

Dr. William Bartley, III, Associate Professor of Philosophy

Dr. William Warren Bartley III, formerly a Lecturer in the History of the Philosophy of Science at the University of London, has joined the faculty of the University of California, San Diego, as Associate Professor of Philosophy, it has been announced by University President Clark Kerr and San Diego Chancellor John Galbraith.

Dr. Bartley began his duties at UCSD January 4.

He joined the faculty of the University of London in 1960, lecturing in the Warburg Institute and the London School of Economics and Political Sciences of the University. He received his Ph.D. in logic and scientific method from the University of London in 1962.

Dr. Bartley studied piano, organ and harmony at the Grogan School of Music in Pittsburgh and art at the Carnegie Institute School of Art in Pittsburgh before getting his undergraduate degree in philosophy at Harvard University. He received an A.M. degree in philosophy from the Harvard Graduate School in 1957.

Dr. Bartley, a member of Phi Beta Kappa, and former Editorial Chairman of The Harvard Crimson, has held several special lectureships including one at the Royal Institute of Philosophy in London. He has served as Visiting Associate Professor of Philosophy at the University of California, Berkeley, and at the University of Illinois.

In 1958 he won the Francis Brown prize for "the best essay in moral or political philosophy," at Harvard University and from 1958 to 1960 he studied in England on a Fulbright scholarship.

He is an associate editor and a member of the board of directors of History and Theory, and a former member of the executive committee of the British Society for the Philosophy of Science. He is the author of the book, *The Retreat to Commitment*, and has published numerous articles on the subjects of philosophy, religion, and science.
