

Four UCSD faculty members selected to appear in the 1974-1975 edition of "Outstanding Educators in America"

Four University of California, San Diego faculty members have been selected to appear in the 1974-75 edition of "Outstanding Educators in America." They are: Dr. Frederick G. Bailey, Professor of Anthropology; Dr. Murray Goodman, Professor of Chemistry and Acting Provost of Revelle College; Dr. Katja L. Lindenberg, Assistant Professor of Chemistry; and Dr. Edward Reynolds, Assistant Professor of History.

The four were nominated earlier this year and selected on the basis of their professional and civic achievements. The annual awards program honors teachers for their "exceptional. service, achievements, and leadership in the field of education."

Nominations for the program. are made by officials of colleges and universities throughout the United States. The selection guidelines include the educator's effectiveness in the classroom, contributions to research, administrative abilities, civic service, and professional recognition.

Bailey joined the UCSD faculty as Visiting Professor of Anthropology in 1970 after serving for six years as Professor of Social Anthropology at the University of Sussex, England. He received B.A. and M.A. degrees - from Oxford University and a Ph.D. in anthropology from Manchester University (England) in 1954. Through his research in anthropology, particularly political anthropology, Bailey has carried out three separate expeditions in India and two expeditions to Cuneo, Italy. His work has resulted in the publication of four books. He was awarded the S. C. Roy memorial gold medal for distinguished services to Indian anthropology in 1958.

Goodman, a member of the UCSD faculty for three years, was named Acting Provost of Revelle College by the University Board of Regents in July, 1972. He served as Director of the Polymer Research Institute at the Polytechnic Institute of Brooklyn for three and one-half years before coming to San Diego. His research interests have been centered in the fields of polymer, organic and biological chemistry. He has written more than 100 papers dealing with his field of study and is the author of an undergraduate textbook on organic chemistry.

Lindenberg, a member of the UCSD faculty since 1969, served as a research associate and part-time assistant professor at the University of Rochester for two years before coming to San Diego. She received a B.A. degree in mathematics from Alfred University in 1962 and a Ph.D. in theoretical physics from Cornell University in 1967. She was awarded an Oak Ridge Associate Universities travel grant in 1970 and a National Science Foundation research grant in 1972. She was named to receive a Revelle College excellence in teaching award at UCSD last year.

Reynolds, a member of the history faculty since January, 1971, served as an instructor and lecturer in history in a number of eastern colleges and universities before coming to UCSD. He graduated from high school in Accra, Ghana, West Africa in 1961. He received a B.A. degree cum laude in American history from Wake Forest University and an M.A. degree in American history from Ohio University. Reynolds studied for three years at the Yale University Divinity School and later at the University of London School of Oriental and African Studies in London, England, where he received a Ph.D. in African history in 1972.

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
