

END OF DIARY.

Maria Land

The patrol had as its main objective the establishment of a Patrol Post at Sissano to strengthon administration contact with the large numbers of goods returning from west Irian to Sissano and worspu villages. The patrol first established itself at Sissano village on the 4th august, 1564 and details or contact have been delt with in severate correspondence throughout the period.

On Hovember 3rd, after three months at Sissano, I proceeded to visit all villages in the Sissano area. These included all the visite and villages of the Altape wast Coast Census Division with western villages of the Altape wast Coast Census Division with the villages of Arog and Fo forming the Bastern boundary of the group and the Western villages of the Altape wast Coast Inland Census Division, with the village of Rengish as the most Seatern village of the group. In all five villages of the West Coast Census bivision and sixteen villages of the West Coast Inland Census Division were contacted.

All transport throughout the West Coast Inland is by Toot. was king throughout the area is easy, he southern half of the division consists of low unmulating hills where the tracks tend to follow watersheds and rivers. The worthern parties is flat and inclined to be awang in the wets! agree with previous officers that it would be better to patrol the area in the March-April period rather than in the North-West season when there is every chance-that the patrol could be stranded by the flood that rise in the hoadwaters of the Biri and rivers.

Those villages of the west Coast division visited by the patrol are all mithin easy distance of Sistano, the further of villages of Po to the East and Serra to the West are only three hours away by conce and foot.

OBSERVATIONS AND COMMENTS.

buffing the patrol mich informs ion was gathered for an area study of both the west Coast and west Coast Inland Censis Davisions. This report will not deal with this but a separate report will be submitted as even as the rest of the necessary information has

A marked difference is to be found in the living standard throughout the area. By comparison, those people on the coast enjoy a good standard of living, without any cash crops the average Inland relies on the casual employment he can obtain at Aitage to find the necessary money for tax, etc. Each man spends two weeks at either Aitape or Vanimo. These people are unable to boost their income by the sale of fresh foods to Mission or Administration centres as they are too far away from any market, amail source of income is the sale of pigs to neighbouring groups in the Lumi area. Of the sixteen villages visited only 91 mar were abcent at work. Of these 43 had casual employment for a fewy weeks at either Altage or Vanimo.
The coastal area is closer to markets and the sea and inland

waters offer a ready transport. On the coast 24.5% of the adult labour potential has permanent employment outside the area. The Catholic Mis ion at Sleamno/warpur pay a monthly wages bill of 265/70 to persons from these two villages and spord monthly a further 2,5/50 on the purchase of native rous. The establishment of a pase Camp at Sleamno has resulted in increased local caployment and it is estimated that the people of the spea have bomerited by 2500 over the last five months.

RECEPTION OF PATROL.

. I was most impressed with the way the patrol was received throughout the entire area, a friendly and oncertal google, they are ready and eager to assist in most villages there was always a group of persons around the resthouse waiting to hear the ladic. Radio wast proves attractly popular. VILLAGES.

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i. Standard and type of Housing.

The basic house throughout the area follows the crastal pattern of elevated flooring but the stendard varies considerably and leaves much to by desired. The lowest standard was found at MUNIEU where housing was practically non-existant. This has been restified since the conclusion of the patrol. Other sub-standard housing was found at SAVANI/MEBIAE, EARIE, SUNG, AAFCAR and RANG.

with the exception of PO all villages in the SIAU Local Government Conceil area are failing to maintain a satisfactory standard. AAMI end SULO are the worse, while many houses at SISSANO and WARAPU are below stendard. This is reflected in poor leaderchip from council members the council or at ANSOR (31 sano) doesnot have a house while the councillors at SORURU (warepu) and RANU own the two most dilapicated houses in the area. There is a definate need for a council hygieme/housing councile to take this matter in hear

ii. Advantages and Disadvantages of Village Sites.

BELLE Villege. Mr Van Ruth celt with this village in considerable detail in his fatrol report aitage to 2 of 65/64. Since then a further 27 persons (1) make, 5 female) have migrated out to Fus village in the immonda area, mich I ar aved at Savami I found that the remaining 15 people have moved into this village. They told me they had abandoned the old Rebike sit at the headwaters of the FIV.HU river, a further five hours into a savamai. MANTET VALLEY. Acting on r Van Ruth's recommondations this group have now been transfered to the pant saministrative area.

iii. Water Sup ly.

Mr Van Ruth's comments regarding water supply at RUU are well noted, it has the words supply in the Inland dividion. As yet no improvement has been made but this should be an early item on the SIAU council seneme to improve water supply.

all other vilages in the Inland have a reasonable supply from nearby streams.

