Confirming telephone conversation will say that I distinctly recollect that the agreement between the Government and our people is for a hundred inches of water for the Indians at Rincon, and I have immediately notified Mr. Henshaw that they are now demanding 200 inches.

Regarding the Woods escrow I Cassou falls down, try and get the situation in shape so that I can step in and purchase it for my people. I would have to telegraph to New York, and for that reason let me know at an early date as possible before January 1st what the ranch can be secured at and the terms, in case Mr. Cassou falls down.

My dear Mr. Wohlford:

I am getting together date, and intend writing a history of the water development of San Diego County. I want you to give me a complete history, from the beginning of the Escondido Mutual Water Company System; who promoted it, who the engineers were; who built it, and a photograph of the dam, what the system cost originally, what the Mutual Water Company paid for it, who financed the building of it, etc. I also want a history of the development since you have been connected with it, including a photograph of each of your power houses and one of the ditch, and I want a photograph of you. Please let me have a full history of your connection with it.

I am getting a full history of the early water development of San Diego County from Spreckels, Babcock, U.S. Grant, Alberson, T.S. VanDyke, Howells, the Sweetwater water system, Linda Vista Irrigation District, etc. I will reimburse you for any expense you may be put to in order to get any of these documents. I expect to put several thousand dollars into this work, but when it is finished it will be the best that money can produce and Fletcher's brains can put together.

I have, for years, given you credit for being far-sighted, but you certainly over-looked your hand a year ago when they started the formation of the Irrigation District from Escondido to Vista and Oceanside. Hecondido should have gone in 100% at that time, but I em more than pleased to read in the papers that you have resurrected the idea. Mr. Henshew will undoubtedly sell to the first people who will buy, yet I will give you all the cooperation I can, for I do not went to see Warners water go out of the County.


There is considerable danger in the situation, for the State Engineer has reported that the only practicable, available source of supply for the Perris Valley is from Werners. The Perris people raised their own money for the surveys that are now being made, and I was surprised to find that both the Santa Fe Railroad and Harry Chendler of the Los Angeles Times have made liberal subscriptions toward this fund. These people mean business. Four Hundred of them agreed that they would assess themselves \$150, per sore to get the Werners Water.

I read by the papers that the U.S. Reclamation service have written the City of Oceanside or its attorney, months ago, urging the formation of this Escondido District. I do not know what you people have been thinking of to let this matter slip, for it is vital to you. On the other hand, the City of San Diego has not, since 1016, caught enough water in its reservoirs to take care of the evaporation. The truth is, there is only enough water in the City's reservoirs to take care of the City until the 1st of January, 1921. The City is over-bonded, and there is only one thing to be done and that is to form a Municipal Water District. This movement is now on, and in my opinion, one of the first fources of supply that they will try to get will be Warbers. I am writing you a confidential letter as a friend to a friend, but am sending a copy to Alex.
