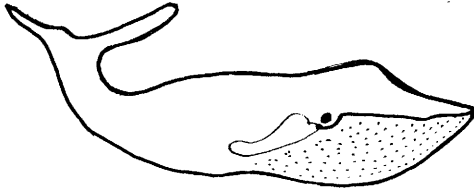

My most admired and loved relatives go by really keen names: Balaenoptera physalus, the Fin Whale; Eubalaena glacialis, the Right Whale; Megaptera novaeangliae, the Humped whale; and so on and so forth.

Could you produce 120 gallons of milk and apply it to your baby in some 40 feedings a day? Hardly. But Balaenoptera musculus, the Blue Whale cow, does this for her calf, which then gains 8½ pounds each hour during the first 6 months of its life! And mama whale does more. Immediately after delivery, she rushes her baby top side for its first breath of air. Later among other lessons, she teaches her baby how to breathe in a gale.

Mammals we are, all of us, except whales somehow seem to be more so. A long time ago they left the land for the ocean, while we (and oh how I regret this) probably passed them on the beach, going the other way. Does that make them smarter than we? If brain size has anything to do with it, the answer is yes. Whales have bigger brains than we do in proportion to body weight.

Do we humans feel any kinship? A bond? Indeed we do. We like to think that we are not the only thinking and intelligent animals around. Whales live in families the way we do. Whales frolic and cavort in the moonlight the way some of us like to. Whales care for one another in time of trouble, support each other when hurt. They appear to have a weird sounding language which we do not yet understand. We do know that whales have been very successful surviving in a forbidding environment.

Come tectonic shuffling, come ice age, come holocaust, I'm betting they will survive, and I feel no sadness for the passing of humans. Whales simply do not rival humans in destructiveness towards other species or the environment.

POEM AT THE YEAR'S END

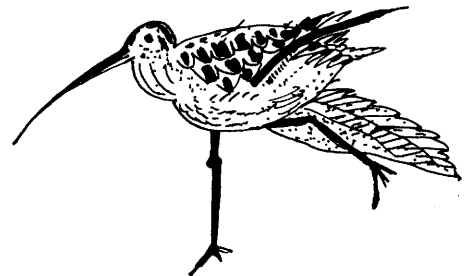
We hardly noticed it,

In February, we plan a trip to downtown San Diego to tour the new Federal Court House and Gas Light area with lunch at a nearby restaurant.

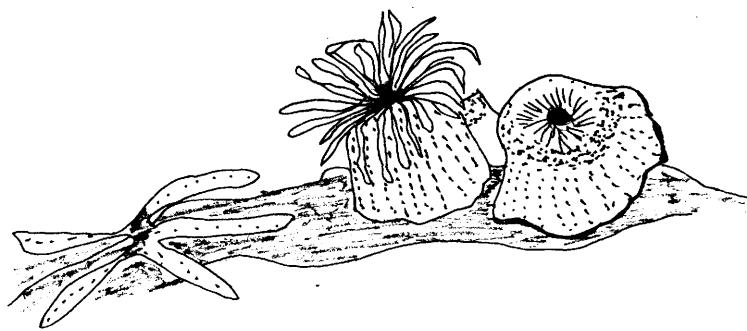

PROFILES: UCSD WOMEN

ROSALIE WEINBERGER: OCEANIDS BUSINESSWOMAN

Rosalie Weinberger: energetic, sociable, adventuresome. When, not if, she reaches one hundred, she will still be peddling her bike to the beach, gathering a foursome for bridge, or taking a space ship to the moon - by then she will have been everywhere else. It is not in Rosalie's nature to be a passive member of any organization. She has been president of Oceanids and an innovative participant in several of our interest groups. Whether or not she initiated the original luncheon group, she was instrumental in making the arrangements for the monthly meetings and she is co-chairman with Sally Spiess of that reactivated group. Many of us thank her for arranging bus tours to events of cultural interest in Los Angeles.

Rosalie is a second generation Californian. Her father owned a men's store, founded by her grandfather in 1859 and still operated by her brothers. When she was growing up in Sonora, she took no interest in her father's shop, but his business acumen assuredly rubbed off on her. At UC Berkeley she majored in International Relations with the intention of going into the diplomatic service. Rosalie is a consummate homemaker and

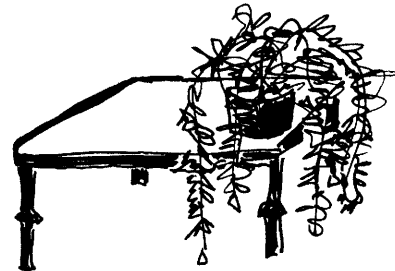

Rosalie opened Stitchery Galore in 1970 with characteristic élan. CREOLE DINNER

Having featured foreign cuisine for four years, the Friends of the International Center are beginning the new year on a patriotic note. On Sunday, January 23, the Friends will offer a Creole dinner under the able direction of Avis Johnson, for many years chef at University House. Helping her will be Adelaide Booker, whose parents stem from the Sea Islands off the coast of South Carolina. Adelaide has inherited a treasure of Creole recipes. She will share with us such delicacies as home-made sesame seed crackers, rum punch, possibly a shrimp jambalaya, and a light charlotte for dessert. Due to busy holiday schedules, Mrs. Johnson and Mrs. Booker have not yet worked out details of the menu, but promise to live up to the high standards set by previous Friends' dinners.

