Please find attached three (3) copies of the above Report, together with F.O.J. and Sitrep No.1 claims for Camping Allowance have been processed at this Office. Mr. Fearn has been advised that only one copy of the Report is required by District HQ, and that 3 copies of SITREPs are required, at HQ, and one at SDHQ.

The peoples' attitudes to Self Government follow a familiar Highlands pattern, and at the time of writing this memo no activity of an unusual nature has been reported by Mr. Fearn.

It is Mr. Fearn's view, and mine, that health services in NOMANE are adequate, providing the deficiencies from KIARI and NOMANE make regular patrols. Dr NAD has been advised of the present situation.

As you know, there was some resentment towards the Council when Tax Rates were increased earlier this year. Most of this resentment was concentrated in the YOBA I area: it has now largely disappeared. Some dissatisfaction has been expressed regarding the slow progress of the Council: the people need more education on the finiteness of Council financial resources. On balance, the attitude to the Council continues to be favourable.

Now that we have had a favourable response from the people in regard to the KAIMUI Road, we now await only the services of a surveyor.

I fully endorse Mr. Fearn's comments regarding Patrol equipment: a large quantity will be needed, as apart from the requirements of Senior Officers, there will need to be a personal issue to each TPO whilst they are in the Sub-District for training purposes.

Mr. Fearn gives an up to date picture of NOMANE conditions, and the length of the Report is quite adequate for a Patrol of this duration.

Subject: **CULT ACTIVITIES**

During the course of my patrol it was brought to my attention that certain "cult" activities had started in the Nomane Census Division and in the Yowai, Waure and Kiari areas in particular. The information, such as it is, was verified by the Rev. E. Heumueller, Lutheran Mission, Nomane, who had also heard of these activities during a Communion patrol conducted the week previous.


The activities, at the moment, are small and limited to the areas mentioned above. It would appear that the cult revolves around the passing of money from one line to another at singsings. These singsings are arranged especially for the cult purpose and are not for any traditional ceremony such as bride payment. The explanation as to how the money "grows" is not clear and when I questioned the councillors from Yowai, Waure and Kiari, they were either reluctant to tell me or they did not know themselves.

It seems that during the last month to six weeks there have been at least two parties of men from the Kilimbari Census Division who have crossed the Wahgi and given the people of the area instruction in the method of increasing their money. There is also something connected with self-government in the story but, again, this aspect was not clear.

I have investigated the matter and it seems that it is only a small scale activity and could possibly die out when the people on this side of the river realise that nothing of a great financial return will come out of it. However, I suggest that the Department Officers at Chuave make inquiries on their side of the river.

The people's worries about self-government were voiced during the patrol and these fears could possibly add fuel to the fire as far as this cult is concerned, but when the full story of self-government was explained to them the people did seem to be relieved that nothing vile was going to overtake them and that the Australian involvement in the Administration was not going to vapourise on 1st December bolstered their confidence in the Government.

I will keep an ear open for any further developments and will report them as necessary, but do not anticipate any large scale activities.





PATROL REPORT NO. 1 OF 1973/74

The purpose of this patrol was not to make contact in any great depth, but to familiarise myself with the area and to deal with any problems and questions the people might have concerning the work of the Administration or the Salt Nomane Local Government Council. To facilitate matters, I have grouped the topics under subject headings.

HEALTH:

There are two aid-posts covering the Nomane Census Division - one at Nomane and the other at Kiari. When I inspected the one at Nomane it was found that the A.P.O. was absent and had been so for over a week. During that time a child was brought for attention but, as there was none available, was returned to the village and subsequently died. Whether or not the child would have died if he had received treatment is, of course, conjecture, but the fact that the A.P.O. was absent for such a long period (nine days, in fact) cannot be ignored. The man, KUA, when questioned later, said that he had accompanied a patient to Gumine on 22nd October and had remained there for a week to collect his pay. The people's dissatisfaction with him came not only from Nomane, but from Gerema too. They say that they were quite happy with KEBIL, but that he was transferred to Yobai, and that they would like him moved back to Nomane. Whether or not KEBIL is sent back, I feel that KUA should be severely punished for his dereliction of duty as his absence blatantly contravenes the regulation that they are not to leave their aid-posts, laid down by the District Health Officer, Kundisawa.

