

I have learned from Dr. Kelner that the subject of the paper he will give before the meeting of the Section on Microbiology on the evening of November 16th is:


"Light-induced recovery of microorganisms from ultraviolet radiation injury, with special reference to Escherichia coli".



Dear Dr. Szilard,

It was very kind of you to send me a copy of your paper on the peculiarities developing after mixed infection of Coli with T₂ and T₄. I have gone over it with considerable care and have also read the published paper which appeared shortly after I received your draft in Science. The phenomenon is astonishing and I am not surprised that Delbrück is enormously interested and plans to carry out extensive investigations of it at Cal. Tech. On the basis of available evidence it would seem presumptuous to suggest any satisfactory explanation. Indeed, I am at a loss for an hypothesis which would fit the facts.

It was a great pleasure for all of us here to have had an opportunity to hear of your more recent experiments with the chemostat. It was kind of you to come and tell us of them. I enjoyed our brief discussion after your talk and hope that when next you are in New York we may have a chance to discuss similar matters in more detail.