Villages on the count buffer from an inadequate water supply, however this is being attended to by the Sian council.

iv. Cleanliness ... Hygiene and Sanitation.

with the exception of MULRO, MARINA/DROMS and MAID all villages are satisfactory. Instructions were given for the necessary improvement at the named villages. On the Inland division the only change of orficials has been the election of new local coverament councillors at half and SUMS. Littouch only elected last September the Sumo representative in far from hep by and has already approached he to see if he can resign he doesnot receive any assistance from the record and arter speaking with several value are if tapletrs he was elected for what he would not do rather than what he would achieve.

Luluais continue to function throughout the rest of the division, with the exception of handed, Marcha, and MUNTHU they all a pear to be carrying out their duties successfully.

On the coast there was a complete change of councillors at SLEARC and SERMAThey have only just come into office and are still learning as previously stated lack of leacership by councillors has resulted in a drop in nousing standards.

CUTLINE OF POLITICAL SITUATION.

Since Mr Van Ruths report the majority of recycle have become increasingly exare that political development is and must take place. with an established council the people on the coast are more politically aware. They welcome the establishment of a Fatrol Fost at Sissame, not only for the presine value but for the economic and social development they think will follow. They evisualize the establishment of the station a step towards bringing self-determination that much faster.

Although aware that the present Administration is allconsider it as their own government, the people do not
consider it as their own government but simply as an Australian
Government. A typical example was when I wished to purchase a
small area of inna for the station. They were quite prepared to
allow me to build on the land but not to purchase the area. Then
after much discussion one government said to the group: "Not the
Australian government buy the land because they they will school
the children and help you. The quicker this is done the somer
you will have your own government and get the station back for
yourself"

AGRICULTURE AND LIVESTOCK.

Throughout the area there is an abundance of native foods which may be purchased as previously mentioned the Catholic Mission at Siscano purchase Sal/ic morbilly. Sage is most available, also yams an et potatoe, parmax, rines le and bancha, elso introduced crops of pumpkin, cucumber, beans, tomatoes and juring onlone.

Cash cropping is confined to the coastel area, where a small income is derived by some from the sale of copya. Siesano village is the largest producer, the average adult male income from copya sales is 7/0 per month. The other villages produce for less, Po village accent produce copya at all and at waregu the monthly

income is fourpence per man.

With the exception of MUMMU and NEBIRE all villages visited have experimental corresplots. So fat Fe village is the only place with bearing trees. These people have not yet marketed any produce. (See Appendix "B" for tree counts.)

All villages have farmer trainess who instruct and assist with the coffee plots however a patrol by an Agriculture on icer is definately required. As mentioned by Mr Van Ruth in his report there is still an area which has never been visited by a Duropean Office from DASF. (In Makean made a flying visit through the area in his capacity as polling official for the House of Assembly elections.)

The majority of cash cropping has been carried out on a communal basis but the trend now is for individual plots owned by one family group.

Marketing remains a problem, when the people of the inland division do produce a cash crop transport will be a major factor. The nearest market is at Attage.

The copie of BARIRA/DROIS have a small herd of six cattle. These appear to be in good condition and the people have informed me that the herd has increased by 50% over three years.

Other domestic livestock is restricted to pigs, fowls and a few domestic home is derived from the sale of these although the majority of the animals are used to supplement their diet. Pigs , cashowary, fish and other game are available.

COM ERCE AND INDUSTRY.

i. Trade stores. Since the last patrol into the area native owned have been set up at ARCP, RAIVA, ALAU, ALSULA, RAIVA, ARAPOMA and SUMO. With the exception of Arop and Sumo al the licences were issued by the ADC, LULLI. These stores have been set up with the help of the Catholic Mission who continue to offer guidance. In most cases money to start the atore has been subscribed by the villagers who have been issued with 5/- share certificates. A further native operated store will shortly stort at BARIMA/BROIK.

The Catholic Mission at Sissano also run a trade store.

ii. Transport. Native owned powered cances ply up the coast from 935K, 5155ANO and WARCH to ATTAPE during the Southeast season. Smaller powered cances could travel between SI SANO and MALOH via the inland waterway during the North West season. Over the past five months there has been good prospects for rative owned transtort to carry eargo for the Administration and the mission but lack of intrest, bad management and faulty equipment has resulted in a considerable loss of income to native operators.

The Mission at Malol have a small dingy capable of pulling a cance which they operate between Malol and Sissano.

iii. Fiching. Again confined to the coastal region. A small cash locus is derived from the sale of fish, prayms and crubs to the Administration and Mission personnel at Sisseno and from the sale of fresh and smoked lish at mitape. There is scope for the development of this industry with markets as close as Aitape and Lumi.

iv. Mining. A native miner from the Lumi area has recently moved into Adambé village and has intrested the people in prospecting for gold. At the time I visited the village the had won a few samples but nothing had been marketed.

LAND.

Patrol Post site. It is noted that this purchase will be finalised shortly.

