Since I last wrote you, I received a letter from Professor Donald Shaughnessy of the Oral History Research Office of Columbia University, a copy of which you will find attached. I am afraid this is a major blow to the book because I was counting on using the technique that I have discussed with Shaughnessy and on starting in the near future. That Shaughnessy cannot come to Washington is unfortunate, but I could possibly arrange to move up to New York at some later date and do the work there. However, Shaughnessy also states that their "non-earmarked" funds are exhausted and this appears to close the door to all arrangements with this group.
