons in attached leaflet.) In the New York City area, where many out-of-status nonresidents from Latin America (other than Mexico) and the Caribbean reside, the problem is essentially a past one because since September 1973 a Social Security law amendment bars the issuance of social security cards to persons not authorized to work. In the other key area, the Southwest, a complex of profound economic factors on both sides of the long border with Mexico impel a continuing influx. Problems arising from this regional influx are solvable only by dealing with their causes, and not with their effects -- as, for instance, via an employer penalty bill.

"The Ford Administration has continued the policies of Nixon, who in January 1971 was the first to sponsor in Congress a penalty provision on employers and employees. Immigration Service harassment of Latin-looking persons by dragnet raids on streets and other public places -- have been condemned by the Supreme Court and other Courts. We are encouraged to believe that Gov. Carter -- in the tradition of Jefferson, Lincoln and Franklin D. Roosevelt -- will treat the foreign born fairly. Their interests and those of the native born are inseparable."

Dear Brother Baca:

The San Diego Port Authority, operator of San Diego International Airport, has awarded the Custodial Contract to a non-union maintenance company.

The non-union maintenance company has unilaterally granted a 10¢ per hour increase over last year wages, but in lieu of health and welfare, pension, sick leave, vacation, and holidays the company is paying these benefits in cash. With all the "in cash" payments to the best of our knowledge, some employees are now receiving from \$3.82 to a maximum of \$3.99 per hour. If under the union contract and the same wage scale was in effect as that company is paying and the employees were paid in cash for benefits their wages would be \$4.56.

This is a tipical example of exploitation of the poor and minority worker. The Port Authority claims they must accept the lowest "responsible" bid and it is our opinion this is not a responsible bid. Please do not become confuse by the \$4.56 figure as this is a comparison to the contractor now performing the work. Under the union contract the workers would be receiving a salary in excess of \$4.00 per hour.

I respectfully request that your Federation support the minority workers by sending a large group from the Federation (in the area of 300 members) to a demonstration at the Airport on Friday, August 6, 1976, at 3:00 P.M. Thank you for your assistance.

Dear Mr. Taylor:

We have received the preliminary study entitled "A Study of the Impact of Illegal Aliens on the County of San Diego on Specific Socio-Economic Areas" (November 1975).

We have further examined some of the recommendations contained in that report including the concept of county agencies and local public and private agencies initiating recording systems to document and account for services rendered to illegal aliens.

We urge the county not to attempt to have county or local agencies perform this police function inasmuch as they are not trained to make such federal Immigration and Naturalization police determinations.

Not only is the problem of identifying the deportable alien not one within the ken of the county, but attempting to condition social services on such criteria can only cause severe social and legal problems.

We enclose the preliminary injunction issued against Wilson Riles, Superintendent of Schools et. als. in the Maria de Lourdes case enjoining the attempt to prescribe procedures and adopt rules, etc., using information falling within the federal Family Education Rights and Privacy Act.

We enclose further the legal opinion by our counsel, Raoul Marquis, indicating that among other issues, the fact that such a recording system inherently violates these individual constitutional rights.

Hopefully the county will consider the foregoing before formulating or augmenting policies that would create new problems for the entire Mexican-American population.

OPEN LETTER FROM FRED HALSTEAD OF THE SOCIALIST WORKERS PARTY TO RODOLFO "CORKY" GONZALES

Denver, Colorado October 2, 1976

Dear Corky Gonzales,

Around 2:30 p.m. on October 1, Steve Chainey, the Denver Socialist Workers Party organizer, and I went to the head-quarters of the Crusade for Justice in Denver. We had been requested to do so by the national offices of the Socialist Workers Party and the Young Socialist Alliance.

The purpose of our visit was threefold: to offer any assistance we could in the Crusade for Justice suit against government police agencies; to invite you to speak on your suit at a coming public rally in Denver; and to speak to you about a threat of physical violence made by a member of the Crusade for Justice against a member of the YSA.

We had been told that Ernesto Vigil, a leader of the Crusade, made a physical threat against Elfego Baca, the chairperson of the Metro State College MEChA who is also a member of the YSA. It is common knowledge that there are disagreements between members of the Crusade and the leadership of the Metro MEChA. In itself, there is nothing unusual about disagreement, but we are concerned about rising tensions and the threat of physical violence.

We intended to ask you to join us in discouraging violence over disagreements in the movement.

When we entered the Crusade headquarters we were told you were not there but that we could speak to Maria Serna. When we told her of our concern about the threat, she said we should speak to Ernesto Vigil. She sent for him.

Vigil entered the office accompanied by another man whose name I do not know. When I told Vigil about my concern, he did not deny having threatened Elfego Baca. He simply said it was none of my business. Throughout the conversation both Steve Chainey and I were calm and used a friendly tone. At no time did we threaten violence, or make any movements that could have been interpreted as threatening.

