

Three seniors at UCSD named Woodrow Wilson Designates

Three seniors at the University of California, San Diego have been named Woodrow Wilson Designates and two others have been named to the Honorable Mention list by the Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation. The winners, selected through competition and interview, are considered as among the best future college teachers on the continent.

A total of 1,106 students, representing 349 colleges in the United States and Canada, were named as designates and 1,111 others received Honorable Mention classification. Nearly 12,000 students were nominated for the competition last October.

A list of the Designates has been sent to all graduate school deans in the United States and Canada with the recommendation that the graduate schools make fellowship awards to these students. The deans will also receive a list of the Honorable Mention winners.

The three UCSD Designates and their fields of study are: Patricia A. Benefiel, daughter of Cdr. and Mrs. O. W. Benefiel of Chula Vista, philosophy; Henry H. Knapp III, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry H. Knapp of Los Angeles, physics; and Charles H. Seiter, son of Mrs. Sheila Seiter of San Diego, physical chemistry.

The two seniors named to the Honorable Mention list and their fields of study are: David W. Cunningham, son of Dr. and Mrs. Bernard Cunningham of Del Mar, chemistry and philosophy; and Albert T. Smith Jr., son of Capt. and Mrs. Albert T. Smith of La Jolla, physical oceanography or geophysics.