At Waisime and Gerema there were calls for aid-posts to be established, but I feel that at present there is no possibility for the Council to build them. However, when the reconstruction of the post at Kiari is finished, both it and Nomane will be quite substantial and the orderlies from there could service Waisime (from Kiari) and Gerema (from Nomane) on regular patrols, perhaps every fortnight or monthly. The people of Waisime and Gerema showed a willingness to assist the orderlies by carrying their cargo and medicines when necessary. At a later date, aid-posts could be considered by the Council.

Nomane aid-post is in good condition, but that at Kiari is very poor. However, the Council has allocated \$1,000 in the estimates for this financial year for the building of a new post and this work should be finished by next year. This new post would give the orderly there an incentive to be more conscientious, thereby giving the people better service.

Both centres complained that they experienced difficulties in obtaining enough of the required medicines although they say that they order in good time from Gumine. This problem is, in part, due to short supply from Kundisawa to Gumine.

MALARIA SERVICES:

At all rest houses the people said that they wanted the Malaria Services to come and spray their houses. They said that it was a number of years since the last spraying patrol. Kiari's A.P.O. reported a prevalence of malaria, but I saw little evidence of this except for one woman who obviously had it. The A.P.O. said that it was the cerebral type and that he could not give her the full treatment as he did not have the correct medicine. Although the area is at between 6,000 and 7,000 feet and would not require an eradication programme, the people called for the teams to spray but I think it is not so much the D.D.T. that they want so much as some attention from Government departments. I understand that a patrol to spray the Salt Nomane area will be mounted shortly and that should give the people some satisfaction.

LABOUR:

At Yobai and Gerema, twenty men from each place said that they wanted to sign up for the Highland Labour Scheme. I have since contacted the H.L.S. centre in Goroka and they advised that they would contact Sub-District Office, Gumine, when there were any vacancies. I understand there is a reluctance to take men from the Chimbu District (Chauve in particular) as they are "troublemakers", but all these men say that they have worked under the scheme before, mainly at Buin and Rabaul, and have completed one contract without incident.

DIES ACTIVITIES:

At Kiari there was a call for the staff of Radio Kundisawa to visit their area to record their traditional stories and songs. In addition they wanted a DIES projectionist to be sent to show them films as they have heard of this practice in other places. A patrol like this would be difficult, but not impossible, to organise and such an effort on the part of the Administration should improve the people's attitude towards the Government at a time when this is so important.

MEMBER OF THE HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY:

At all centres the people made particular point of saying that they had not seen their member, INUABE E'GLANO, since before the 1972 elections. They also said that they were displeased with what they hear he is saying

in the House of Assembly. Whilst I realise that D.D.A. is required to assist M.H.A.'s in disseminate information concerning their work and not to tell the people to take their problems to their member as a stock answer, I do feel that this Member should remember that his electorate is called Karimui NOMANE and that the people want to see him, their representative, on their home ground. I recently asked INUABE if he intended to visit the area and he gave me a vague answer and changed the subject, so I assume that he will not be appearing in the near future. Perhaps he could be informed that getting Government assistance with transport while he is on official business extends to the Administration supplying a car to take him to Nomane as well as the charter from Karimui to Kundiawa. Meanwhile, the people who elected him wait.

