Dear Prof. Szilard:

I am writing to you on behalf of the coordinating committee of the Congress of Scientists on Survival, now in the process of formation. This committee will be representative of the physical and social sciences and the related professions. As an eminent scientist and a leader of a highly respected profession, you are officially invited to participate, either as an individual or organizational spokesman, in the first meeting of this committee.

The meeting will be held at the above address on Tuesday, Dec. 12, 1961, at 8:45 p.m.

The plan for an on-going Congress of Scientists on Survival (S.O.S.) was proposed at the Emergency Conference of the American Association for Social Psychiatry, on November 18th. Among those contributing to this plan were such noted psychiatrists as Dr. Joost A.M. Meerloo and Dr. Mottram Torre, Assistant Director of the World Federation for Mental Health, as well as such outstanding psychologists as Dr. Rollo May and Dr. Charles Osgood, President of the American Psychological Association. A representative of the newly formed Behavioral Scientists for Peace - a group inspired by Professor Otto Klineberg - attended and was nominated to this coordinating committee.

The committee was formed to operate as an autonomous group, independent of the American Association for Social Psychiatry. A nucleus met after the close of the A.A.S.P. conference and agreed on preliminary procedures. The first function of this committee is to provide an opportunity for cooperative planning and inter-organizational collaboration for the formation of a world-wide Congress of Scientists on Survival.

Specific purposes of this proposed Congress, - relating to scientific research and communication, public education and programs for peace, etc. - will be determined democratically by the membership. However, its scope and possibilities are indicated by the following words of Julian Huxley, in his Foreword to Professor T. F. Lenz's book, "Towards a Science of Peace" --

". . . most thinking men and women are beginning to feel that today a new ideology is needed, a new orientation of thought

and action, which on the one hand shall be in harmony with scientific knowledge and method, and on the other hand, shall be adapted to the new conditions and necessities of the modern world, notably the prevention of war and mass destruction, the development of a co-operative supranational or transnational system and effort of world development, the control of population growth, and the conservation and proper utilization of world resources."

I feel certain that you also share President Kennedy's conviction that "either mankind will put an end to war or war will put an end to mankind." As we know, there is nothing as powerful as an idea whose time has come. Now is the crucial time to "strengthen rational forces to defeat irrational war," as prescribed by Freud.

I hope that you will be able to join me and many of your fellow scientific leaders, at my office, 815 Park Ave., Tuesday, Dec. 12, 1961 at 8:45 P.M. Your New York area representative will be welcome, of course, if you cannot attend.

Will you send us the names of interested people who should receive copies of the June conference program and announcements of future plans. In turn, we can, if you wish, give you the names of other scientists in your area who are searching for the most effective ways of making their contribution to preserving peace. We look forward to hearing from you - and to seeing you at the Conference in June.
