INTERNATIONAL CENTER AT THE UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA, SAN DIEGO TO HOST 12TH ANNUAL STUDY-ABROAD FAIR, QUEST INTERNATIONAL '97

Representatives from more than 50 international study programs will meet with students, faculty, and community members Oct. 24 when the International Center at the University of California, San Diego presents Quest International '97.

In its 12th year, the annual study-abroad fair will be held from 9:45 a.m. to 3 p.m. on the university's Library Walk, a major campus pedestrian thoroughfare.

The theme of this year's Quest is A Journey of a Thousand Miles Begins with a Single Step. Its purpose is to increase awareness of international opportunities in general, as well as to provide students and community members with specific information about the many study, work, travel, and internship programs available.

UCSD's Quest International is one of 13 study-abroad fairs being held this fall on campuses throughout California. More than 1,000 are expected to attend the International Center's event here.

Joan Adamo, UCSD's Quest International '97 coordinator, says more than 500 students took part in international programs in 1996-97, many of them receiving their information about the variety of overseas options at the Quest fair.

Exhibitors represent a wide range of study-abroad opportunities sponsored by United States and foreign universities and study programs. These include Boston University, Butler University, Syracuse University, the American College in London, Tel Aviv University, the University of Kent at Canterbury, Semester at Sea, the American Institute for Foreign Study, the Denmark International Study Program, and the UC Education Abroad Program (EAP).

Intensive language and special internship programs will be represented, along with opportunities for paid and volunteer overseas work programs. These include the Peace Corps and Third World Opportunities.

The International Center will also hold an International Cafe luncheon from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. The cafe's \$2.50 luncheon is a regular Friday feature of the International Center, sponsored each week by a different campus or community organization or business. The public is invited.
