Dear Professor Skobeltzyn:

Many thanks for your letter (undated) which you sent to Berlin. Before I left Chicago I arranged a neeting with Eugene Rabinowitch and Morton Grodsins (who will be in charge of arranging the meeting if the University of Chicago is to arrange a meeting) and Dr. Grodsins will keep in touch with Rabinowitch, and through him with the team elected at Pugwash.

As a general remark I should like to add the following: e ought to think in terms of several meetings to be held within a year, and at each meeting could be held under different suspices and might have a somewhat different character. We ought to look at each such meeting as an experiment from which we can learn how to make the next meeting more effective.

This way each group which arranges a meeting will have a chance to try out its own ids concerning how to make a meeting effective. Thus if for instance the University of Chicago is arranging a meeting the number of participants, incl. observers, may have to be limited to 30, both because we believe that it is not possible to have a thorough discussion of difficult problems in a larger group and also because it would be difficult to finance, privately, a such larger meeting.

Further we would not want to attempt to issue a proclamation representing the consensus of the participants. On the other hand there ought to be a communiqué listing the topics which the meeting considered important and which were discussed at the meeting. Opinions that have been expressed and views that were presented by individuals could be described in appendix that is attached, either with or without attribution.

The participants she wish to summarize conclusions which they themselves have reached during the meeting would be free to do so, and such summarizes could be attached to the official communique. The meetings, in order to be productive, ought take 10 days or 2 weeks and should not be overburdened with organized sessions.

Botblat, in a letter which I received from him in Berlin, raised questions concerning the participation of "newspapermen" as observers, and I am enclosing a letter of my answer to him.
