

Dr. Daniel Steinberg is PILS lecturer

Dr. Daniel Steinberg, professor of medicine at the School of Medicine, University of California, San Diego, will give the last lecture for the winter quarter in the Professors' Inaugural Lecture Series at 4:15 p.m. on Thursday, March 13, in the Humanities-Library Auditorium, Revelle College.

Dr. Steinberg's topic will be "Bad Genes, Sick People and Biochemistry."

He joined UCSD last year, after spending 17 years at the National Heart Institute in Bethesda, Md. A graduate of Wayne University College of Medicine, he completed his internship at Boston City Hospital and his residency at Detroit Receiving Hospital.

Dr. Steinberg was a Postdoctoral. Fellow of the National Institutes of Health and a Fellow of the American Cancer Society. He obtained a Ph.D. with distinction from the Harvard Medical School, Department of Biological Chemistry.

He teaches an introduction to clinical medicine and courses in organ physiology-pharmacology and participates in clinical teaching in metabolic diseases.

Dr. Steinberg's research interests center around lipid and lipoprotein metabolism. His administrative and academic at UCSD include: program director for Basic Sciences in Medicine, chairman of the Organ Physiology-Pharmacology Course, chairman of the Faculty Research Committee and member of the Graduate Council and the Council of Chairmen of the School of Medicine.

He is chairman of the Council on Arteriosclerosis of the American Heart Association and a member of many organizations including the Advisory Board of the Journal of Lipid Research, the Governing Board of Methods in Medical Research, the American Association for the Advancement of Science and the American Physiological Society.

The lecture, presented by the UCSD Committee for Arts and Lectures, will be free and open to the public.
