Hy dear ur. Herinor:
Confleming our verbel conversation when in Los Angeles yesterday, will bay that day before yesterday I was in San Franolsco discussing with the Murray Estate an equitable adjuetment in the matter of a demand note of the Morse Construction Company, amounting to $13,680,00$. bearing date of Deoember 3e, 1916, on which $\$ 6,000$ had been paid Augrist 13,1920 , Leaving a balance of 47680,00 . prinolpal and interest.

This note is now held by the kmeray Satate for colleotioh. At the time that note mas executed. I owned one half the stock of the Morse Construction Company and I am a half awner today. The worse Constriction Company has agreed to pay and the alminiatrator has agreed to accept $\$ 3,000$ in full settloment for this note, as a matter of justice and equity. providing the inheritance department will aoquiesee in this settlement. This is an equitable settlement, and in order to lay the matter fally before you and your department. the foliowing data will no doubt be of interest.

4 man named Kolly, ovaing 3,000 or 4,000 sores of land betweon Pine Hills and Cayamaoa Lake, woll timbered with pine and oak, was planning to sell this timfered land to a sam mill ontilt, theraby dostroying one of our most beantifal sections in San Diego County. I am vory much interested both in Pine Hilla and Cuyamaca. and it seemed to me a orime to out this timber. I aid not have the finarices to acquire this timber, and I oalled Tir. Lurray's attention to the necessaty of preserving that timber to proteot our watershed area ciaioh Mr. Lurray and I owned at that time - the Cuyamaca Syatem which byitem we own today. I wrged Hr. Harray to buy It all, und he refused, but said he vould take a part interest if I could get others to buy as well. I went to los Angeles, sal my

Priend O. A. Canfleld, also the F. \& W. Thum Company of pasadena: Each of them gave me a oheok for $\$ 10,000$, the understanding belng that I was to divide this land into threo equal pasts, or one third to each party, including ur. Kurray, and that a road was to be built thru the property at an oarly date and eaoh party was to pay for the oonstruotion of same thru his land. Both by telegram and lotter I notifled uir. Murray what the agreement was before I asked him to up his money, and at the time I vired him for the money I mentioned it as a condition.

He paid my draft without a kiok. Later he oame down and traveled with horse and myselflover the roads that - had been built thra the Canfield and Thum properties, and he instruoted as verbally to 80 ahead and build the road thra his property connecting up Cayamaca Lake with Pine Hills. We did not get an agreement from him in writing at the time, but we were building roads for him in different places without anything in writing. ge had built the roads both thru the Canfield and Thum properties at actual oost plus 10 percent for overhead, and we built several other roads for Mr. Hurray on that same basis, the Morse Construction Company being in the road construotion bueinese.

When the road vas completed Ur. Hurray went over it with us, approved it, went to my aister and asked for a statement, and that was furnished him - a comple te statement of the payroll and total cost. Our profit mas only $\$ 500$ or $\$ 600$, the rest of it being cash-outlay on our part for labor, material, otc. The total amount of the bill was $\$ 5824,17$. As I was oving hr. Uurray considerable money and was borrowing a good deal from him to carry my end in the Cuyamaca Water Company, the matter went on for some time, Mr. Marray never having made any proteat, but not paying the bill.

In the meantime the Norse Conotruotion Company had borrowed considerable money from Mr. Murray to buy mules, equipmont, eto., and when the time oame that we did ask him to pay this bill, he resues. The truth is the old man mast have forgotton, and boing al ons in yoars I laid it to that, however, Kr. Himray has never insisted upon the Horse Construction Oompany paying the balance due tim on the note; and I have always felt that he nover intended to insist upon colleotion, for the grading bill more than offset it, is me had been paid interest on the or iginal cost

- ol grading.

The fagts are we built over three miles of mountalin road for less than $\$ 6,000$. He pald out the hard oash to build a road thru his land, the only road todey thet exlsts We did it on his verbal authority, but, unfortumtely Loree is dead and wurray is dead 8180.

Kr. Morse and I had been Irienda for twenty odd yeare He was Iriendiy to me as a boy, and in retwrn Whon he asice me to go in with him in the oontraoting game, I did 80. started in a small way and had made 20,000 or 830,000 in Jeary of hard work, altho I had Inanced all of the projecta and had never dram any balayy. The time cama when Imv Horae took contraots in East San Dlego amounting, to $120,0000 r$ $\$ 130,000$, grading oity streets. He dropped every dollax had ever made, and when Mr. Morse died there was nowhere: near onough assets to pay off the liabilities. The Horse Construction Company has no assets today whatever. Ehave never fepudiated an honest debt in my life and ame if forded to, in a position to pay this obligation. All the other obilgations the worse Construction Company is paying, out justice and equity demanas an equitable adjuetment on this note.

Wrs. Hurray is familiar with this mattor, and both she and the exeoutor. Mr. W. S. K. Brown. have agreed to thif settlement of $\$ 3,000$, providing the inheritanco tax is base on the $\$ 5,000$ valuation 01 , interest.