SELF-GOVERNMENT:

At Nomane, Yowai, Kiari, Waisime and Gerema the subject of self-government was the first mentioned at all meetings. Nothing new was brought up and the same fears - of all the Europeans going on 1st December, a terrible disease overtaking them, a large clan attacking them, etc. - were all recalled. I explained self-government to them at great length and afterwards answered questions about their fears. They are still afraid that something dreadful is going to happen but are not quite in what form it will come. Although I spoke to them and tried to reassure them on the subject, I feel that they are not, and will not, be convinced until 1st December has come and gone and they can see that things are going on as before. Until this time they will continue to be apprehensive.

COUNCIL ACTIVITIES:

The people's attitude in this area is parochial, to say the least. There is no concern or interest in the rest of the Salt Nomane area. The main topic discussed was the road linking the centres of Yowai, Waure, Kiari, Waisime and Gerema with Nomane - the "Nomane Loop Road". Of course, the people wanted it finished quickly and I saw, in many places, that work has been done in preparation for the Council allocating money. At present there is \$6,000 in the Council's estimates for the Kilau-Nomane-Yowai road and it is hoped that the road will be open to Yowai for vehicular traffic by the end of this financial year. In future years the Council could allocate funds for the loop to be completed, but it will be a fairly long project.

I had previously heard that there was a breakaway movement at Waure and Kiari to join the Lufa Council, but when I questioned the people on this subject there did not seem to be much enthusiasm for the break and they said they would be happy with the Salt Nomane Council if the loop road were to be completed. This, I told them, could be done as money became available, but as the Salt Nomane Council is only small financially, these things would not be accomplished overnight. This answer seemed to be accepted as reasonable but they said they would press their councillors to push for the money to be allocated. This reaction I encouraged as it would be an effort on the part of the people to take an interest.

Aid-posts, too, were mentioned and, as I have said above, the post at Kiari will be up-graded this year. This, together with the post at Nomane, will have to suffice for the next few years as there are many other more important projects for the Council to undertake first. If the A.P.O.'s make patrols to the centres without posts at regular intervals, then there should be a coverage that would be adequate, if not up to the desirable standard.

Another call was for the Council to buy radios for the people. This may be a good idea in other places, but for the Salt Nomane Council it would be an expense that could be put to better use elsewhere. There would also be the problems of who would look after the sets, who would buy the replacement batteries when the initial ones ran flat? The Council, the councillors, the people? Perhaps consideration could be given later to this project but at the moment should be shelved. Another point is, of course, that the price of radios in stores is hardly prohibitive to anyone who is really interested in buying a set and this year's good coffee crop means that most have access to money with which to buy one.

NOMANE - KARIMUI ROAD:

The subject of a road to Karimui has been talked about for a long time and, at last, seems to be imminent. The exact route has not yet been surveyed and it has been mentioned that a D.D.A. officer should undertake this. As this is such a big project, I think that a professional surveyor should be engaged to do the work accompanied by a D.D.A. officer. There are two or three possible routes and steps should be taken soon to choose one so that the people can plant gardens which would be required to feed the labour lines doing the construction. The matter of planting gardens was broached and the people seemed favourable to this suggestion. It is now a matter of choosing the site for the road.

GENERAL:

The patrol was generally well received and the rest-houses at Nomane, Yowai, Kiari, Waisime and Gerema were in good condition, however, at Kiari the police house and toilets had to be rebuilt on arrival as were the toilets at Waisime. The rest house and police house, etc., at Waure were non-existent and the patrol by-passed Waure in favour of Kiari. The councillor at Waure said he would build a new camp in time for the next patrol, but it seems that was what he said to Mr. Showell last time.

At all centres there was quite a good crowd at the meetings and a satisfactory amount of interest was shown. A number of persons approached me privately later concerning a number of subjects and most seemed to take in the information given.

The patrol was accompanied by three constables of the R.P.N.G.C. but as the routine of the patrol was not disrupted by any untoward events their duties were minimal. However, one would hope that the two younger members will improve after this patrol as most of the work was done by Const. KAUPA, but I should point out that one was only on his first patrol and other on his second.