Vigil ordered us to leave the building. As we left the office on our way out of the building, I paused to say that

if Elfego Baca was harmed we would be obliged to make public the previous threats.

Vigil's response was to punch me repeatedly in the face while the other man punched Steve Chainey. Neither Chainey nor I made any attempt to strike back, we simply attempted to leave the building. Nevertheless, they continued punching. By the time we were able to get out of the building both of us were bleeding profusely. Chainey had a blocdy nose and a cut lip. My nose was broken and I had cuts on my face that required several stitches.

As we were walking away from the building, people outside expressed concern about the blood on our faces and asked what had happened. I heard someone shout from behind me, "That's what you get for threatening people's lives." This was an obvious attempt to justify a completely unprovoked assault.

We made no physical threats while we were in the building and we make none now.

We are completely opposed to the idea that violence can be used to resolve any dispute among those fighting for the oppressed. Such violence simply provides an opening for the police and police agents to divide us and turn us against ourselves. FBI documents that have come out over the last year or so show that one of the first tactics they use is to try to get movement groups fighting among themselves.

If you allow physical intimidation to become a trademark of the Crusade, it will be a grave disservice to all those fighting for a better world.

I strongly urge you to take all the necessary steps to see that this kind of violence is not repeated.

I await your response with great concern.

DECLARATION AGAINST VIOLENCE IN THE MOVEMENT

Disturbing reports of the use of physical violence by members of the Crusade for Justice have come to our attention. This underlines the urgent need for decisive action to deescalate tensions in the movement and to insure that physical intimidation does not interfere with the free exchange of political views.

Recent public revelations about the FBI have shown that fomenting violent conflicts within the movement is one of the government's favorite disruptive tactics. This is all the more reason for us to work to bring such incidents to an end.

We hope you will take a stand in favor of the simple democratic right to express a point of view without fear of physical reprisal from anyone, including those who may disagree within the movement. Taking such a stand certainly does not mean repudiating the right of self-defense against violent attacks. It means making clear that differences among those fighting for social justice cannot be resolved by fists or other weapons. Any attempt to do so simply provides openings for police and other enemies of the movement to tear us apart.

Further, it certainly does not help us oppose the government's use of violence against us if some of us use it against people who may not agree with our point of view.

The forces opposing progressive social change in the United States are very powerful. The unity necessary to overcome these forces can only be achieved if we respect each other's democratic rights.

Although none of you afforded me the common courtesy or respect to mail or deliver your statement to me personally, I feel an answer to you is important, if for nothing else, to correct your assumptions and your preconceived charges.

You are individually and collectively using the very methods (distortion, innuendo, character assassination, and yellow journalism) that are universally abhorred and rejected by all free thinking and progressive people. By your presumptuous chest pounding and self-righteousness you are joining hands with those biased and reactionary forces who are no doubt pleased by your attempts to create divisionism, factionalism, disunity and confusion within the Chicano Movement.

Your pre-conceived convictions smack of the authoritarian courts of law that lack the vital elements of objectivity and justice. You pompously have become judge, jury and prosecutor based on misinformation, ignorance, spite, guilt, or provocation.

It has been the philosophy of the CRUSADE FOR JUSTICE to educate, politicize, organize and unify the Chicano people in the struggle for total liberation. We have taken a positive and active stand against unjust wars; violence used against our people and all peoples, in the communities, the fields, the factories, institutions, schools, prisons, the courts; against hard drugs, and disruptive leaderships.

We have taken a progressive and positive stand against the inequities, the racism, and paternalism of this society and doing so, we have been murdered, jailed, penalized, and ostracized, all in the name of law and order, justice and society.

We have been and will continue to be in the midst if not in the forefront of the Chicano movement despite those self-proclaimed critics, whose past involvement is questionable, if not negative.

There are those dissidents who disagree with us because of their lack of confidence in themselves and our people, who disagree with our commitment to independence and our dedication to develop our own leadership, our own economic, social and political destiny. Our analysis of these disagreements is that they are based on our dedication to discipline, principles and high standards of conduct which readily reject the use of hard drugs, hypocrisy, dis-

loyalty and political degenerates who would use the movement for their own perversions and monetary gains.

We have consistently remained independent of alien and questionable political groups who pound their chests about the actions of others, who speak about the issues that confront our people but who never take an action to solve the problems.

I take the time to answer your declaration because I feel there may be some Chicanos among you who have made an honest mistake and are truly concerned with the progress of our people.

We have treated all people and all those who take part in the struggle for justice with respect. We have never meddled or falsely charged other individuals or groups without having facts and proof of our charges. We would expect the same from anyone else.

Attempts of provocation to create war between factions has been attempted if not by the F.B.I., C.I.A. and Police enforcement groups but also by many who claim they resented progressive or radical groups.

We have not yet been destroyed by the colonial forces because we are vigilant, we are determined, we are organized and we will not be fooled by provocateurs by any name, front or organization.

