Dear Sir:-

Answering yours of the 15th inst. will say that we have always contemplated taking Warners water into Pamo and down the San Pasqual Valley. The farmers from Oceanside to Escondido are planning the formation of an irrigation District and have asked us to bring the water down the San Luis Rey direct. The matter has been put in the hands of the State Engineer of California, who has instructed us to make this survey in order to determine the advisability of the project. If the scheme is at all practicable application will be made in the regular manner for right of way if it crosses the Indian Reservation.

I was not aware that the survey which we are making in any manner touches any Indian Reservation, and have no desire to offend the Government in any manner. Our line is away up on the top of the mountain on the south side of the river. It is our desire to co-operate with your Department in every way.

The Fallbrook people have made application to join the proposed District, if one is formed, and you can rest assured that after the Warner's project is far enough advanced to warrant it, we will take the matter up with the proper authorities so as to get the consent of the Government.

The Indians of the Capitan Grande Reservation complain that they are not receiving the full 40 miner's inches to which they are entitled, under agreement with your company. The difficulty seems to be that if an Indian does not use water on the day his name is scheduled that he is not allowed any water until the next date his name appears on the schedule.

Kindly instruct your local officers so that in the event an Indian is not able to take his water on the date his name appears on the schedule that some other Indian will be able to take the water instead.
