MEET THE PHILOSOPHY DEPARTMENT

Nine graduate students have just begun their courses in the new philosophy department at UCSD. When Avrum Stroll and Jason Saunders agreed to join Richard Popkin in establishing the department, the possibility of beginning the program this fall became a reality.

Jason Saunders, a native of Boston, attended Tufts College and Columbia University. His special interest is in Stoic philosophy from classical to contemporary manifestations. Last year he served as Visiting Professor at the Claremont Graduate School in Claremont, Calif., on leave from a long-term appointment at the University of North Carolina. His wife Juliet, a New Yorker, is a writer who has published a number of short stories. The Saunders have two children, Mitchell, 12, and Rachel, 7, and are living at 8471 Sugarman Drive.

Avrum Stroll is originally from Oakland, California. His training in philosophy was at UC Berkeley. Currently he is most interested in contemporary linguistic philosophy, philosophy of religion and ethics. He has taught at Berkeley, Oregon, Iowa, and has been at the University of British Columbia for 11 years. In 1961-62 he held a Nuffield Fellowship for study in England. Mary Stroll was a graduate student in history at the University of Iowa when she met Av. Since then, as Mrs. Stroll she has become the mother of Teddy, 7, and Betsy, 6. Their present home is at 7687 Hillside Drive.

Richard Popkin, a New Yorker, studied at Columbia and Yale. His chief philosophical interests lie in the history of philosophy, especially from the 16th-18th centuries, and his writing and research have been most concerned with the history of skepticism. Most recently he taught at Harvey Nudd College and the Claremont Graduate School; before that at the University of Iowa, at Berkeley, and Connecticut. He has held two Research Fulbrights, one at Paris and one at Utrecht in The Netherlands. His wife, Julie, is a teacher currently working on a doctorate in English Literature. The Popkins have three children, Jerry, 14, Margaret, 13, and Susie, 2. They are living at 9528 Poole Street.

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The Chairman of the Department of Literature is Dr. Roy Harvey Pearce. Dr. Pearce received his B.A. and M.A. degrees from UCLA and his PhD from Johns Hopkins University in 1945. He has taught at Johns Hopkins, Berkeley, and Ohio State, and was a Fulbright Lecturer at the University of Bordeaux in 1962-63. He has written a number of books, and one might say that his special interest is contemporary American poetry. His wife, Marie, studied Bacteriology and Public Health. The Pearce's have two children, Joanne, 12, and Robert, 10. Their home is at 6465 Avenida Wilfredo.

Working with Dr. Pearch is Dr. Andrew Wright, who received his A.B. from Harvard and his PhD from Ohio State. He has taught at Ohio State since 1947 and has been the recipient of a Fulbright Fellowship to University College, London, in 1951-52, a Fulbright Senior Research Fellowship to University College in 1960-61, and a Guggenheim Fellowship in 1961-62. His books include Jane Austen's Novels, Joyce Carv: A Preface to His Novels, and Selective Bibliography for the Study of English and American Literature. He and his wife Virginia and their two children, Matthew, 3, and Emma, 1, reside at 7134 Olivetas Street.

Dr. Sigurd Burckhardt, a native of Germany, received his B.A. and M.A. degrees in English from UC Berkeley and his PhD in German from Ohio State. He taught English at St. Mary's College from 1947 to 1953, and since then was a Professor of German at Ohio State. He received a Guggenheim Fellowship 1957-58 to study in Germany. Dr. Burckhardt is particularly interested in the works of Shakespear, Goethe, and Kleist. His wife Peggy has also studied English, and she did some editorial work while they were at Ohio State. The Burckhardts have chosen Del Mar as their home and are residing at 539 Fifteenth Street.

At present Linguistics is a part of the Literature Department, although eventually it will be a separate department. The first Professor of Linguistics on our campus is Dr. Leonard D. Newmark, whose activities have included studies of the Albanian language and teaching Panjabi, a language of Pakistan, to Peace Corps volunteers. Aside from books on these two languages, Dr. Newmark is co-author of A Linguistic Introduction to the History of the English Language and Using American English (both in press). He received his B.A. from University of Chicago and his M.A. and PhD from Indiana. He was a member of the staff of Ohio State University from 1957 to 1962, when he returned to teach at Indiana. His wife, Ruth, received her M.A. in German and has taught at Indiana University, Ohio State, and Ohio Wesleyan.