Therefore, the CRUSADE FOR JUSTICE will answer only to those who have created and sustained us....OUR OWN PEOPLE.

Our concern is with our people in particular, oppressed people of the world in general.

Those who would follow the missionary leadership of questionable groups insult the intelligence and integrity of their own people's ability and intellect to develop and create our own leadership and social and political institutions.

We consider the movimiento Chicano, a familia and a nation, and we alone shall determine our future.

Those people who signed the "Declaration against violence in the movement," must honestly search themselves and evaluate if their statement created unity or disunity, trust or distrust, clarity or confusion.

The colonized are never freed by the sympathy of the colonizer, only by the action of the people.

History will prove that we are correct in our process and the proper investigation and research will show that our opinions are right about these who offer us their leadership but not their responsibility.

Concerned Fellow Activists:

We have this day received a copy of an open letter from Fred Halstead to Rodolfo Corky Gonzales being distributed and circulated by members of the Socialist Workers Party and their youth affiliate, the Young Socialist Alliance. Several aspects of the content of that letter, the letter itself, and who it is addressed to are particularly disturbing and contradictory. Particularly disturbing is its opportunistic appeal for support from naive, uninformed, misinformed, or trusting supporters who have endorsed the letter. Because of this, we feel it is imperative not that we respond to the letter, but that we project the inconsistencies in its message, to provide a broader picture from which the source and motive behind the letter can be viewed from a different perspective, as well as to challenge some of the lies and distortions leading up to and resulting in what is now clearly a time, energy, and resource consuming, SWP-provoked conflict.

To begin with, it is the Socialist Workers Party, through Steve Chainey and Fred Halstead, that chose to build a conflict out of a Chicano community situation that involved two individuals—not two Movement organizations, as has been suggested in SWP propaganda—one of these individuals being a member of the Crusade for Justice and the other individual being a member of the Y.S.A.

I offer herein a short history of the events that culminated in the incident of October 1, not because we feel that the history warrants public judgment, but because it provides information which fits between the lines and challenges the lies of SWP propaganda. As Secretary of the Denver Chicano Liberation Defense Committee, as well as a person present when Fred Halstead and Steve Chainey came to the Crusade for Justice Building, I share the following pertinent information with you:

On September 18, 1976, Ernesto Vigil was arrested following his speaking at the Chicano Liberation Day Rally held here in Denver. He was arrested for investigation of aggravated assault and menacing—for which he spent four days in jail before a \$10,000 bond to release him was raised. Initially, we all construed his arrest as another police effort to harass him because of his Chicano Movement activism. However, the charges alleged that Ernesto had been party to an assault at La Raza Park on August 5th. He was being charged along with Tony Marquez (who turned himself in and was also bonded on September 22nd), who on that day as La Raza Park Manager had confronted a drug pusher about trafficking drugs in the barrio park. The drug pusher made threats on Tony's life and a fight resulted in which the pusher was not the victor. Two people were in the vicinity of that fight, Ernesto Vigil (a summer park employee) and Elfego (Eric) Baca, who was in the company of the pusher. What led to the pusher's pressing legal assault charges against Tony as a result of a street fight in

which he got beat are speculative—that he did it to retaliate against the Park's position against drugs or to beat a rap with the law in exchange for charges against a Movement activist. But let us look at what led to Ernesto Vigil's being charged:

The pusher's statement to the police claims that his friend Elfego told him he didn't jump in to help him because Ernesto Vigil was "holding a gun" -- in other words, Elfego gave his friend a phony excuse and because of it Ernesto ended up charged based on false information. When learning of this, Ernesto did confront Elfego about it-not because Elfego is a YSA member nor because Elfego is the Chairman of Metro State MECHA, or because Ernesto is a Crusade member, but because Elfego's lies resulted in Ernesto's arrest, jailing, and facing trumped-up charges. Elfego was approached about straightening out his lies in court, and Elfego pleaded that he didn't want to get involved in the trial--presumably because to do so would go against his pusher friend's claim--Ernesto reminded him he got himself involved by lying to his friend in the first place. This conversation (not political debate) took place between two individuals -- Ernesto did not beat up Elfego, Ernesto did not go to the Crusade for Justice organization to take a position against Elfego, and we presume that when Elfego lied, he was not representing a position encouraged either by the SWP or YSA; we now hesitantly presume also that Elfego's not wanting to testify in support of a Movement activist charged falsely was not representative of a position espoused by the SWP either.

When Fred Halstead and Steve Chainey came to the Crusade to see Corky Gonzales, they did so without an appointment. Corky was not in, and his secretary referred them to me. Upon entering the legal defense office, Mr. Halstead indicated there were two items of business they came to discuss and that he didn't know if I was the person he should bring them out to. I told him what my position was with the organization as Secretary of the Defense Committee and suggested he use his discretion. He commenced by charging that Ernesto Vigil had conversed with Elfego Baca the previous week and threatened him with physical violence unless he testified in court and that they (Chainey and Halstead) were in accord with Elfego's not wanting to become involved. At this point, I told them that since they were making such charges against Ernesto, he should be present to hear what they had to say. I went for Ernesto myself, I did not send for him.

