Dear Dr. Szilard:

Harrison Brown informs me that he has told you something about our current arms control work here, and he suggests that you might be willing to come out to the Institute for a couple of days and take part in our program. It would be a privilege to have you with us, and I should like, if I may, to explore the possibilities.

Under a recent Carnegie grant we have been trying to bring together scientists, humanists, and men of affairs in the studyof the arms control problem within the broad framework of national policy and the context of current international relations. A number of visitors like General Maxwell Taylor, M. Jules Moch, Henry Kissinger, and James R. Killian have already taken part in our deliberations, and we expect this flow to continue for the remainder of the academic year.

We have been asking our visitors to do two things in particular. First of all we propose a lecture, open to all at the Institute, in which the speaker can set forth his principal ideas in general terms. Secondly, we ask that he spend a couple of hours in detailed discussion with a seminar consisting of some thirty members of the faculty from all divisions, plus a few graduate students.

The setting is quite informal. We do not ask speakers for a prepared text for publication, though if one happens to be available it always pleases those members of the press who choose to turn up at the lecture. The seminar, of course, is private. We should welcome the opportunity to hear you discuss such aspects of arms control as may be at present uppermost in your mind.

Is it possible that you could be with us on Thursday, February 2, for a lecture at 1:00 P. M., followed immediately by a session with our seminar group? I do hope the idea may appeal to you, and that the date may be convenient for you. Needless to say, we should be happy to meet your expenses in coming out from the East, and I trust it would not be out of place for me to suggest the small honorarium of \$200. We should have a

place for you in our faculty club, and, if you can make it a leisurely visit, we should be most happy.

Dear Mr. Hershey:

Your letter of September 13th to Dr. Szilard has been brought to my attention and it is not entirely clear to me whether you received an answer to it. To the best of my knowledge Dr. Szilard is not at the present time accepting any speaking engagements because of the heavy burden of work in connection with the Council for Abolishing War which he established last June. At the present time, he is in Europe in connection with the disarmament studies and I am not in a position to say whether he can go to California this January or not. However, Dr. Feld, President of the Council, will be in California at the beginning of the year, probably just after Christmas. As someone who has been connected with Dr. Szilard with 20-odd years and who is President of the organization Dr. Szilard established, he might make an acceptable stand-in.

When Dr. Szilard returns from Europe, I will discuss this question with him further, but I think there ought to be further discussion between you and him or me as to the actual chances of his going to California in January, which seemed to me, at least for the moment, to be somewhat in question. While I would not rule out the possibility that he might be able to come, I certainly would not want to give the impression that he has definitely decided to do so, unless you have firm information to the contrary.
