On August 10, 1973 my husband and I agreed to chaperone a birthday party for my cousins daughter in the area of Leucadia, because of a recent outbriak of fights between the residents of two predominently chicano communities in the San Digueto area. The party was held at my cousins house, and was attended by aproximatly three to five hundred persons.

The party went smoothly without major incedent (a few minor) scuffles), until aproximatly 10:30 P.M. when two sheriffs deputies responded to a call of a disturbance that took place two houses down the street; of the party. It is apparent the deputies found no disturbance at the initial address. Then for some reason proceeded to the party, contacted my cousin and warned her about curfew and excessive

noise. All this occurred without incidence. It is alledged that as the deputies exited the residence they were bombarded by debris of all sorts (bottles, rocks etc.), that was thrown not from the yard in which the party was in progress, but from a yardaidyacent to that area as a result aproximatly ten to twelve backup units were immediatly called to the scene of the incident at aproximatly 11:00 P.M. three to four warnings were given by the band to The people attending concerning the amassed force of police officers outside of the residence. at apropimatly 11:30 P.M. without prior warning of ainy kind the combined force of wherit officers moved in on the party. What ensued cannot be better put than by what my little nine year ald son, who was there because of a lack of baby sitters, said, Mama I've never seen so much

I only wish my life.

I only wish my leyes could have seen everything that allegedly happened. a few of the instances of abuse on individuals at the party consist of the following:

1. The owner of the house protested to the sheriffs handling of the situation and was promotly thrown to the ground, and was blaten about the body by two peace Officers. 2. Noth of the owners daughters were taken in on charges of resisting arrist, and assualt and battery. on a police officer because of their insistance on following their mother to the squad can to assure that she wasn't beaten any further. 3. The band members and numerous others were viciously attacked by various peace officers, and were brothen with billy club, flashlights, and also kecked about the head and body.

4. I recall specifically one instance involving one boy been beat brutally about the head and body by about your to five peace officers simultaneously. 5. Probably the worst of all the alleged attacks That were perpetrated on those attending the party was the behavior of othe police officer who when obstructed by the youngest 6 year old daughter of the owner (my cousin) reacted by backhanding her in a violent and timeto unecessary manner. 6. The bands equipment was maliciously knocked to the ground and thrown about and practically distroyed destroyed or damaged V very badly

One certain policeman whom I was told later was Baumer; started hitting my husband on the head with his flashlight and when my sister-in-law and I tried to stop him , she got hit in the stomach with the nightstick. D The innocent people at the party were hurt for no reason at all as for as I could see B) sure their was some radicals but they were outside the property. In the property all the people were arrowing themselves by dearing & listening to the music.

On behalf of myself, I support the rest of the bandmenbers on their complaint for police brutality for no accounted reason.

Dear Mr. Duffy:

I noted in the Wednesday, September 19, 1973, of the Oceanside Blade-Tribune, that you were quoted as saying "If he [Deputy Borchers] did not have an absolutely clean record I would have fired him for this offense." The offense being for the use of "unnecessary force and falsifying a report" stemming from a Mexican-American party in August in Leucadia.

I would question whether or not Deputy Borchers has at this time absolutely a clean record, and if he does have such a record whether or not he should have such a record.

Is your office aware that Deputy Borchers was accused of assault and battery against a permanent resident, a Mexican National, Mr. Daniel Magana on or about March 7, 1973; this event occurred in Vista and Deputy Borchers was one of a number of individuals who participated.

I would also ask if your office is aware that a claim has been filed against the County of San Diego in relation to this offense? It is of some importance to us and others to know if Deputy Borchers was acting in the line of duty on that particular night, or if your office is totally ignorant of his behavior at that time. In other words, he was not on duty and you do not know anything about what he was doing that night. Perhaps it would be inappropriate to put such a claim against the County.

If, on the other hand, Deputy Borchers was on duty and your office was aware of his actions that night, it would appear to me incorrect to state that he has an absolutely clean record. Regardless of the fact that our claim has not been finally processed and adjudicated, it remains a claim against the County against the actions of Mr. Borchers.