Creole cookery still flourishes in large parts of the South, particularly in New Orleans. It is a gastronomic blend of French, Spanish, Anglo-Saxon and Indian influences as interpreted by Southern cooks using local ingredients, such as seafood, okra, and sassafras for seasoning. Some typical dishes are rice-based jambalaya; gumbo, half soup, half stew; bread pudding made of French bread soaked in bourbon; and coffee brewed with chicory.

In keeping with the American theme, Program Chairman Jean Karlen has arranged a musical presentation following dinner featuring native composers. Soprano Katherine Campbell will sing a selection of works by Charles Ives and Steven Foster. She will be accompanied on the piano by Bill Hayes. Both Miss Campbell and Mr. Hayes are talented undergraduate students in the Music Department at UCSD. Miss Campbell participated in the Aspen Opera Workshop this summer and is the recipient of a UC President's Scholarship.

As usual the dinner will be held at 6 PM at the International Center. Cost for the evening is \$6.50 for Friends' members, \$7.50 for non-members. 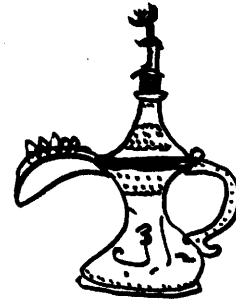

THE AZTEC TWO-STEP
OR
TRAVELER'S DIARRHEA

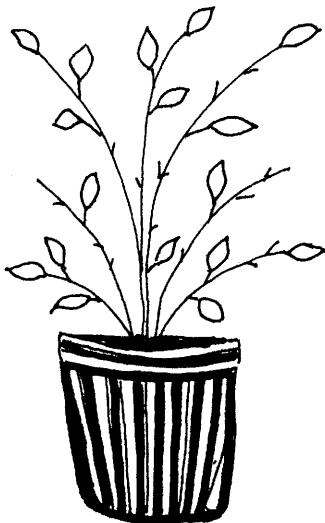
A recent study (M.H. Merson et al, New England Journal of Medicine, 294:1299, June 10, 1976), performed on 73 physicians and their families attending the Fifth World Congress of Gastroenterology in Mexico City, resulted in identifying enterotoxigenic *E. coli* as the most common (49%) pathogen in traveler's diarrhea. Other pathogens found included *Salmonella*, evasive *E. coli*, reovirus-like agents, and *Shigellae*.

The prophylactic administration of antimicrobials (streptomycin, neomycin, etc.) may have undesirable consequences including allergic and toxic reactions that may be more disturbing than the potential diarrhea. Also, the current belief is, that unless the case is severe, antimicrobial treatment is not recommended.

It was found in this study that this illness was not significantly associated with eating raw vegetables and unpeeled fruits or drinking water and iced beverages. However, the patients with *E. coli* had a history of eating salads containing raw vegetables. The recommendation is still to eat only cooked foods and peeled fruit, and to avoid tap water and ice in areas with poor sanitation.

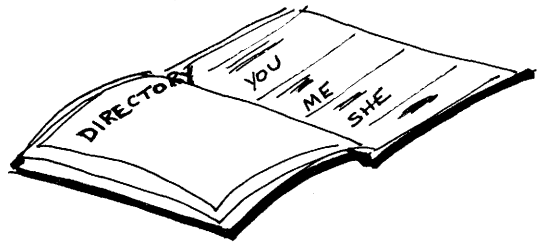

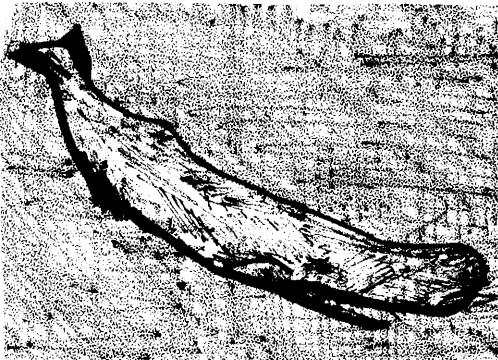


TWELFTH NIGHT SERVICES
