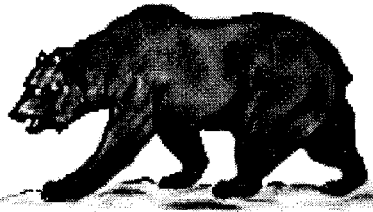

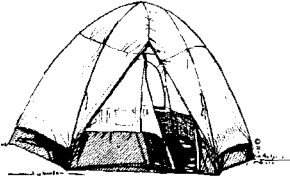

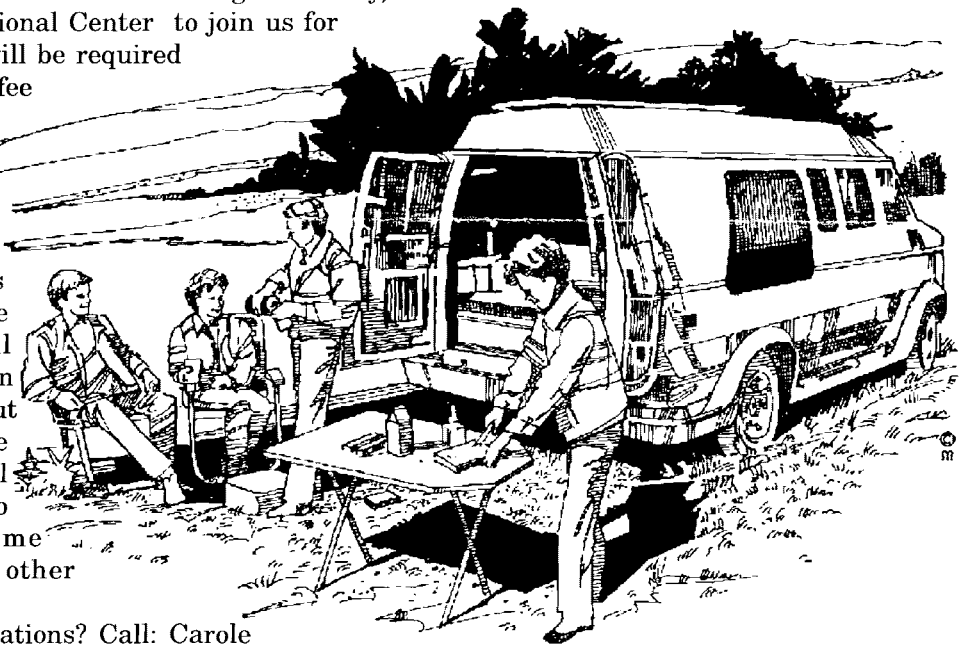
## Newcomers ANNUAL DESERT TRIP TO ANZA BORREGO

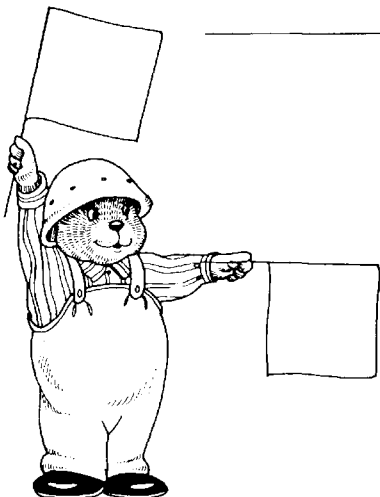

**She may speak at one of our special events in the near future. If not, we will have an article in *Bear Facts* about her talk.**