SUPPLEMENTAL REPORT

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DALLAS (UPI) vestigating officers said today fingerprints found at the scene of a burglarized service station do not match those of a 11-year-old boy shot to death by a police officer questioning the handcuffed lad about the burglary.

The boy, Santos Rodriguez, was shot to death as he sat handcuffed in the back seat of a patrol car Tuesday morning.

His brother, David Rodriguez, 13, who was sitting in the front seat of the car, said a police officer was playing a form of Russian roulette with Santos in an attempt to coerce information out of him.

The investigating officers said fingerprints from Santos and David do not match those at the scene of the burglarized gas station. The officers said they could find no other evidence to link the Rodriguez brothers with the burglary at the service station.

The older brother claimed after the officers arrested him and his brother at their home, they drove them back to the gas station where the police officer played Russian roulette with his .357 magnum pistol.

"He (the policeman) rolled the chamber around, and then he opened it and there were two or three bullets in it," David Rodriguez said.

"He snapped it closed and then rolled it again.

"Tell the truth,' the officer told Santos," the brother said yesterday. "He told him we did not burglarize the gas station.

"The gun clicked, but it didn't fire.

"The officer said, 'This time it has a bullet in it.'

'He clicked it, and it fired. "The bullet went through my brother's head and blew the other side of his face off.

"Oh, my God," David said he heard the officer yell. "Maybe he thought there wasn't a bullet in the gun."

The officer, D. L. Cain, 30, a five-year department veteran, claimed the incident was an accident, police said, but he was nevertheless stripped of his credentials, suspended indefinitely and charged with murder.

"There was no justification whatsoever on the part of the officer," said police chief Frank Dyson. "It's a black eye for us."

Cain was arraigned before Justice of the Peace Tom Naylor yesterday. Naylor released Cain on \$5,000 bond.

A spokesman for the police department said Cain and his partner, Roy Arnold, had gone to the Rodriguez boys' home Tuesday in search of information about a burglary at a service station. The boys were taken out of bed at about 2:40 a.m. and driven by the officers to the gasoline station and questioned. Then the shooting occurred, at about 3 a.m.














MIRA COSTA Oks Ethnic Employment

OCEANSIDE — An ethnic minority member will be hired as a counselor-teacher at MiraCosta College beginning in September.

The 4 to 1 vote came during a board discussion Tuesday of how to spread out the Oceanside-Carlsbad Community College District's thinning reserve funds and decreasing federal aid.

Board member Robert Prescott asked "Now that you've passed it, how're you going to pay for it?"

Prescott noted that the \$13,000-a-year position will be added to the college's budget in a period when the college may be forced to go into deficit spending.

College president Dr. John MacDonald predicted the college will be in deficit financing by 1974.

The college will lose federal support if the college does not balance its ethnic representation of personnel.

Federal Affirmative Action guidelines have identified an unequal ethnic balance at the college. This situation must be rectified if the college is to continue to receive federal aid.

To pay for the new teaching-counseling position, Prescott recommended dipping into the largest budget expenditure — teachers salaries at MiraCosta.

Eighty-five percent of the present budget goes for salaries, Prescot said. And this figure will go up by \$30,000 next year when raises go into effect, he said.

"Why not take the \$13,000 out of the \$30,000 in raises?" Prescott asked.

President MacDonald and board member Walter Stendahl objected to this proposal. Both men indicated that the college should follow through on its pledge to raise teachers' salaries next year.

Magana Charges

SAN DIEGO — District Attorney Ed Miller said today he had not had time to look w to charges by a Vista man that two Border Patrol agents harrassed him and damaged his home.

The charge was made by Daniel Magana, 42, 105 W. Connecticut, after an incident at his home in the early morning hours of March 7.

The Border Patrol has sent an investigator to look into Magana's charges and Assistant Commissioner Phillip Crawford in San Pedro said this morning that the patrol's investigation is still underway.

