Celebration Will Mark UCSD Libraries' Unveiling of Historic Herman Baca Archives (Paul Mueller)

The Herman Baca Archive, a comprehensive collection of documents chronicling over 38 years of San Diego's Chicano Movement, will be formally unveiled by the University of California, San Diego Libraries at 2 p.m. on Saturday, July 15, in the Price Center Plaza on campus.

The archive will now be available to students, educators, historians, researchers, and scholars around the country

The free, community-wide special event and celebration is open to the public, and will feature food, music and special guests, including Baca, Lt. Governor Cruz Bustamante, Chancellor Marye Anne Fox, and UCSD Librarian Brian E. C. Schottlaender. Other ethnic communities will also be represented by Allen E. Lawson, Reverend George Walker Smith, and Arlie Ricasa.

The celebration is hosted by UCSD and the Herman Baca Archive Committee.

Baca is the founder and prime mover of the Committee on Chicano Rights (CCR), an organization active in the South Bay and throughout California for almost 40 years. The acquisition of his archives was UCSD's first major Chicano collection.

Baca has been at the forefront of organizing efforts in underserved communities in National City, San Diego County, the U.S. Southwest and the U.S.-Mexico border regions, and worked closely with many of the leading figures of the Chicano movement during the Vietnam War era, including Cesar Chavez, Abe Tapia, Reies Lopez Tijerina, Rodolfo Corky Gonzales and others. He became a key organizer in the creation of La Raza Unida political party during the early 1970s, and continues to be a respected expert on immigration and social justice issues.

"I have attempted to leave for posterity a historical record of the Chicano and Mexicano people's struggle," said Baca, "a struggle rooted in the principle of self-determination."

Schottlaender said that the acquisition by the Mandeville Special Collections Library of Baca's archives—containing numerous documents, photographs and original graphics—is of significant historical import.

"Herman's papers are the first archival collection of Chicano materials to be acquired by UCSD," Schottlaender said, "and a major archival collection, at that. We at UCSD place a great significance on these materials and their importance in illustrating the contributions of the Chicano community to San Diego, to California, and to our nation."

Herman Baca asserts:

Fundamentally, I am driven by the fact that my community does not have economic/political power and equal access to the democratic process. My political activism, in the late 60s as a precinct walker, envelope stuffer and political organizer for conservatives (Nixon) and liberals (Chacon)---significantly heightened my awareness of our politically disenfranchised communities. As I continued my organizing efforts, I have become more acutely aware of the unfairness of not only the political/economic institutions, but also of the justice system. The question that resonated at the time---and continues to the present: *How can our people become involved politically/economically when we are constantly denied our rights?*

Regarding the community event celebrating the Herman Baca Archives, he says, "I have attempted to leave for posterity a historical record of the Chicano/Mexicano people's struggle, a struggle rooted in the historical principle of self-determination. I want future generations to learn from our successes and mistakes — to build on the successes, and not to condemn them to repeating the mistakes. On July 15, 2006 we will all celebrate our past accomplishments and also, register the community's support for further UCSD acquisitions of the primary records of our history."

The Herman Baca Archive, a comprehensive collection of documents chronicling over 38 years of San Diego's Chicano Movement, will be formally unveiled by the University of California, San Diego Libraries at 2 p.m. on Saturday, July 15, in the Price Center Plaza on campus.

The archive will now be available to students, educators, historians, researchers, and scholars around the country

The free, community-wide special event and celebration is open to the public, and will feature food, music and special guests, including Baca, a leading figure in the Chicano Movement whose papers were acquired in 2005, Chancellor Marye Anne Fox, and UCSD Librarian Brian E. C. Schottlaender, among others.

The celebration is hosted by UCSD and the Herman Baca Archive Committee.

Baca is the founder and prime mover of the Committee on Chicano Rights (CCR), an organization active in the South Bay and throughout California for almost 40 years. The acquisition of his archives was UCSD's first major Chicano collection.

Baca has been at the forefront of organizing efforts in underserved communities in National City, San Diego County, the U.S. Southwest and the U.S.-Mexico border regions, and worked closely with many of the leading figures of the Chicano movement during the Vietnam War era, including Cesar Chavez, Dolores Huerta; Reies Lopez Tijerina, Rodolfo Corky Gonzales and others. He became a key organizer in the creation of La Raza Unida political party during the early 1970s, and continues to be a respected expert on immigration and social justice issues.

"I have attempted to leave for posterity a historical record of the Chicano and Mexicano people's struggle," said Baca, "a struggle rooted in the principle of self-determination."

Schottlaender said that the acquisition by the Mandeville Special Collections Library of Baca's archives – containing numerous documents, photographs and original graphics – is of significant historical import.

