The events of this past spring have shown that, if ever our universities needed our loyalty and support, it is now. It seems appropriate, therefore, to suggest that each of us commit herself to make some positive contribution to UCSD in the year ahead. In this way, individually and collectively, Oceanids can be a vital, positive and beneficial force within the life of our University and city.

Many within our ranks have been utilizing their talents to this end for years, and the possibilities for challenging and creative activities are infinite. There are those engaged in action to prevent the encroachment of urban blight that could well destroy the area's physical beauty and serenity; others have labored valiantly to make an International Center here a reality; the international People-to-People Exchange Program promotes co-operation with our Mexican neighbors; etc.

We can envision additional horizons that have not yet been fully explored.

Last spring dedicated members of this academic community joined in a program to promote dialogue with those in the larger community who were sometimes uninformed, sometimes hostile in their view of us. Increased mutual understanding began. We hope this program can be continued and expanded, and that Oceanids can contribute to this constructive enterprise.

The opening of Third College this fall is an event of major significance for UCSD, for in this venture we will be pioneering in an effort to make education relevant for minorities and urban problems, areas heretofore grossly neglected. Third College should stimulate our own learning processes enormously. Keeping apprised of its progress should be one of the most exciting experiences of the year. As we open our homes and hearts to foreign visitors in our midst, perhaps we should also keep in mind that many native Americans may feel uncertain of their reception in what may seem an unfamiliar, if not alien, environment.

Many of our constituency are already working to improve the quality of life for all San Diegans, most of whom are not so blessed as we here on our enchanted mesa. We will attempt to facilitate the process for those who seek community involvement and are uncertain where to begin.

Two Interest Groups are planning programs which should be relevant for the implementation of some of these "new" horizons. Contemporary Issues, the evening discussion group, begins this fall with the provocative topic: "The Changing Role of the University". This should enable participants to focus their own concept of the university's role in society. Specific concerns of the San Diego area will be addressed in a fall series conducted by Community Concerns, an action oriented group.

An indispensable aspect of commitment is camaraderie, and we sense that many members miss the opportunity to socialize once they "graduate" from Newcomers. Thus, we are contemplating one or two membership coffees later in the year if there seems to be sufficient interest. We should also consider reviving the concept of occasional social events which include husbands.

We have the setting for a model community... let's join forces to make it a reality.

#### MUIR COLLEGE CONVOCATION

On Friday, October 16, John Muir College will hold a convocation to celebrate moving to its permanent campus and to honor members of the Class of 1971, the first undergraduates of the college, who have now reached senior status. The ceremony will take place in the area of the new Muir campus bounded by the commons and the residence halls and will begin at 2:00 p.m.

Former Chief Justice Earl Warren will be the principal speaker. His address is made possible by the Mandeville Foundation and is the first of the Mandeville Lectures for 1970-1971. Justice Warren is one of four distinguished persons to be made honorary fellows of the college during the ceremony. It is hoped that Mr. Ernest Mandeville and Dr. Ernst Krenek, two of the honorary fellows appointed when the college opened in 1967, will also be present.

Arrangements for the occasion are being overseen by Professors Michael Parrish and Eric Christmas. Professor Bertram Turetzky is in charge of music. All members of the academic community and the public are cordially invited. Admission, of course, is free. The audience will be sitting on the grass, so it might be well to bring a cushion or blanket. An informal reception will be held following the convocation.

#### CHOOSE A COURSE, ANY COURSE

If you can't lick 'em, join 'em. For the second year, qualified adults in the community may take regular daytime UCSD courses -- when enrolled through University Extension and when the classes are not filled to capacity by regular students. Conceived as a program to provide business and professional community leaders with an eagle's eye view of the college course material, the program last year brought in some 100 "adult students." As Dr. Martin Chamberlain, Dean of University Extension, said, "Many people have a distorted view of what the university is like, and the students' view of the community can be just as distorted. This offers a chance to see the university in action. It should be informative to both sides."

Enrollment forms are available at the University Extension office. A fee is required, whether the course is for credit or not.

As you know, November 3 is the general election. Polls are open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. If in doubt as to whether you are registered, phone the County Registrar of Voters (278-9400). Sample ballots will be mailed no later than October 23.

Absentee ballots are available from October 5 through October 27. You may vote them by mail or in person at the Registrar's office (5555 Overland, San Diego). Either way they must be in that office before 5 p.m. November 2. The Registrar's office advises that one apply for an absentee ballot earlier than receiving the sample ballot. In the application include: your signature (as registered), your address (where registered), the reason for needing a ballot (illness, absence from town, etc.), and the address to which the ballot should be sent.

