Dear Sir.

Your letter of the 15th was duly received, but I have been so pressed with private and other correspondence that I have not had before now leisure to answer.

I have this day written to Mr. Fish, stating that you are an applicant for the Consulship at Havana and that you served with me on the Octoara during the war that you performed your duties to my satisfaction and that you were energetic

intelligent and capable.

But now my dear fellow,
you seem to have forgotten that
of many officers, unless like
Faragut & Porter have not a par-
ticle of political influence, each
and every Member of the Legis-
lature of Massachusetts has much
more weight in the matter of
your appointment than I have,
I do not know a single Member
of either House of Congress sufficient
by well to ask of one the smallest
favor. I have never seen any
one of the members of the present
Cabinet.

The first to influence
have the influence of, is the President
Secondly, the members of the
Cabinet. 3^d. The U.S. Senators
who have to approve of the removal
to make the vacancy, or rather
