Dear Dr. Szilard,

Please excuse my delay in writing you, as promised, but for the past several days I've been trying, in vain, to rearrange my schedule to allow me an extended stay in Washington. Unfortunately, I've not been able to make such arrangements. There is just no one available to step in and take over my various regular assignments here.

In addition, I find that now all the funds available to this office are "earmarked" for special projects already underway. By that I mean that our general fund, which usually allows us to cover the cost of interviews with outstanding men and women, is now depleted. We must work within fairly confined fields - such as higher education, art history, etc. - for which foundation grants have been specifically given to this office.

This seems to me a sad commentary on the state of historical research and an excellent example of how foundations directly affect departmental affairs. I don't know what the answer is to this problem but I shall continue to work on it until I come up with some solution.
