She holds a degree from the Paris Conservatoire.

ALVIN RUDNITZKY - made his debut with the Philadelphia Orchestra at the age of ll under Stokowski. He has played with all the major orchestras in The United States as well as in recital. Has recorded for the major recording firms as Concertmaster. He is presently Musical Director and Conductor at five High Schools.

GEORGE REEVES - is one of Philadelphia's best known young pianists. He is a member of the Philadelphia Orchestra and teaches privately in Swarthmore. He was a student of Edward Steurman. Mr. Reeves has played recitals throughout the East Coast and has been heard with the Philadelphia Chamber Music Society and others.



Awarded seventh place (out of more than loo contestants from 10 countries) amid much acclaim, in the Van Cliburn International Piano Competition in 1962. Received award for the best performance of a commissioned piece.

Has appeared as soloist with the Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra on several occasions.

TONY DELAP

Born Oakland, Cal., 1927; lives in Corona del Mar, Cal. Faculty, University of California, Irvine.

"An artist of this generation... is Tony DeLap. His recent work, consisting of concentrically stepped form in shallow recession, is housed in containers of glass, stainless steel and plastic. Irradiated with light, the interior form, painted in dark saturated color, pulsates. The whole effect of the combination of the expanding fields of color and the sensuous sheen of glass, metal and plastic is capricious and highly suggestive. But DeLap also brings to Bay Area art a quality of visual acuity - a very personal visual exactitude - that is almost completely missing in this milieu." Coplans, John, "Circle of Styles," Art in America, June, 1964.

The Arts Forum, through a Ford Foundation grant under the auspices of The American Federation of Arts, will have Tony DeLap in residence in the month of May. He will participate in Festival 2 and an exhibit of his works will be shown. Mr. DeLap is a sculptor who has attracted a great deal of attention all over the United States. He is working in materials and forms which are new and inventive. His career includes a teaching position currently at the Irvine campus of the University of California, from which he is on leave to come to The Arts Forum. He will participate in a symposium and will lecture during the Festival, as well as appearing in schools and colleges for seminars, lectures and demonstrations.

He holds the BA and MA degrees from the University of California at Berkeley, and was a student of Darius Milhaud fro many years, as well as of Roger Sessions during his studies at the University. In 1948 he was the recipient of the Paris Prize from the University of California and while in Paris Mr. Smith studied in the class of Olivier Messiaen at the Paris Conservatoire.

Mr. Smith is a performer of distinction on the piano and the bassoon, as well as the clarinet. He has worked with the San Francisco Symphony, the Chicago Symphony, the New York City Ballet Company and the Chicago and San Francisco Opera companies.

A teacher for 15 years, he is presently Associate Professor at Stanford University in charge of the Doctoral program in composition. He has also taught at the University of Chicago as Assistant Professor and at Mills College. He has published a "Handbook of Harmonic Analysis" (Stanford University) and "Composition and Pre-Composition in the Music of Anton Webern (University of Washington Press).

Although the list of Smith's works is far too long to list in full attention should be called to his opera "Santa Claus" on a text by e.e.cummings, his String Trio, available on records, and the numerous works for chamber ensemble which have greatly enriched the repertoire for woodwind and string players. His Sonata for Heckelphone, performed at Chicago, Berkeley and Paris is an outstanding work for a little known instrument.

Mr. Smith represents an important development in American music of the midtwentieth century as he bridges a stream of serial composition with a structure based in the idiom of immediate drama and lyricism. Capable of the most severe and imaginative intellectual constructs, Mr. Smith never leaves the domain of pure music for pure speculation. His work is always idiomatic, as one would expect from so proficient a performer, and the use of every instrument, though often extremely demanding is basically congenial. Belonging to no fashionable "school" or clique, Mr. Smith continues to build a strong and progressive musical language. His individuality is clear and his music is direct. Such men are rare in any place.