OCEANIDS -- WHO WE ARE

OCEANIDS is a non-profit organization of all women associated with UCSD, formed to promote fellowship through sponsorship and participation in special interest groups, and through service to the University and to the community. We are not primarily a faculty women's club. All women employees and wives of all men employees of UCSD are eligible for membership, including, of course, all University Hospital employees and, by long and cordial tradition, all employees at the Fishery Oceanography Center. Retired UCSD personnel and wives of employees who have died may continue membership indefinitely. Because they have their own organization, wives of graduate students are not included (unless they or their husbands are also employed). Undergraduate students are also not included.

Membership in OCEANIDS includes voting and office-holding privileges, participation in as many interest groups as desired, and subscription to BEAR FACTS. Dues for the 1970-71 academic year are \$5. (Interested persons ineligible for membership in OCEANIDS may subscribe to BEAR FACTS for \$3.)

## COMMUNITY CONCERNS

The Community Concerns Interest Group hopes to function as an action group dealing with problems which affect us as members of the University Community within the San Diego Community. In order to be effective as an action group, however, we must first be well informed about both the University Community and the institutions in the San Diego community where decisions affecting us are made. We must also be prepared to study the problems and plan any action carefully if we expect to have any influence in the decision-making process.

To achieve this and the necessary familiarity with the community we are planning a series of "Get acquainted with your decision-making Institutions" tours. The first tour will be of the campus, including the new Muir Campus, the new library, and Matthews Campus. Dr. Philip James, Executive Assistant to the Chancellor, will discuss with us some of the problems facing the University in our relationship to the whole community. He and others who have been active in this area will answer questions from the group. Since changes are constantly occurring on Campus, this tour should be of interest to old as well as new members of the University Community. This tour will be held on Wednesday, October 28, starting at 9:30 for about two hours.

The tour will start from Conference Room A in the Administration Building across the street from the Fire Station on Matthews Campus. Parking space will be provided near-by. The San Diego Public Busline services this spot with bus R which has its terminal stop at this point. Please call your reservation in as early as possible so that we can plan properly.

Other tours, depending upon interest response, are being planned. The second tour, scheduled for November, will be to the San Diego Police Department and to a court session. Arrangements have been made for a guided tour through the Police Department at which time an official of that department will tell us about their work and attitude toward handling some of the problems they encounter with young people in the community. Also on the proposed schedule are tours to the San Diego City Council meeting, a Planning Commission meeting, a School Board meeting. All tours will include a discussion of the activities handled by the institution and, hopefully, suggestions of ways in which we as active members of the community can participate in areas which concern our well being. We feel these tours will be interesting and give us the kind of background information necessary to be an effective action group.

The second activity this group would like to develop is a plan under which interested members would take the responsibility of attending meetings of one of these institutions on a regular basis. The member would act as kind of a "watch dog" for the group and alert us to problems in time to take effective action. This has been done successfully in the past, especially in zoning and land use matters.

The first meeting of the Community Concerns Group will be held on Thursday, October 8, at the home of Gita Braude, 1723 Castellana Road, La Jolla, at 10 a.m. We hope all people interested in participating in this group will attend this meeting so that we can plan a program designed to respond to the interests of our members.

#### AND A ONE...

A second class for teaching English to the Spanish-speaking adults of the community begins October 5 for eight weeks. For the worthy project the group needs additional tutors, who do not need to have teaching experience or a knowledge of Spanish. During the past summer 37 adults, whose ability in English ranged from none to fair, were tutored in English by 13 volunteers for a 6-week session, three nights a week. The classes were sponsored by SOFA (Rev. Lonnie Wormley) and Club de Progresso (Josephine Foulks). Evening sessions are planned for the fall classes. #### AND A TWO...

Oceanids has recently been asked for help by a group called the Mexican-American Advisory Committee in National City. The Committee is planning a preschool program to meet the urgent need for low-cost educational preschool programs in the area of Southeast San Diego and National City." The children in the program come from families slightly above the income line for Headstart, but still very much in need of this kind of service.

The Children's Community School Parent Advisory Group has already found space at St. Andrews Presbyterian Church in National City; they have hired a qualified teacher and hope to have at least one aide assigned by the Neighborhood Youth Corps.

What they need most urgently is money; money to pay the teacher's salary and to meet the school's other expenses; they also need all kinds of play equipment. They could also use volunteer teachers who might give a morning or afternoon to help them meet their proposed ratio of one adult for every five children.

JUNIOR OCEANOGRAPHER'S CORPS

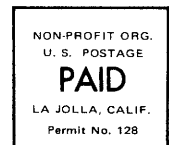