Because Ernesto had a class in session, it took him longer to come to the office where I had returned. While waiting for Ernesto, Mr. Halstead let me know the other item they were there to discuss was the law suit the organization is pursuing against the government, at which time Steve Chainey "calmly" remarked, unless you feel Ernesto has to be here to discuss that too". I dismissed his remark and exchanged a few words with Fred on the suit before Ernesto came into the office. Again Fred Halstead restated his opening remarks to me. Ernesto informed him that he failed to see how any conversation held between him and Elfego Baca was any of the Socialist Workers Party or their business. It is true, Ernesto did not deny threatening Elfego, he did not admit threatening Elfego either. Fred told Ernesto that Elfego was a member of the YSA and "we protect and support our own just as you do". Ernesto again told him that he could not see

how the SWP could take a position on the matter simply because Elfego is a YSA member and had gone to them with a personal concern between Elfego and himself, not the SWP and the Crusade for Justice. Mr. Halstead then remarked that he wanted to make it clear they had come to express their support for Elfego and would "protect Elfego by any means necessary". Ernesto told them they were not aware of all the circumstances regarding their conversation (about which he refused to go into at the time because it was none of their business) and that they were making a big mistake by taking a position involving the SWP and themselves in something that had nothing to do with the fact that Elfego is or is not a Y.S.A. member. Fred and Steve continued to reiterate that Elfego came to them for support and that they were taking a supportive position for Elfego. Ernesto told them it was their prerogative to do so, even if they were exercising poor judgment and being that such was their position they should leave. As Steve and Fred left the office they turned to leave a lasting impression by making intimidating threats. It is true a physical confrontation resulted and that both Steve Chainey and Fred Halstead were ousted from the Crusade premises -- again not because they are members of the SWP, again not because of political differences, but because they were intolerably insultive, pompous, and obtrusive in their conduct

Considering the above information, can you rationalize the various open letters being addressed to Rodolfo Corky Gonzales? Can you rationalize why a personal conflict between Ernesto and Elfego has been propagandized as resulting from "political differences"? Can you rationalize why the SWP is espousing unity while conducting a gross local and nationwide divisionary campaign? What political differences exist between Crusade for Justice members and Metro State MECHA leadership? What political differences are Crusade for Justice members supposedly "violently" seeking solutions to? What and who is really responsible for the personal business between two individuals escalating to organizational friction? Is Elfego Baca an agent provocateur, a puppet in an SWP anti-Crusade campaign, a drug traffic sympathizer, or just a very disturbed person using his position with MECHA and the SWP to vent out his personal animosities against members of the Crusade for Justice? -- any of which are not justifiable motivations for a supposedly "progressive" organization's representative.

The SWP professes to know how the police systems work to destro; Movement groups and divide Movement efforts; if they do, why do they then allow themselves to become party to such tactics by instigating disunity with their anti-Crusade propaganda? We have had too much experience with establishment opponents not to see the similarity in patterns, and we urge you to be as analytical.

To date, Ernesto Vigil's charges have been dropped, but Tony Marquez will be going to court on November 4th, and our Defense Committee's efforts to continue building progressive organizations' and community support for victimized Chicano activists carry onward...

AN OPEN LETTER TO RODOLFO "CORKY" GONZALES FROM FRED HALSTEAD AND ELFEGO BACA

To:

Rodolfo "Corky" Gonzales Crusade for Justice 1567 Downing Denver, Colorado 80218

In early October, a "Declaration Against Violence in the Movement" addressed to you as a leader of the Crusade for Justice began to be circulated among movement and community activists.

The Declaration was necessitated by some distressing events. First, physical threats were made by a member of the Crusade, Ernesto Vigil, against Elfego Baca, Chairman of the Metro State College MEChA and a member of the Young Socialist Alliance.

When two members of the Socialist Workers Party went to the headquarters of the Crusade to discuss the matter with you, they were assaulted and beaten.

A reply by you to the Declaration Against Violence dated October 8 has now been made available to a number of persons who signed the Declaration.

A companion letter regarding these incidents by Maria Serna, a prominent member of the Crusade, is also being circulated.

We had hoped that your responses would somehow reassure concerned persons that the Crusade would disassociate itself from the use of physical intimidation.

Unfortunately, the letters by you and Maria Serna did not relieve our concern.

In neither letter is there any attempt to deny that Elfego Baca is under threat of violence. Nor is there any attempt to deny that Fred Halstead and Steve Chainey were the victims of an unprovoked assault at the Crusade's head-quarters.