"Herman's papers are the first archival collection of Chicano materials to be acquired by UCSD," Schottlaender said, "and a major archival collection, at that. We at UCSD place a great significance on these materials and their importance in illustrating the contributions of the Chicano community to San Diego, to California, and to our nation."

According to Lynda Corey Claassen, director of the Mandeville Special Collections Library at UCSD, the Baca materials are a "tremendous" addition to the libraries. "We believe scholars of Mexican-American history and the San Diego/Tijuana region will learn a great deal about the relationship of Spanish-speaking communities to other groups and interests," she said. "Baca's long personal involvement in the major events of contemporary Mexican-American history makes him and his collected papers invaluable resources for future study."

Jorge Mariscal, director of UCSD's Chicano/a – Latino/a Arts and Humanities Program, said that the university's acquisition is "the beginning of an improved relationship" between the campus and surrounding Spanish-speaking communities. "Without exaggerating its potential impact, I feel confident that the collection will have a number of positive consequences for improving real diversity at UCSD," Mariscal said.

Claassen said the UCSD Libraries are proud to become the home for the archives of Baca and the Committee on Chicano Rights. "It was my pleasure over the past year to work with Herman, his family, and his colleagues to develop this archive, and I look forward to our continued collaboration," she said. "These unique materials will be used in instruction and research, enabling the creation of new works and new thinking about the spirit and the struggle of a movement – and the people who are that movement."

Currently, the library is working on an internet register for the archives on the library's online search engine, Roger, which is similar to Google. The school will also be conducting interviews with Baca this summer for an audio documentary in addition to the collection.

"We don't collect things with the intention of throwing them away ten years later, they're staying here," says Lynda Claassen, Director of Special Collections at UCSD who prides the collection for being an addition to the Chicano Studies Program and Ethnic Studies Department.


Chairwoman of the archive committee, Norma Cazares, says, "We also want to encourage institutions of education to look at other parts of our communities ... our struggle in education, our parts in the wars and the military, and the gay and lesbian community. It's those kinds of histories that enrich San Diego's history."

All involved also agree. Schwenk is currently archiving documents from the American Friends Service Committee's U.S. Mexico Border Chapter, and Baca says it's time to begin writing a book about his experience in the Chicano struggle.

It's the particular moments in the movement, he says, that get erased most of all, parts he'd like to write about, the parts that build camaraderie and make experiences much more personal, like ...

Four Chicanos attend a 1977 rally, protesting Ku Klux Klan operations along the border. As they stand on a hill looking down at the crowd, Armando Navarro asks Corky Gonzales, "How many people do you think are down there?" Corky says, "Maybe five-thousand," and tosses the question back. "Ten-thousand," Navarro replies. They look at Baca and ask, "What do you think?" He responds with "fifteen-thousand." They all ultimately look at Bert Corona for the final tally, and he answers, "Hell, since we're all lying, why don't we go ahead and make it fifty-thousand."

The Herman Baca Archive Committee is currently organizing a July 15 celebration commemorating the public release of the archives at the UCSD Price Center Plaza.



Morrison, who spent time walking precincts to promote the tax, said in addition to convincing the public the higher tax was needed, he also had to assure them Mayor Nick Inzunza would be leaving office soon.

Encabezó la oposición a la propuesta del jefe de policía de San Diego de permitir que la policía local aplicara la ley federal de inmigración. 1994 Organizó una campaña y un boicot en contra del equipo de fútbol Los Chargers, de la Liga Nacional de Fútbol Americano, por nombrar a su línea defensiva como la "Patrulla Fronteriza". 1995 Organizó una campaña para protestar contra el grupo racista de derecha consistente de vigilantes civiles armados, que ayudarían a la policía en el aeropuerto. Este grupo era patrocinado por el comentarista de radio Roger Hedgecock. 1997 Hizo una campaña contra el voto de Sierra Club para respaldar una táctica de reducción de la inmigración, como estrategia para disminuir el crecimiento de la población en los Estados Unidos. 1998 Dio un discurso sobre el 150 aniversario del Tratado de Guadalupe Hidalgo. 1999 Organizó una campaña política contra la mala calidad de la educación que impartía el Distrito Escolar Unificado de Sweetwater. 2000 Hizo una campaña en contra de la Oficina de Censo de los Estados Unidos por clasificar como blancos a los chicanos, a los mexicanos y a los latinos. 2003 Organizó campañas en contra del alcalde y del concejo municipal de National City por no cumplir con el mandato del 70% de los votantes de National City, que aprobó una medida de obligación municipal para establecer una junta de fiscalización de la policía con poderes de citación; por aumentar sus salarios en un 18%; por aumentar las cuotas de recolección de la basura; y por doblar las tarifas de uso de las alcantarillas de la ciudad más pobre del Condado de San Diego; por nombrar a un policía asesino (Craig Short, quien le disparó a la espalda a Luis 'Tato' Rivera en 1975) como jefe interino de la policía; y por violar los derechos humanos fundamentales aplicando ilegalmente la ley federal de inmigración al colaborar con la Patrulla Fronteriza de los Estados Unidos, la cual deportó a la familia de un residente extranjero legal.





