According to press reports, Governor Pete Wilson met with Senator David Roberti to advise him that, based upon the demands of the Initial Court of Appeal, the Administration would not initiate additional, time consuming adjudicatory hearings before making a decision on the pending application for a low-level waste disposal site at Ward Valley. The focus now moves to Washington and to Secretary of Interior Bruce Babbitt. Ward Valley, in the Mojave Valley, is federal land and must be transferred to the California Department of Health Services, before it can be allocated to the waste site.
