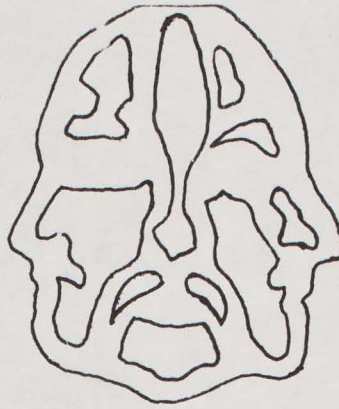

Since New Mexico was chosen as the site for the 1980 National Chicano Student Conference (NCSC) at last year's conference in Denver, Colorado, we extend our invitation to you to our "Land of Enchantment," Nuevo Mejiço. The NCSC will be held on April 17-20, 1980, at the University of New Mexico and the University of Albuquerque in Albuquerque, New Mexico. The conference will be hosted by all New Mexico universities.

A Steering Committee has been established to set up workshops for the NCSC and to establish a liaison with your university. As of December 1, 1979, all information regarding the NCSC in Albuquerque will be forwarded to your university to be utilized for further growth and participation in Chicano development, awareness and culture.

Due to lack of funding, any suggestions and/or contributions would be appreciated. Any input as to workshops and panelists, announcements or activities your university would like to sponsor for a successful conference would also be greatly appreciated.

Apart from the NCSC for 1980, and as agreed at the 1979 NCSC in Denver, Colorado, here's what's been happening in New Mexico. On November 9-11, 129 persons representing organizations in New Mexico, West Texas and Southern Colorado, gathered to discuss problems which will be faced by Chicano students in the 1980's. Of major concern for the participants was the proposed re-allocation of financial aid funding in Region 6. Other issues addressed during the conference were the lack of Chicano administrators and the lack of Chicano Studies programming at all New Mexico universities. The struggle for the reclamation of land grants and La Mujer Chicana were also topics that were discussed.

THE CONFERENCE WILL BE INCORPORATED WITH THE ANNUAL SPRING FIESTA. ACTIVITIES FOR THE FIESTA WILL INCLUDE MUSIC, TEATRO, ART, DANCING, FOOD, ETC...
