Dear Dr. Szilard:

We shall be happy to have you as our speaker on Friday, January 12th at 8:30 P.M. I have reserved our largest hall for your talk and also a room for Saturday morning and afternoon discussions with students. We are all looking forward to having you with us.

What is the title of your address? Is there anything you wish us to stress with regard to your background and current activities in publicizing your appearance?

When I called you, I thought your talk would fit into the two-day program which we plan to put on in February. We want to invite two leading scientists to discuss the consequences of fall-out and nuclear war and the problems of detection. We also intend to invite two specialists in politics to discuss the possibilities of effective negotiation with the Soviet Union, using Berlin as a point of departure. We would like to get individuals representing both the hard and soft lines. For the former we hope to secure someone from the Rand Corporation. Could you suggest someone who could present the case for the soft line effectively? We had hoped to invite Professor Fred Warner Neal, whose recent pamphlet for the Fund for the Republic you may have seen. Unfortunately, he is in France. While I would prefer someone who is already on the Pacific Coast, we would be glad to consider anyone who could do a good job.

I am enclosing a copy of a statement from a group of faculty members at Cornell University, which stimulated our activity.
