I wondered whether I could get together with you and such other persons, not too many, whom you think ought to be drawn into this enterprise. I had in mind that perhaps a local Denver Committee might be formed which would have the job to acquaint the State of Colorado of the progress of this enterprise when it is officially alunched.