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

THE PHILADELPHIA COMPOSERS' FORUM

The PHILADELPHIA COMPOSERS' FORUM is the sole professional performing group for new music in Pennsylvania and one of the very few in the United States. Founded in 1954 as a non-profit educational institution devoted to the performance and dissemination of contemporary music its major objectives are to present performances of new music on the highest artistic level and thereby stimulate the general cultural life of the numerous communities which is serves.

Although the Forum came into existence in 1954 it is within the last two years that its extraordinary potential has been demonstrated. Such projects as the forthcoming association with the Theatre of the Living Arts, the youth concert series, and the College Series – first of its kind in the nation – all these attest to the growing accomplishment and initiative of the Philadelphia Composers' Forum. The diversity of its work is evident not only in the presentation of new music but also through endeavors to involve the community in discussion and lectures, to present to the audience at least one of the composers represented on each program, and to expand repertoire by including the most recent works from all countries. The one contemporary music group in the United States with such an extensive season, numerous public school concerts and over 40 college concerts in a five state area have been performed during the past two years. The series is broadcast in its entirety for world-wide distribution by Voice of America, and a major recording session with Vox Productions is in preparation.

This season's plans include six concerts at the Theate of the Living Arts in Philadelphia, the Expansion of the college and youth concert series, and further recordings and broadcasts. Audiences will have the opportunity of hearing 6 World Premieres and 17 Philadelphia Premieres. The performing Group, comprising twenty-seven (size varies according to works performed) of some of the most gifted young professional musicians in the country, includes twenty-one Philadelphians, three New Yorkers, two players from Baltimore, and one from Japan. Thus, while actively developing the performance of contemporary music in Philadelphia, the Forum is, at the same time, introducing highly gifted artists to many other communities.



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

After establishing a reputation as an accomplished jazz MEL POTELL: pianist, Ir. Powell's interests led him into composing works for chamber groups and to electronic realization of works at the Columbia-Princeton Electronic Lusic Center. Tis instrumental compositions have been widely performed, and he is currently Director of the Electronic l'usic Center at Yale University.

GERALD SHAPIRO: Mr. Shapiro has been studying with Darius Milhaud for the past year, and also working at the Tabe Lusic Center. Antiphonies is his first work in the redium. He is one of the Fulbright Award recirients for 1965-1966 and will spend the year in Paris.

FOLKE RABE: There is a strong bond between a number of young Scanda-navian composers and members of the Tape Lusic Center. Folke Rabe is one of the reasons. Currently in San Francisco on a Swedish Government grant, he has been rehearsing with the Dancers forkshop with whom he will tour in Europe this fall. Mr. Rabe has the following comments regarding his two pieces on the program:

"'ARG' is a tape montage, a compression of one hour of JABC-New York broadcasting plus a few other materials. This radic station seems to me to be one of the greatest in the world. The allost comositional structure of the programming was an overwhelming i pression when I first came to the United States.

"The Impromptu is one of the 149 Impromptus in a series which were composed between 1939 and 1963. Life many kinds of music this piece should not be understood the way it sounds, but appreciated in about the same way you appreciate a Bagatelle by Joachim A. Krenz."

RAULI JENDER: In The Garden is a blatently allegorical work. Its sounds begin with unshaped, raw noise which contains the potentials for all musics. The two live instruments are synchronized to their respective channels of prepared sounds for the first half of the work, and only gradually does their relationship change to tape versus tapeperformer from tape-performer versus tape-performer. The rest of my programmatical intentions are best left unexpressed, so that the listener is free to ream at will in the sound-visual landscape.

PAULINE GLIVEROS: notes on Pieces of Eight: "As a vedercok that turneth its face with every wind." Chaucer

"A Double Curtaille: This is double the bigness of the single mentioned in ch.xvi n.6 and is layed 8 notes deeper. It is as it were 2 pices fixed in on(e) thick bass pipe, one much longer than the other, from minimim the top of the lower comes a brooked piece of brass in which is fixed a reed, through it the wind passeth to make the instrument make a sound. It hath 6 holes on the outside and one on that side next the man or back part and 2 brass keys, the highest called double La Sol Re, and the other B Mi." The Academy of Armory by Randle Holme
