Dear Sir:

Murray and Fletcher on June 12th, made cash deposit of \$900.00 with the U.S. as security for the extension of concrete pipes on the El Capitan Indian Reservation due to a proposed change of right of way for a tunnel and cement lined ditch and pipe line on their flume line at Sand Creek.

The original request was made to Supt. T. M. Games in May 1913. In a letter dated June 3rd, (copy enclosed)Mr. Games estimated the costs of changes in Indian pipe lines at \$450.00, and that this constituted the damages. On June 2, Acting Commissioner Hauke approved request for permission to enter upon excavations on the right of way calling for a deposit in double the amount of damages estimated, or \$900.00. This deposit was made June 12th, 1913, to the credit of United States in the First National Bank of San Diego, U.S. Depository.

By letter of July 29, the Indian Service notified Mr. Games of the granting of a formal permit.

The conduit and syphon has been installed, requiring no change in irrigation pipes of the Reservation. Since the application was granted, Murray and Fletcher find the cost

of the tunnel prohibitive, together with their large expenditures elsewhere, and wish to abandon this portion of the change as originally asked for, and continue to use the existing flume as before. This maintains unchanged the service of the flume to irrigation boxes No 7 and No 8 of the Reservation pipe lines for which cash was deposited and requires no expense of any kind to the Indian Service.

Murray and Fletcher therefore ask the return of the \$900. deposited for the extension of these Indian pipes and change of these boxes, together with their abandonment of that portion of the permit which applies to the tunnel.

The portion to be abandoned is shown in Red upon the annexed map.

I beg to say for Messrs Murray and Fletcher that they find stipulations 7 and 8 unsatisfactory in the attached paper relative to the Conejos Reservoir. other respects they are ready to proceed. The stipulations are returned with the request that they be so modified as to more nearly agree with the later views relative to water rights in California; which are indicated below; for the following reasons:

- (a) The South Fork empties into and joins the San Diego River within a half mile of the lower end of the Indian Reservation, which is already provided for in the contract referred to in the stipulations. It is unwise to put a double and uncertain tenure on water which if Murray and Fletcher actually now develop and sell and serve consumers should not have a doubtful element. The essential interest of the Reservation is taken care of in Stipulation 9.
- (b) The modern view in California regarding water as voiced by the State Water Commission and a bill passed but postponed on referendum, is that private and individual settlement of water rights wherein water is held out of

use by contracts, or as in this case rendered of uncertain tenure is against public policy. After November of this year, in all probability, such stipulations could not be proposed without the consent of the Water Commission. This view applies clearly here, where it is within the power of the Government or its officials to cancel as essement on a reservoir site, without which the development of irrigated land or domestic service based upon it must be abandoned for possible failure to do something on another stream where the Government is already protected. This involves risks of civil damages and of uncertainty to future residents, which no business man familiar with California water history would care to undertake.

The petitioners are engaged in a bono fide undertaking, have spent \$100,000 this year, part of which benefits the portion of their flume to which the contract refers and ask that the development of an important water supply be not hampered with provisions not directly apposite, but introducing uncertainty in the minds of bond experts.



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STIPULATION

WHEREAS, a part of the proposed right of way for mesorvoir and flume applied for by James A. Murray and Ed Fletcher,
of San Diego, California (Successors to the San Diego Flume
Company) a corporation duly organized and existing under the
laws of the state of California, and operating under
the firm name of Cuyamaca Water Company - hereinafter designated as the "applicants,") as shown by cortain map of 16cation, filed by the applicants with the Department of the
Interior on _______, under the Acts of
March 5, 1891 (26 Stat. L. 1095), May 11, 1898 (30 Stat. L.
404), and February 15, 1901 (31 Stat. L. 790,) will be located
within the Capitan Grande Indian Reservation, in the State
of California; and,

WHEREAS, the Department of the Interior requires the applicants to enter into this stipulation;

NOW, THEREFORE, the applicants do stipulate and agree, and do bind themselves, their heirs and assigns as follows, to-wit:

FIRST: - In consideration of the grant of the right of way for reservoir and flume above described, the applicants hereby tender to the United States of America the sum of \$2,782.50, being at the rate of \$50.00 per acre

for all lands to be occupied by the said reservoir and \$10.00 or acre for all lands to be occupied by the said flume; and the additional sum of \$108.00, being in payment for all damages accruing to the following Indians, namely; Gabriel Duro, Gonzalia, Sam Brown and Juan Macheno, who are occupying lands which will/be submerged by water as a result of the location of the said reservoir.