Miller said he wasn't sure if the complaint was being filed by Magana or by Herman Baca, county organizer for the Mexican-American Political Association, and would have to have more information before deciding on a course of action.

He said he hoped to have enough information for a decision within the next several days.

Magana's Attorney Files \$500,500 Damage Claim

SAN DIEGO - The attorney for Daniel Magana of Vista has filed a \$500,500 claim

agianst San Diego County.

The claim stems from an incident March 7 when Magana claims two Border Patrol agents entered his home at 105 West Connecticut, questioned him at length, and ransacked his home.

Two sheriff's Deputies were called into the incident by Magana, who doubted the two men who entered his home were Border Patrol agents. The agents were dressed in civilian clothes, and were off duty at the time of the incident, about 2 a.m.

The claim states the deputies illegally detained Magana, and he was "physically beaten and injured" by the two.

The claim asks \$250,000 for false imprisonment, \$250,000 for the assault claim, and \$500 in actual damages to Magana's home.

Frederick Hetter, Magana's attorney, says he plans a similar claim against the Border Patrol.

The Border Patrol investigated the incident, but has not released details of its

investigation. No charges have been filed against the Border Patrol officers or the Sheriff's deputies.

The Border Patrol agents, who have denied the charges through their union representative, claim they were investigating a private citizen's complaint that Magana was harboring illegal aliens.

Magana is a Mexican national legally

registered as a U.S. resident.

The U.S. Attorney General's office in San Diego is monitoring the investigation.

Sheriff Report On 'Invasion' Revealed

VISTA — An official of the Sheriff's Office disclosed today details of an incident involving two deputies, two off-duty Border Patrol agents and a Mexican citizen.

Daniel Magana, 42, 105 W. Connecticut, Vista, complained to the press last Saturday that he had been manhandled by deputies, interrogated by Border Patrolmen for over an hour, and that his two-room home was ransacked, books torm and food destroyed.

The Border Patrol, after finding that two of their agents had been involved in the 2 a.m. Wednesday incident, assigned Investigator Donald Young of San Pedro to look into the charge.

Otherwise, the Patrol has been silent, but the two agents designated their union representative, Tom Gaines, also an agent, to speak for them.

They denied the accusations, said they only appeared at Magana's residence to act as interpreters after telling an

unidentified citizen to call the Sheriff's office when he complained of illegal aliens at Magana's causing trouble. (The citizen never called the Sheriff, radio logs indicated.)

The two deputies, who were on routine patrol, said they were first contacted by Magana when he was fleeing from the home. Since they don't speak Spanish and Magana speaks little English, they could only return him to his address.

Capt. Kenneth Deering, officer in charge of the Vista substation, said the two deputies did not plan to file a report initially since no crime was involved and they did nothing but assist.

However, because of the publicity, they subsequently filed an "officer's report" on the circumstances and what they observed.

The deputies said when they arrived at Magana's residence, with the Mexican citizen in the rear seat, they could see a man inside the home.

One of the deputies said as he approached the house "one of the men first contacted (the Border Patrol agent) was going through a suitcase laying on the bed," Deering reported.

The deputy, who could see through the front door, "indicated... (the front room) didn't appear to be in any great disarray except for some clothes spread on the floor." However, Deering added, it wasn't clear whether they could see into the kitchen, where most of the damage allegedly occurred, or even looked into it.

Magana has charged that the agents caused substantial damage to his house between the time they first appeared and he fled and returned with the two deputies.

The agent did not indicate to the deputy why he was looking into the suitcase, which was open and laying on the bed, Deering said, but the agent "showed no alarm at the deputy being there."

After he learned that the man was a

Border Patrol agent who wanted to talk to Magana, the deputy returned to his patrol car and motioned for the Mexican citizen to come inside, Deering said.

Magana refused to enter the apartment and started to leave, Deering said, "and that was the time the physical contact with the deputies occurred."