Herman Baca was born to Nicholas and Eloisa Carrasco Baca on April 5, 1943, in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

He moved to National City in 1954.

In 1970 Baca organized the San Diego County chapter of La Raza Unida Party, a national third-party effort to increase the participation of the Chicano community as both registered voters and political candidates.

That same year, he served as the Southern California representative to the National Congreso de la Raza Unida, the party's national convention.

Also in the early 1970s, while chairman of the board of "War on Poverty" programs such as the Mexican American Advisory Committee, now the Metropolitan Area Advisory Committee (MAAC)

He worked to get right for the UFW (United Farm Workers).

Allen Lawson Chief of the San Pasqual Tribe and Chairmen of Valley View Casino was Baca's best friend.

1972 Casa Justicia co-organized a Los Angeles march of 10,000 undocumented workers protesting the California Legislature's Dixon/Arnett Immigration Bill

1973 Organized a 500-person picket at the San Diego County jail, protesting Sheriff Duffy's order to taxicab drivers to report suspected "illegal alien" passengers

1975 Organized a 2000-person march in National City protesting a National City police officer's shooting and killing of an unarmed Latino youth, Luis "Tato" Rivera

When he was eleven years old, his family moved to National City, California, where Baca attended Sweetwater Union School District schools through high school. Starting in the printing trade business after high school, he worked in a few local shops before opening his own private business, Aztec Printing, in 1969. With the emerging Chicano movement in the 1960s, Baca became involved in local electoral politics with a Chicano perspective. His father's (Nicholas Baca) participation in New Mexico's intense electoral politics influenced his development and transformation in California from a believer in the two-party political system into an independent Chicano activist committed to self-determination and human rights. After a little back ground on Herman Baca there is also a lot to learn about the price center at UCSD, were you can watch documentaries on the Chicano movement as well as listening to their much enriched cultural music. I never knew how much of a struggle it was for Chicanos; and how tough it was when they basically had not as many rights as any other American. This Chicano movement Baca

started in the 60's is very powerful and should not go unrecognized. After hearing him speak of Chicanos being stripped of their land, as well as their rights you could not strip them of their pride "Chicano Pride". At the Goisel Library you can observe many different artifacts, and articles from the time of the civil rights movement. Also you can listen to a blessing by Gilbert Chavez and watch spiritual Aztec dancers perform. 

On July 15, I went to the UCSD event of Herman Baca Chicano Archives. This event started at 2:00 pm. In the middle of the Price Center was a group of music's "Los Alacranes" by Chunky. There were some refreshments for the guests. Then I went in front of the Geisel Library (where the Herman Baca Papers are filled) following the Spiritual Aztec Dancers, by Bishop Gilbert Chavez. They dance "The little mother, and Teoyolo-The secret heart dance. Also Mr. Gilbert talked about the Chicano Movement, the different ethnics in US and the conquer of America by Herman Cortez in 1520. In addition, he mentions the technology in the 20 century.

After that, I went to the Theatre to see a film about the Chicano Movement, La Raza that Herman Baca started. The film was about the Chicano activist Herman Baca who was born on April 5, 1943, in Albuquerque, New Mexico. Son of Nicholas and Eloisa Carrasco Baca. His family moved to National City, California, where Baca attended Sweetwater School through high school. He has a printing business, "Aztec Printing." in National City. In 1960 he got evolved in the Chicano Movement for Human Rights. They protest for better education for students, housing and rights for Mexicans. In 1970 The Committee on Chicano Rights was created. He worked with the president Richard Nixon. He

meets President Jimmy Carter in 1970. When the film ended Ms Norma Cazares present some of the Guests for the event (Rodolfo Corky Gonzalez civil rights leader, Jorge Marisol professor, Marye Anne Fox chancellor of UCSD, Cruz Bustamante Lieutenant Governor of California, George Walker Smith reverend, Allen E Lawson, Arlie Ricasa pacific lieder in Imperial Beach). All of them talked that all of us are immigrants and that is how the USA is maid up. During the program the KKK, the Minutemen, prop 187 and Cesar Brenner, the National Guard in the border and the election of México "That we still don't have a president for México," were mention. Also, that in the past people who cross mountains, rivers, deserts were called pioneers but now they are called illegal's. Mr. Armando Navarro professor in Mexicali is an advocate of the immigrants NAHR (National Alliance for Human Rights). This organization is to assure the safety of Mexican and Chicanos along the border.

At the end Herman Baca maid a Speech. He presented his wife (Nadine Baca, and five sons/daughters).