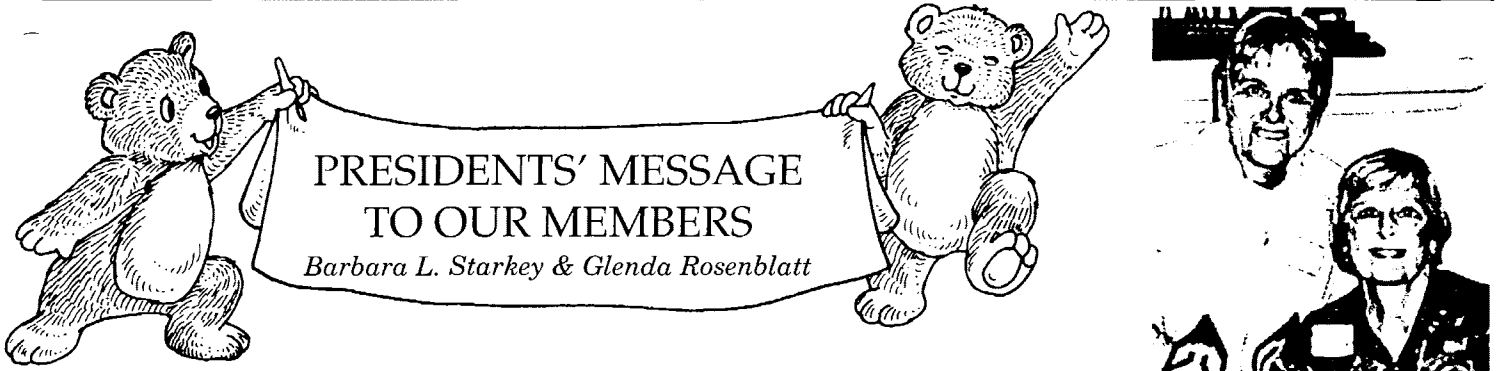
## NOMINATE YOUR FAVORITE VOLUNTEER

This will be an exciting and enjoyable conference, with

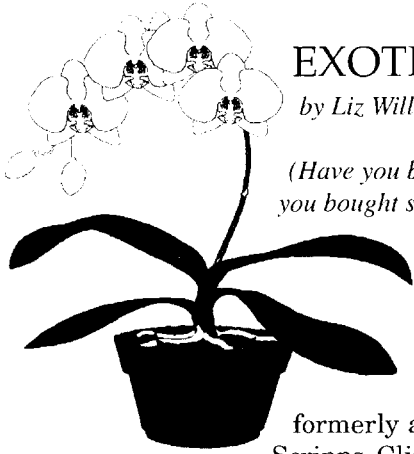

The owner of the Del Mar Orchid Ranch is Dr. George Hwang, formerly a radiation oncologist at Scripps Clinic. He left the area to start a Dept. of Oncology at a brand new hospital in Taiwan. Dr. Hwang returned here after eight years because he missed his adult kids. He has kindly agreed to speak to us about his passion — orchids!

Although I have been going to lectures at Walter Anderson for years, I learned so much in my brief conversation with Dr. Hwang that I can hardly wait to hear him again.

His goal is to produce Adelaide quality orchids at

reasonable prices. He raises mostly phals and supplies stores such as 99 Ranch Market. Although there are only a limited number of orchid varieties to see, we will learn a great deal about repotting orchids and their daily care.

Depending on how many questions we ask, we may have time to visit another orchid nursery afterwards. We will have lunch at a funky Mexican restaurant that has the best tortilla soup!

## FORMER UCSD PHYSICS PROFESSOR WINS NOBEL PRIZE

Dr. Walter Kohn came to UCSD in 1960 and helped organize the physics department; later the Judaic studies program. Leaving UCSD in 1979, Kohn became the first director of the National Science Foundation's Institute for Theoretical Physics, in Santa Barbara. At present he is a professor at UC Santa Barbara.

Kohn's work in density-functional theory, a simplified way of describing with mathematics the bonds between atoms in a molecule, earned him this prestigious honor. He was able to show that the total energy of an atomic or molecular configuration could be calculated from the density of electrons at all places within it. Says Kohn, "I think science is one of the great crowns of the human race."

Kohn's work has enabled scientists to study large molecules that previously were too complex and unwieldy to understand.