SECOND: - The applicants agree also that the dam
for said reservoir and the flume shall be located and constructed at the points, and in a manner satisfactory to a
duly authorized representative of the United States of America, and that the applicants, their successors or assigns,
will save the United States of America harmbess from damages of any nature whatsoever that may be caused by reason
of the walls or banks of the said reservoir breaking and
releasing the impounded water.

reserved to the United States of America from the grant applied for, the right for its officials and employees or the Indians to go upon and through the land covered thereby, and also the right to construct roads thereon for the use of the Indians, should such roads become necessary in the opinion of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs.

FOURTH: - That in case the land covered by the grant applied for should at any time in the future be abandoned by the applicants, their successors or assigns, for the

uses authorized by the Acts heretofore cited, for a period of five consecutive years, then, and in that event, shall said grant be terminated, and the rights of applicants thereunder cease.

FIFTH: - That in the event the water now passing through the canal or flume constructed on a right of way granted to the San Diego Flume Company, by the United States of America, through the Capitan Grando Indian Reservation, San Diego County, California, by contract approved by the San Diego Flume Commany on August 20, 1892, shall horeafter be diverted from said flume to the reservoir and flume to be constructed by the applicants on the land covered by the grant now applied for, the Indians of the Capitan Grande Indian Reservation shall, at all times, be supplied with the water to which they are entitled, through the present flume. as specified in the above mentioned contract of August 20, 1892, and the applicants, their successors or assigns, hereby agree to comply at all times with the terms of said contract.

SIXTH: - That to secure the faithful performance of the terms and conditions set forth in the above mentioned contract, approved August 20, 1892, by the San Diego Flume Company, the applicants hereby tender to the United States of Amorica an additional bond in the sum of \$5000.00, making the total bond requirement in connection with the above mentioned contract, \$10,000.00.

SEVENTH: - That nothing contained in this stipula-

tion shall be construed to in any manner release the applicants, their successors or assigns, from any of the obligations imposed in the above mentioned contract, dated August 20. 1892; and said contract shall remain in full force and effect.

EIGHTH: - That in case the applicants, their succossors or assigns, shall at any time fail to comply with the terms of the above mentioned contract, dated August 20. 1892, the right of way now applied for, if granted, shall be deemed to be forfeited, and the rights of the applicants thereunder shall thereupon cease.

NINTH: - That the United States of America, on behalf of the Indians, shall have the first right to purchase water from the applicants, their successors or assigns, for the irrigation of the Indians' lands lying above the proposed reservoir, when the applicants shall have satisfied the needs of their present patrons, at the usual and current price received by the applicants for water used for the purpose of irrigation.

TENTH: - That the United States, on behalf of the Indians, shall have the unquestioned right to pump water from the bed of Los Canejos Creek for the irrigation of the Indian lands lying above the proposed reservoir, if such action should become advisable, irrespective of its possible effect on the reservoir.

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
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

Doar Sir: -

We have received your letter of Spptember 6th regarding amended stipulation in the matter of application for right of way for reservoir and irrigation ditch across certain lands in the Capitan Grande and Los Conejos Indian Reservations.

As perhaps you know this Company has entered into a contract to sell its water system to the La Mesa. Lemon Grove & Spring Valley Irrigation District. According to the terms of the contract this transfer must take place on or before January 1, 1916. The Irrigation District is not yet fully aware of the status of this application nor of the importance of the acquisition of the right of way for the reservoir and ditch. We therefore request that the Indian Service permit us to postpone action on the amended stipulations until a few days after January 1, 1916 and we suggest that this date be made January 15th.

We trust you can see your way clear to recommend to the Indian Service that permission be given for the postponement we have requested above.

Our understanding is that no further action on our part is necessary in addition to this letter, but if any further action is necessary, we will greatly appreciate it if you will notify us at the earliest possible moment.




If the papers are in proper order, will you kindly urge this matter along, and in sending this application to Washington will you kindly make request for a remporary permit to commence work at the damsite?




Your letter of March 27, 1916, enclosing our voucher, receipted for \$2890.50, to hand, for which we thank you.