The two Patrol agents then asked him in Spanish for his identification and the deputies removed the cuffs so Magana could retrieve his papers.

After he produced his legal immigrant papers, Deering said, the deputies asked the Patrol agents to inform him why they had restrained him, and they left the two agents and Magana together.

Deering said the deputies drove off and that was their last contact. Magana claims the two agents interrogated him for over an hour, but the two agents insist they left immediately after the deputies.

Sworn statements by the agents are to be given in San Pedro Friday to Young.

"They are absolutely, completely stunned at the whole thing," Gaines said after talking with the two agents for almost three hours Monday afternoon.

"We've gotten a lot of calls (at the Border Patrol office in San Onofre and the public thinks) because of the newspaper slant on this thing that we're a bunch of thugs up there, you know, we're a bunch of renegades."

Gaines said the two agents recounted the incident Wednesday morning this

They had both been off duty that day and during the evening, had gone to a club in the San Luis Rey Valley with some friends where they shot billards and possibly had a couple of beers.

They returned to Vista, where they both have homes, and were walking down the street about 2 a.m. when a citizen approached and reported "there was some illegal aliens causing a problem at an address, which was this guy's (Magana's) address."

After talking to the man to determine if he was telling the truth, they told him to call the Sheriff's Office and they would meet the deputies at the address to act solely as interpreters. Neither were armed, Gaines said.

When they arrived, Gaines said, the deputies had not shown up and they heard "some noises that were suspicious and they knocked on the door." One agent went to the rear door and Magana answered it, fully dressed with the lights on. The agent identified himself officially.

"It's going to be this agent's statement that this complainant (Magana) never did make any kind of a reply that he could understand, that is, just mumbling."

Both agents entered and Magana, after refusing to respond, bolted out the door and later flagged down a passing Sheriff's

When they returned, Gaines said, while attempting to make a determination as to his status, Magana ran again and the deputies forcibly restrained him and returned Magana to his residence.

Magana presented his papers proving his legal status and they questioned him for a few minutes to determine if there were others living in the residence and he admitted there were two, but he knew little about them, including their legal status or where they were.

"Then this guy turned around and started walking off," Gaines said. "One of our agents asked him, 'Where are you

going?' and they called him back in the presence of the Sheriff's deputies." Gaines said Magana reported he was just going for a walk, even though the house was open and the lights on.

"So that's exactly where it terminated," Gaines said. "This guy left, the Sheriffs left, our guys got back in their cars and both went home." Magana was not questioned over an hour, Gaines added, and both agents emphasized that they were at the home no more than a few minutes. Both vigorously denied doing anything to the home.

Gaines said he had no idea who, if anyone, caused the damage in the house.

But, he added, "If someone has fabricated a story, if someone has filed a false report, if someone has conspired to discredit the Border Patrol and our agents, then we are going to seek punitive action against them.

NFPC group condemns 'tortilla curtain' plans

A NATIONAL FEDERATION of Priests Councils (NFPC) convocation on Christian ministry to undocumented immigrants condemned the impending construction of the so-called "tortilla curtain" along three sections of the Mexican border.

The 100 participants from 30 dioceses, meeting here this month, asked that telegrams be sent to President Carter, Attorney General Griffin Bell and Secretary of State Cyrus Vance demanding that the \$3.5 million project be canceled.

The plan to build the fence came to light recently when the Texas manager of the firm awarded the contract said anyone trying to climb the 10-foot-high structure will leave his or her toes permanently embedded in it.

In other resolutions, the priests, religious and lay convocation participants asked:

- That each diocese establish an office to deal with the problems of undocumented aliens. Al Velarde, director of the Southwest regional office of the USCC's Migration and Refugee Service, said only 29 such offices exist now, 16 of them in the Southwest region.
- That Bishop Patricio Flores of El Paso be named to the newly created presidential commission to study future immigration policy.
- That Mexico be given favored nation status in trade with the U.S. so it can develop jobs which will keep more of its citizens at home.
- That immigration law be changed so refugees from rightist dictatorial regimes have an equal opportunity to enter this country as those from Communist dictatorships.