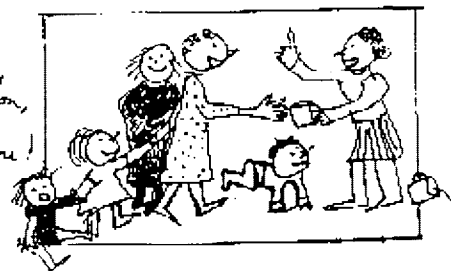

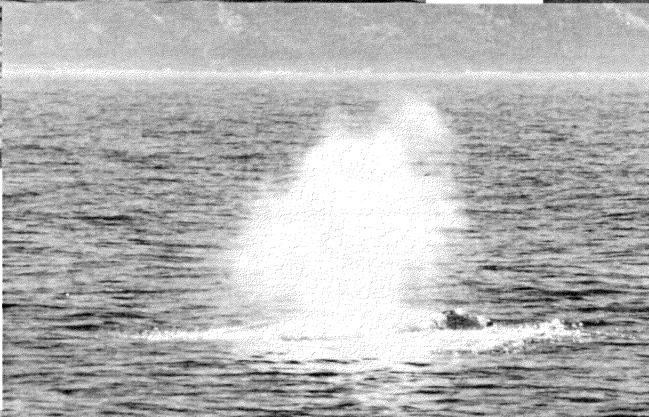
Bait is caught at sea and brought to holding tanks in Quivira Basin, Mission Bay, for purchase by fishermen.

## WINTER BIRDING IN THE SAN DIEGO RIVER FLOOD CONTROL CHANNEL

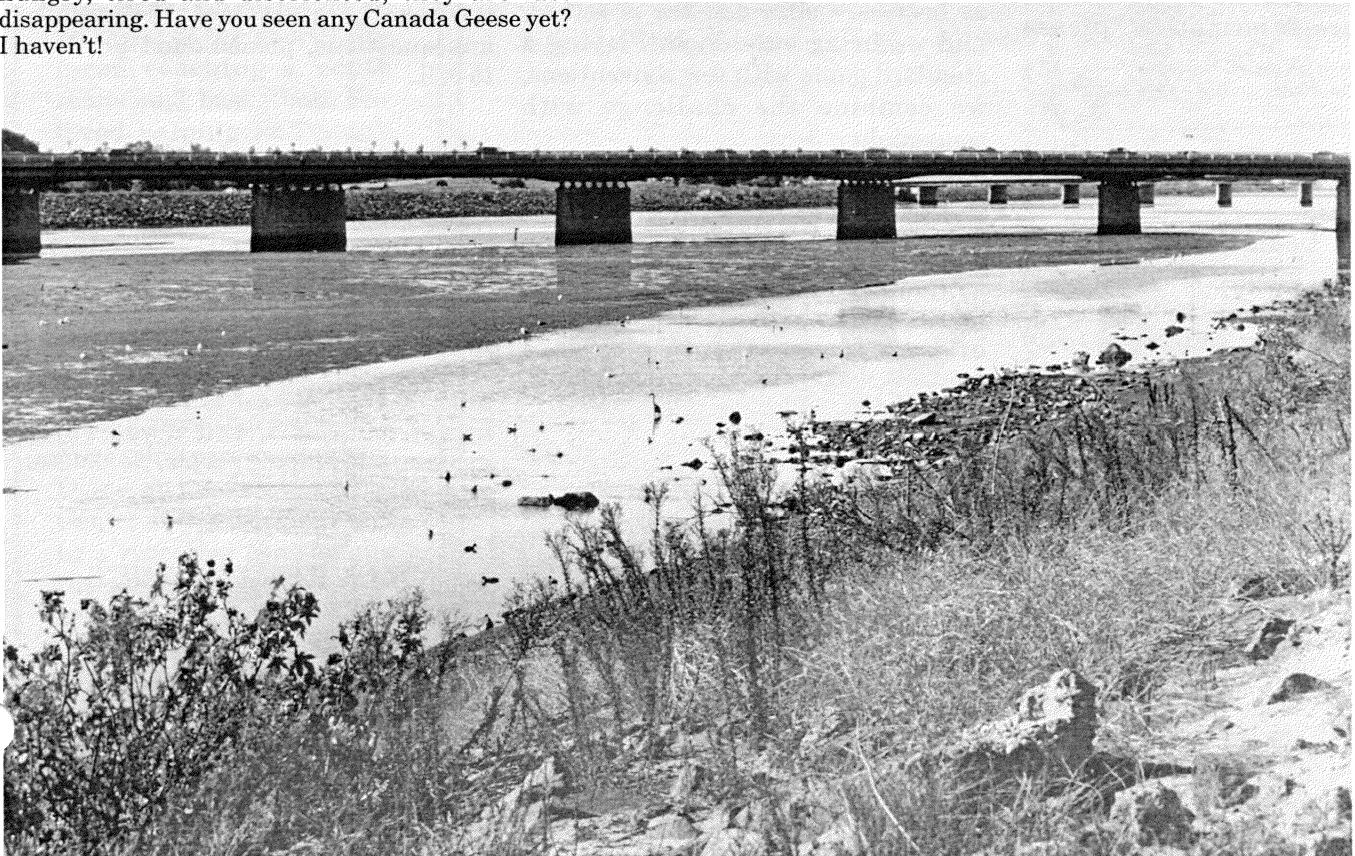
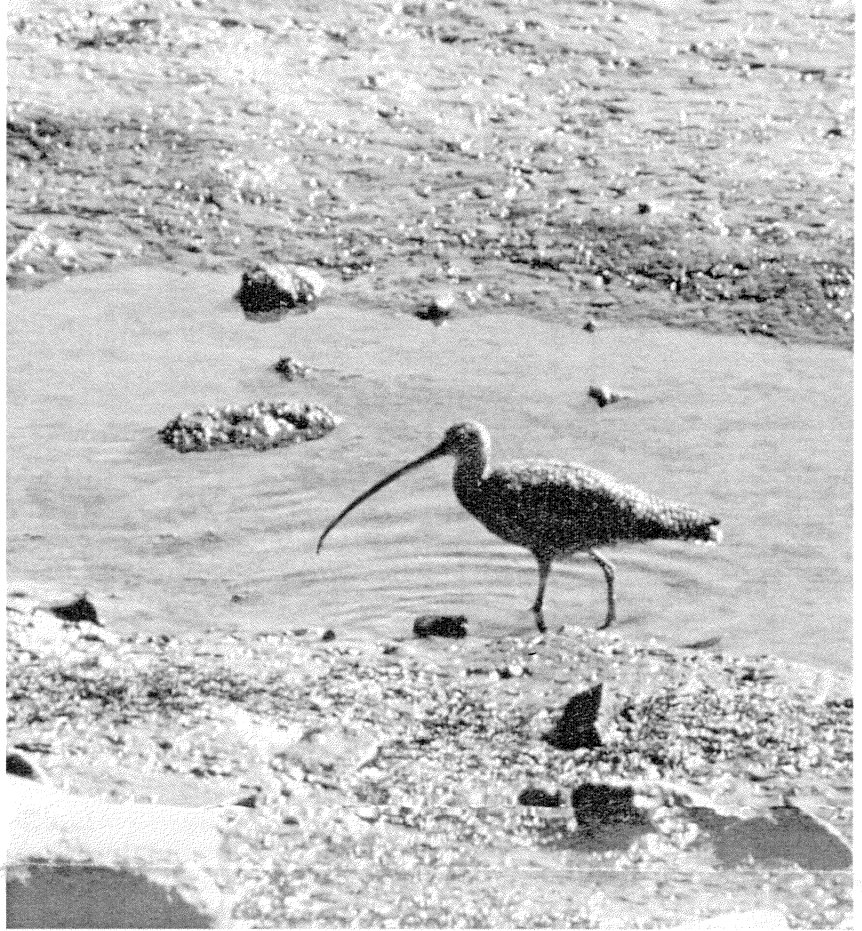

San Diego is fortunate to be in the Pacific Flyway and just south of Sea World is one of the most wonderful places to watch birds, both migrants and resident. There is a small road which runs alongside the channel on the north side where you can stop and enjoy.

I stopped after our whale watching trip and got a rarely seen look at several Long-billed Curlews. There were American Avocets, Black-necked stilts, Lesser Yellow Legs, Willets, a multitude of Sandpipers, and many small ducks including the Bufflehead and Pintail. Try it at low tide and you'll be as thrilled as I was.

Raptors rely on the Ramona area grasslands where I live. See many species around the Rangeland/Highland Valley Rd. areas throughout the winter months – Golden & Bald Eagles, Ferruginous & Red-tailed Hawks, Peregrine & Prairie Falcons, Merlins and others.

Places like these are essential stops for the hungry, tired and disoriented; they are fast disappearing. Have you seen any Canada Geese yet? I haven't!

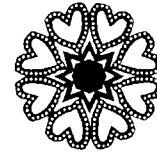