Instead, both letters seem to try to justify what happened. Maria Serna justifies the threat by Ernesto Vigil against Elgego Baca as a "personal" matter involving two persons in the Chicano community, and she says that the SWP should not be concerned.

In the first place, we must make it clear that even a personal matter would not justify the use of physical vio-

lence to settle differences. In the second place, we do not accept the implication that a physical threat against a member of the socialist movement is none of our business simply because that member is a Chicano who is involved in activities in the Chicano movement. These methods should not be used against anyone.

Maria Serna also brings up another disturbing point. She reports a beating by Crusade members against yet another person. In this case an attempt is made to justify this by calling the person a "drug pusher." There exists not one shread of evidence to back up such an outrageous and irresponsible charge.

What assurances do others who may express a difference of opinion with members of the Crusade have that they too will not be falsely labeled a "pusher" and "agent provocateur," a "puppet," a "drug traffic sympathizer," or a "disturbed person," and then be set upon physically?

We urge you once again to clarify the position of the Crusade regarding these incidents. We urge you to take all necessary steps to assure that this violence is not repeated and to join us and others in redoubling our common efforts against government repression.

We strongly protest the press statement (see attached article) made by your office regarding Green Card holding Mexican Nationals registering to vote for the November 2, election. Your public statement "with out evidence" announcing that an investigation will take place in conjunction with the Immigration and Naturalization Service has raised the following serious concerns in the Chicano Community;

- 1. under the "smoke screen" of looking for aliens your proposed investigation will make every person of Mexican Ancestry who has registered to vote in California suspect for an investigation for simply exercising their legal and constitutional right to vote.
- 2. Your announcement to investigate a class of people rather than individuals as proscribed by law establishes a "dangerous precedent" and is in our opinion illegal and unconstitutional.
- 3. Announced procedures that investigators might match computerized list provided by County Registrar of Voters with INS files or investigators might simply run their fingers down the voter polls until they hit on a likely suspect, preferably on possessing a spanish sur-name is not onlyracist, but raises many legal questions such as the protection afforded under the Privacy Act and constitutional questions regarding Due Process and Equal protection under the United States Constitution.

It is incomprehensible to us why your office should make such public announcements with out any evidence unless your office is playing politics.

Please rest assure that your efforts to involve your office along with the Immigration and Naturalization Service in the political arena and your efforts to disfranchize our peoples right to vote will not go unchallenged and will not be forgotten by those who you intend to persecute.

Dear Mr. Ambassador,

In response to your request at our October 15, 1976, meeting, we are detailing those points we wish to discuss at the proposed November 1976 meeting between Mexican Representatives, including President Echeverria, and Chicanos. We are also detailing, as requested, the upcoming Georgetown Uniersity Immigration Policy Conference and our request to have Chicano law students intern at the Centro de Estudios Sociales y Economicos del Tercer Mundo.

Meeting with President Echeverria and other Mexican Representatives

We are requesting this meeting on behalf of the Southwest Immigration Task Force, chaired by Ms. Lupe Anguiano; Centro de Inmigracion, Georgetown University; and, La Raza Law Students Association, Georgetown University Law Center. Participants from the Southwest Immigration Task Force will include Lupe Anguiano, Leonel Castillo (Controller, city of Houston), Richard Avena (Director, Southwest Regional Office of the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights), and Bishop Patricio Flores of San Antonio. Representing Centro de Inmigracion and La Raza Law Students will be Jose Medina and Isaias Torres. We would like to request that the Mexican Representatives include economic and emigration experts and labor representatives.

The most desired format would include sessions over a two or three day span. Participants can first meet to develop a detailed dialogue in working sessions. A meeting with President Echeverria to then finalize the discussion is suggested. The Chicano delegation will cover its own expenses, therefore necessitating no finanacing by the Mexican government.

The meeting has a high potential for allowing us to develop possible mutually benefitial solutions to immigration issues that affect both Mexico and the Chicano community in the United States.

We view several areas of mutual concern to Mexican and Chicanos

as imperative topics of discussion. These include the economic issues causing undocumented immigration, organizing workers on both sides of the border, proposed implimentation of Bracerotype programs, and the effect that the Eilberg Immigration Amendment will have on Mexico.

Recognizing that U.S. economic policies have a direct impact on undocumented immigration, a need exists to fully discuss how all participants can work to address this issue. The input of Mexican economists will be of great value in this area because they possess expertise of the Mexican economy. Participation by labor union people will enhance the discussions, particularly when addressing the issue of international organization of migrant workers. Undocumented workers are not only exploited because of their technical vulnerability, but they are also exploited by being used against U.S. workers, primarily Chicanos. Joint projects to organize workers prior to their entry will help aliviate both problems by strengthening the bargaining power of undocumented workers and preventing their use by employers to counteract Chicano worker organizing.

Discussion of proposed legislation to reintroduce Bracerotype programs will help clarify what positions Chicanos should pursue and how this can be implemented. We are also interested in a discussion of the full impact that the Eilberg Amendment will have on immigration from Mexico.