The border fence to which convocation participants objected was conceived under a previous administration of the U.S.

When the news broke that the fence would injure someone attempting to climb it, the current INS commissioner, Leonel Castillo, ordered a redesign. E. B. Duarte, who is in charge of INS outreach services and spoke at the El Paso meeting, said the project is on the back burner, but Jerry Coyle, INS deputy district director in El Paso, said the barrier will be built.

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The fence will be built in heavily populated sections between El Paso and Ciudad Juarez; in San Ysidro, Calif., across from Tijuana, and in the San Luis, Ariz., area. The three sections of fence will extend a total of 12 miles, with 6.5 miles dividing the El Paso and Ciudad Juarez, Mexico, urban area. Coyle said the 10-foot-high barrier will consist of three feet of concrete, four feet of steel strips and a top section of three feet of chain link fence.

The NFPC convocation's resolution demanded that the funds slated for the fence

be re-allocated for INS services such as the outreach program which seeks to legalize the status of various types of eligible aliens so they may become permanent residents or citizens.

The participants further resolved that — if the project is not canceled — any firms, including suppliers, who have anything to do with "tortilla curtain" construction should be targets of a national boycott. The resolution also said "manifestations of disapproval" should take place, especially at the construction sites.

The three-day meeting included talks on border economics, theological aspects of immigration, the Mexican perspective on the flow of undocumented immigrants and on services offered by INS, the U.S. Catholic Conference's (USCC) Migration and Refugee Service and other agencies.

Participants toured the site of the proposed El Paso "tortilla curtain," spoke with Mexican women along the Rio Grande who cross the border to work as maids in El Paso for \$25 a week, and visited a detention center for men apprehended by the border patrol.

At the detention center, convocation participants spoke with many of those apprehended. They heard stories of hardship suffered by individuals trying to find work to support families and of their terror — in some cases — associated with apprehension at the point of a gun. One had been picked up as far from the border as Omaha.

Speakers against the "tortilla curtain" described the barrier as a symbol of discord and of progressive militarization of the border. Fears were expressed that the fence would lead to a deterioration of friendly relations with Mexico. All said the barrier would be ineffective, even in stopping the so-called nuisance traffic of juveniles who cross from Ciudad Juarez to El Paso and sometimes are accused of petty crime.

The Ciudad Juarez-El Paso metropolis is the largest urban population on the border. El Paso has 400,000 inhabitants and Ciudad Juarez, 800,000. There are 80 million legal crossings of the border by U.S. and Mexican citizens each year.

Velarde said 17,000 Mexican citizens commute daily to El Paso to work. About 25,000 Mexican-Americans live in Ciudad Juarez and many of them also cross daily to work and shop. Velarde and others said the two cities are so interdependent that no Berlin-type wall can exist between them.

- 7. That the F.B.I. procedures be utilized as a model for all police-power agencies of the Federal government in execution of their police duties.

As you may well recognize, these are very limited and minimum objectives, however, they are required immediately in order that relief may be afforded our people, however, it is recognized that fundemental change is required before the situation is corrected or eliminated.

As you well may be aware a considerable body of administrative regulation affects the Mexican and the Mexican American (Chicano). Most of this administrative regulation has been the creation of agencies of the Treasury and Justice Departments. The sad story, however, is that their agencies have not, in many cases, observed their own regulations or the ordinary civil rights of citizens and alliens affected. I would conclude this letter by calling your attention that due process of law, under the 5th Amendment of our Constitution, is guaranteed not just to citizens and nationals of the United States but also resident aliens (Supreme Court decision of 1886). Due process, therefore, is our right and is not at the whim of the Customs bureau or the Immigration department, or the Border Patrol, to name a few.

Your continued interest in this matter is of vital concern to us all, and we shall look forward to concrete results from the Roybal hearings.