Patrol equipment in the Gumeine sub-district is virtually non-existent and if Headquarters expects further patrols to be mounted, they should take immediate steps to remedy the situation by making funds available for the purchase of equipment, especially pressure lamps, Primus stoves and spare parts.

As I mentioned at the beginning, this was a familiarisation patrol and it is hoped to visit the area again after Christmas for a much longer period.



INTRODUCTION:

The area covered in this patrol was the Daribe Census Division. The patrol covered a total of 8 rest houses in the area. The patrol team consisted of the writer, Constable Sulat, Guri Aina (Interpreter) and 3 members of the finance committee.

Purpose of the patrol was to collect Bonai-Mikaru Council Tax for 1973/1974 financial year, Secondly to hold discussions about the functions of councils and other general administration matters.

TAX COLLECTIONS:

The tax rate for 1973/1974 financial year is 5/-00 for male persons only. The tax collections went through smoothly without any major complaints or difficulties. People reacted very well to tax collections. Everyone eligible paid their tax. Further details discussed in the situation Report No.1.

DISCUSSIONS ON FUNCTIONS OF COUNCILS:

At various rest houses, discussions were held about the functions of councils with the aim of passing onto the village people and their representatives some hints or ideas in respect of the work of councils. People were urged to co-operate and support their council. It was pointed out to them that this council (Bonai-Mikaru Council) does not belong to other people - it is their council. Although council is a new thing to them, they showed keen interests to have a council in their area and hoping to see how the council operates.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION:(a) HIGHLANDS LABOUR SCHEME:

Throughout the patrol, young men requested for jobs in plantations. This matter was attended to after the completion of the patrol. See also Situation Report No.2.

DISPUTES:

There was hardly any major disputes confronted during the patrol. However, there were only few minor matters over women and pigs. These were settled without any further disturbances. People seemed to be happy in their day to day living.

REST HOUSES & WALKING TRACKS:

Rest houses are in good condition and kept maintained accordingly. Walking tracks are also in good condition.

In conclusion, the patrol achieved its tasks without any difficulties. Village people and councillors contributed great help to the patrol.

Subject: REACTIONS TO TAX COLLECTIONS

Throughout the patrol, people reacted very well to tax collections. Those eligible (that is male persons who is 18 years and over should pay council tax of \$1-00) paid their tax without any complaints. Those who did not have money to pay the council tax were either helped by friends or relatives to pay off their tax.

It was explained to the people that their tax money is not for the government use or some other people. Their tax money will be spent within their areas for economic developments and so on. Points were also stressed to the people that they should co-operate with their council and pay their tax if they want such things as school, airports, roads, bridges etc..

I'd like to suggest that these people will be happy with the low tax rate imposed and if the council imposes higher tax rates, these people will confront difficulties to be able to pay tax. The Daribe people, especially will find difficulties to meet the higher tax rates if such impose by the council. Plus the fact that these people do not have extensive cash - carrying e.g. coffee compared to the rest of the Chisima people. These people own very small coffee gardens and thus encounters problems for them to be able to sell their products because there is no business companies operating inside the Daribe Census Division.


Subject: HIGHLAND LABOUR SCHEME

Whilst on patrol young men complained to me that they find it hard to earn money and requested that they should find jobs in plantations. They also complained that people from other areas of the district are much better off with cash earnings and not them. This matter was attended to after the completion of the patrol.

Requests for plantation labourers were put forward to the Labour Department, Goroka and the people were sent to various plantations.

After the few recruits were sent to Goroka, the M.H.A Inuake Sguiano complained that people from Karimui should not join the Highland Labour Scheme.

I pointed out to the M.H.A. that it was not my wish to send people to join the H.L.S. but it was entirely the people themselves. I pointed out to the M.H.A. that the people requested to find work in the plantations and therefore I had to meet their demands. On the whole these people will probably be better off if they join the H.L.S. in order to earn money and later on return to their respective areas and help develop their areas.