The discussions as a whole will serve to clarify positions that Chicanos can pursue in relation to the 95th Congress of the United States with regard to immigration. From the discussions we can develop a strategy to address the major issues and legislation proposed by the U.S. Congress. The meeting can also serve the purpose of allowing discussion of three specific projects of significant importance. These are the proposed U.S. Commission on Civil Rights study of civil rights abuses against undocumented workers, the Georgetown University Immigration Policy Conference scheduled for March 1977, and the possibility of having Chicano law students study at the Centro de Estudios Sociales y Economicos del Tercer Mundo. Members of the Chicano delegation to the proposed November 1976 meeting are actively involved and have a direct interest and input into each of the above topics.

1977 Georgetown University Immigration Policy Conference

The purpose of the conference will be to bring together people who can influence significant changes in U.S. immigration laws and policies. Participants (including Mexican Representatives, Chicanos and U.S. officials) will present papers on specific issues directly affecting the intent and thrust of immigration policy. These papers will be discussed, and the composite work of the conference will be used as the base from which to hold a series of smaller regional conferences. The end result will be well-defined proposals through which major changes can be implimented in immigration law and policy.

The topics for discussion will be divided into two major areas: Mexican immigration issues and General immigration issues. As the division indicates, the first section deals with issues that have a principal effect on Mexico. However, Mexican input and reflection is of critical importance to the second section.

Under the topic of Mexican immigration issues, the conference will focus on the concept of "Special Relationship." Recently, the State Department and the Department of Justice have reversed a long held policy that any legislation, such as the Eilberg Amendment, which applies per country numerical limitations on the Western Hemisphere, should exempt Mexico and Canada because of their special relationship to the United States. This is no longer their position and this panel would address the merits of abandoning such a concept. Another panel will discuss the extent to which U.S. control of capital in Mexico economically displaces persons. This discussion will focus on the extent that multi-national corporate investment and U.S. foreign policy are responsible for economic displacement of Mexican workers and subsequently responsible for the migration to the United States. This panel will attempt to answer the question: can the effect that multi-national corporations have on Third World countries be overcome through Congressional control and regulation of those activities?

The topic on general immigration will focus on the question of Hemispheric levels, the validity of the U.S. government position that undocumented workers are a drain on resources, and whether or not passage of legislation that could result in discrimination against Third World groups in the United States is warranted to curtail any perceived adverse economic affect of undocumented workers. of the 120,000 ceiling for the Western Hemisphere countries is of major importance since no demographic studies exist to justify it, and this figure is, in large part, used to substantiate not allowing Mexico or Canada a higher quota.

A more detailed description of the conference will be made available to you as the topics and participants are more fully defined.

Participation of Chicano Law Students at the Centro in Mexico

We are also initiating a dialogue of the possiblity of having Chicano law students intern at the Centro de Estudio Sociales y Economicos del Tercer Mundo during the summer months. Students participating in such a program would be selected from those that have worked with the Centro de Inmigracion of Georgetown University. The Centro in Mexico will benefit from their participation by receiving and utilizing knowledge of U.S. immigration law and policy. The Centro de Inmigracion will benefit by utilizing the experience and knowledge of Third World affairs. The program has the potential of great mutual benefit and we would like to further explore the possiblity of developing it.



Gov't wants to know how illegals live

Illegal aliens in the South Bay may soon find nitizen researchers knocking on their doors asking questions about how they live in this country.

IIf San Diego County is included — and it almost certainly will be — it will be part of a \$750,000 comprehensive survey of illegal alient' impact on the country's 12 most populous states announced thistweek by the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS).

HTHE PROPOSAL has drawn mixed reactions from county Chicano spokesman. National City's Herman Baca, president of the Ad Hoc Committee On. Chicano Rights, called the survey "totally improper," citing the constitutional question—bility of asking illegal aliens to incriminate themselves by answering questions.

But a North County Chicano spokesman said the survey could prove useful as long as it wasn't used to harass people of foreign ancestry. However, he sidded doubts that many people residing in the munty illegally would volunteer information. Besides, "many are living in ditches, in caves or in the fields," he said.

The INS has contracted with a Washington,

D,C., research firm to conduct the two-phase survey beginning in February.

MADE POSSIBLE by a \$1 million congressional appropriation for alien impact studies, the survey is an attempt to gather accurate estimates of the illegal alien population and to assess their contributions and drains to the economy.

Previous statistics — admittedly INS "guesstimates" — put the county alien population at 90,000 and between 6-8 million nationwide.

The survey, INS officials hope, may also help the agency's image.

The INS, a spokesman said, is often accused of using inflated figures. But both officials and researchers agree the survey will be no easy task.

The survey is planned in two phases, with about 100,000 households in 12 states to be checked. First, researchers will pick cities in the survey states: California, New York, Pennsylvania, Texas, Illinois, Ohio, Michigan, New Jersey, Florida, Massachussetts, Indiana and North Carolina.

PHASE ONE will involve random surveys in all

areas of each city to test the widely-held belief that illegal aliens tend to live in areas already occupied by their ethnic group.

In phase two, researchers will concentrate on neighborhoods that show a high number of illegal aliens.

The research firm, J.A. Reyes Associates, hopes to recruit community residents and organization who speak the language of the aliens to conduct the questioning.

Questions will include how long the aliens have lived in the country, how they entered, job status, number in the family and whether they send their children to public school, pay taxes and receive social services.

The data will be considered not just for impact on social services, but on housing, public transportation, road use, development of ghettos and other social effects.

Both the INS and the research firm said none of the survey's raw data — names, addresses, occupations — will be made available to the INS.

Spokesmen added the survey will include a variety of alien populations, including Mexican, Polish, Irish and Asian.

- (3) refer this information to community members and other members of the community whom you feel should be informed of this survey.
- (4) send letters to President elect Jimmy Carter and your Congressman requesting immediate cessation of the Immigration and Naturalization Service J. A. REYES & ASSOCIATES survey.
- (5) initiate legal action when ever necessary.

The Immigration and Naturalization Service has announced a door to door survey under the cover of determining how many so called "Illigal Aliens" reside in the United States.

The Survey will be conducted in the following states: CALIFORNIA, TEXAS, NEW YORK, NEW JERSEY, ILLINOIS, OHIO, PENNSYLVANIA, MICHIGAN, FLORIDA, MASSACHUSETTES, INDIANA, and NORTH CAROLINA and will affect the following communities; MEXICAN, CANADIAN, ITALIAN, PILIPINO, JAMACIAN, COLUMBIAN, IRISH and DUTCH.

According to the Immigration and Naturalization Service proposal, J. A. REYES & ASSOCIATES has been contracted to conduct the interviews with the aid of local organizations in their respective communities. These include church related agencies such as the Catholic Migration Service, Poverty and Model Cities Programs such as One Stop Immigration, community based organizations and womens groups.

OUR POSITION

.....is admantly opposed to the Immigration and Naturalization Service door to door survey for the following reasons:

- (1) The survey is in our opinion a misappropriation of public funds by Congress and a rip-off of the taxpayers monies by a self serving vested interest beauracracy(the Immigration and Naturalization Service) which is attempting to justify and inlarge its law enforcement budget.
- (2) The survey will not accomplish the objective of identifying the number of so called "Illegal Aliens" and there impact on social services. Experts in the field of Immigration have stated this and have raised serious questions about the survey's reliability, appropriateness and validity due to its unscientific methodology.

We have had an opportunity to look at the brief filed by the attorney general's office in the case of Varela v. Swoap. We were shocked that such a brief could be filed in your behalf. It's clear rascist terminology and thrust are a slap in the face to our entire community.

It is my understanding from talking with people from around the State who met with you on November 18, 1976, that you too were disturbed by the brief. We feel very strongly that the contents of the brief will make it very difficul to get a fair hearing from Judge Perluss who got very negative publicity after his last ruling in this case (including a death threat as we understand it).

We therefore feel that it would be important for you or Steve Ybarra to write a letter to the judge indicating your concern with the characterizations in the brief. It is clear that the entire class of people being represented are not so-called "illegal aliens". The obvious fears that Judge Perluss is going to have can only be remedied by a communication from either yourself or Steve. We would appreciate you doing this to set the record straight and would like to get a copy of whatever you forward to the judge if possible.

Re: Supervisor Position and Eilberg Law

Dear Greg:

On July 6, 1976, we wrote to you joining with many other community groups in calling for the appointment of Peter Schey as the Supervisor of the southeast office of Legal Aid. While we got your form response telling about how it would be "unfair" to appoint Peter because of your fiscal problems we have heard nothing since. The fiscal problems you mentioned seem to support the idea of having a present employee take over the position so that mony can be available to hire additional in-coming attorneys and para-legals. Our contact with the southeast office shows an urgent need for leadership and we are at a real loss to understand why an obviously capable person supported by the community has not been appointed. We have learned that Peter is now being given a senior position so that he will be more available to work on community problems. This brings us to the quesion of the Eilberg Law.

The Eilberg bill just signed by President Ford will result in mass deportations during the next couple of months. Thousands of other people will only have until Dec. 31, 1976, to file their immigration papers or they will not be able to immigrate. THIS PRESENTS A CRISIS IN OUR COMMUNITY. After talking with Peter, Ralph, Sam and others we understand that much work must be done in the next few months. We therefore support the immediate hiring of Tim Barker to do the immigration work for your program. Tim has been working in this area with us and the other groups for over two years. He has trained in your program for 2 years and we believe that should not go to waste. In a recent meeting Peter strongly put forward your position that a Chicano was wanted to do the immigration work. It is our position

that since this work will mainly service the Chicano community anyway, it is not vital for us to have a Chicano attorney but rather that we have an experienced person. If you are truly committed to hire a Chicano attorney, then we will benefit by you hiring the Chicano attorney in another area so that we won't just get immigration services from your office. We don;t think that affirmative action should involve long time searches for minority specialists and administrators so the program looks good. In the meantime many qualified minorities even coming out of the local law schools are not being recruited.

Given the objective reality with which we have to work (Eilberg Bill) we urge the immediate hiring of Tim Barker to take over the immigration work in your southeast office. If you disagree with our recommendation we would be happy to meet with you.

It is with great disgust and disappointment that we read in the Star-News that you are considering National City Councilman Louis Camacho for appointment to the California Democratic Central Committee.

We of the Mexican-American community cannot imagine a more undesirable or unsuitable candidate than Mr. Camacho. Mr. Camacho lacks credibility, support and approval and has shown that he is totally unfit to be representative of the Mexican-American community. His complete lack of understanding of the social, economic and political problems of the Mexican-American people can best be demonstrated by his own words as quoted by the Evening Tribune on March 23, 1976, "I can understand that people were emotionally upset over the Rivera shooting, (young man who was killed by a National City policeman.) so was I. Those people (over 2,000 citizens asking redress) who came before us at the Council won't vote for me anyway. These people call themselves Chicanos. I am an American first, I just happen to be born with Mexican ancestry and I am proud of it. If they love Mexico so much, why the hell don't they go back?"

The San Diego Yellow Cab Co. employs approximently 600 people. Of that 600, 25% are minorities. Of that 25%, 10% are chicano, 10% are black, and 5% are asian.

The Transportation and Land Use Committee, consisting of Leon Williams, Chairman, Jess Haro, Floyd Morrow, and Mr. Gade, have recommended a policy change of Taxi Cab certificates. This change would increase the number of cabs on the street from 380 to 523. The increase would mean chaos to the cab industry. It would decrease the driver's income which is just above the poverty level.

In the past seven years there has been six bankruptcies in the cab industry due to lack of business. The
present policy has a formula which allows certificates to
be issued on a one per 3,000 increase in population. The
policy has worked quite well for the past several years.
There is a prospective buyer, Armour Oil Co. interested in
buying Yellow Cab under the present policy. The buyer will
not risk an investment under the new policy change recommended by the Transportation and Land Use Committee.

The Committee, by standing firm on their recommendation has caused the prospective buyer to withdraw its offer to purchase the Yellow Cab Co., thus leaving 600 people with out a job. People with 5-25 years seniority, who have accumulated many fringe benefits such as Health and Welfare, Dental and Eyecare for their families, as well as themselves along with Pension Plans, and paid vacation etc. Some of these people are in an older age bracket where jobs are hard to find.

The situation requires the help of everybody concerned with the injustice being done to the cab drivers and dispatchers who are property owners, tax payers, and constituents of the councilmen on the committee. The Committee holds the fate of the Yellow Cab Co. employees in their hands. They must be made aware of the loss of jobs, and also the needs of the people who have depended on the Yellow Cab service in the past. The minority element is not the only issue here, but also the people in the community it effects. The prospective buyer is still willing to purchase the Yellow Cab Co. if the City Council turns down the policy change recommended and retains the present policy.

We ask your support in whatever way possible to contact the Councilmen involved, not to gamble with our lives, and to restore our jobs.

Dear Mr. Camarillo:

I have received and read your letter concerning the appointment of Councilman Louis Camacho to the Democratic State Central Committee. The letter did not arrive in my office until after my appointments had been decided upon, and the appointees notified. I do not feel that it would be appropriate for me to retract the appointment of Mr. Camacho. I do, however, wish to respond to the concerns you have expressed.

I have known Councilman Camacho for several years, in his capacity as an elected official in National City, and as the South Bay's representative on the Metropolitan Transit Development Board. I believe he has served with ability in these positions. I am aware of the fact that many Chicano activists have been critical of Mr. Camacho, particularly in relation to the Rivera tragedy. But virtually all public office holders, including myself, are subjected to criticism. If I appointed only those persons to whom no one would object, I doubt that I could fill up my State Committee slate.

I did not appoint Mr. Camacho because of his ethnic background. I do not consider him, or any other of my appointees, to be my "emissaries" to the Chicano community. I, myself, represent the people of the 40th district, and I expect that

my constituents will be communicating their concerns directly to me, as you have done. I have spoken to Mr. Camacho, and I have expressed my hope that it will be possible for him to resolve the differences which now exist. But there is little else I can do to promote agreement on this matter.

I wish to make a final comment concerning the future. I am always anxious to support qualified constituents of mine, for appointment to important state positions. I will be delighted to consider your recommendations. I hope that you will not hesitate in the future to communicate your views to me, beforehand, so that I may have the benefit of your advice.