The coole of REBILE are living on SAVARUI land and the people of GOLNIEI are living on NENGLAN ground. The people of GoLNIEI willnot plant cash crops as they fear they may be asked to leave the present site and go back to their own lands.

All villages have ample land areas and consideration should be given to the resettlement of GOINTRI, MARKU, MATKI, MARKUL, NESIMA, SAVAMUI, and MUMMRU into areas closer to the coast and in anticular into a region in the proximity of the AITAPE-VARIMO road. From time to time it has been supposted that those villages make such a move, however all groups are reductant to make permanent moves to land over which they have no title.

COMPLAINTS.

The majority of complaints were of a comestic nature and settled by arbitration.

A native was charged and a shotgun conflocated at Barire village The shotgun was left in the village by a priest of the Catholic Mission at Drome.The native claimed that he had at one time been the shootbey for the priest.There hasnot been a priest in residence at Drome for over two years.

Resthouses and police barracks were found in every vil age. With the exception of SERRA and GOINIRI villages all buildings were in good condition.

CARRIERS AND CANCES.

Carriers were hired on a village to village basis and were paid 1/- per hour. At most villages the young men were eager to accept this employment and several spent a few days with the patrol. Cances were used on the Arop-Po section and were hired at 10/- each plus 1/- per hour for carriers.

HEALTH.

Health throughout the area is generally satisfactory. The whooping cough opened reported by the last patrol has also resulted in a large number of deaths being recorded by this petrol. 25 population decrease was recorded at GONNRI.2. 35 at BATTRA and DROME village remains consistent all other villages showed a flight increase with those villages having the least contact exceping the whooping cough epidemic. The most remote village, NUMURU has an 11.45 increase.

During the patrol only a few minor sores and a small amount of dysentry was brought to the notice of the patrol Many people were absent from SUMO virlage seeking treatment at Ramm aid-post.

I agree with previous officers remarks regarding the need for more add-posts throughout the erea sevenui has a definate need with KAIYA vilage as another desirable site. The area reported as unpatrolled by a medical assistant still remains unpatrolled.

Marapu aid post. Has a competent aid post orderly in charge,

however he has been delegating his work to a village native who acts as assistant in cleaning sores, giving injections, etc. A clean aid post.

arop Aid Fost. Creerly was not present when I visited. Inspected all post and Jouna it in a filtary countition. There were several complaints that the orderly willhost visit people in the village, no mester how ill they may be he doesnot ratrol regularly to FO village.

Coinirt aid lost, a weel kept aid post. However it is run of a medical who takes far more intrest in village politics than in as medical work. He is advanced in years and has dirite-ulty in visiting other villages.

parira/Drome aid Post. Another dirt, aid post. The orderly mas a ceperate color of half built houses, no latrines, etc., where he house leper ratients who remain at the aid post for treatment.

Ramu Ald port. The best visited in the area, clean, well kept native material buildings.

Serra Aid Post, When I visited the provely was in the bush hunting pigs, he had been for the past six weeks, e had left his younger brother to look after the aid post At this time the brother had just finished administering the last of the crugs and bandages.

Sistence Mission and Pret. Ran by a trained mursing eister the lad gost has a child welfare and Pre and post natal clinic as well as general services.

EDUCATION AND MISSIONS.

At this date the only education suglied in the area is by the Roman Catholic Mission Order of Friers Misor who are the only mission operating in the region.

The missi n has two stations, one at prome which has not been massed for over two years and the other at Sissano. The Sissano mission has a solo ! which offers duration from preptostations at the standard iv. Ther were over 400 children attending the school at Sissano end warray in 1964. Apart from this school there is no other school except small village groups taught by mission categorists.

The mission influence seems to extend into all villages throughout the area but those people who consider that they should be under the brome mission are disgruntled at what they consider the lack of intrest being displayed in their welfare by the mission in failing to have a priest at Drome for over two years. The mission at Sissano enjoys good relations with the people in the sees.

ROADS AND BRIDGES,

Host roads throughout the area are well kept native tracks, alchough the road from Haralul to making is only a native root pad. The majority of tracks tend to follow streams and it is almost impossible to arrive in a village with dry feet. Bridging has been attempted where possible.

There are no vehicular roads in the area although there is a need for some to help economic development.

AIRFIELDS.

The only airfields in the area are two private strips operated by the Catholic mission. These are at Sissano and prome and

both need large scale improvements to bring them up to a commercial standard.

I understand the land at Drome has been purchased and leased to the Mision. At Sissulo the strip is on native fowned land. Many young coconuts were destroyed to make the existing strip and a further 15 C occurate would need to be destroyed to bring the strip up to Cessmi commercial standard.

MABOUR. All labour requirements can be met from the immediate area. Only a small percentage of the labour force has contract employment the rest accept casual employment as offered. In a need for cash those people of the Inland division accept two weeks casual labour at either Altape or Vanimo. They claim that when they go to altage they can only carry enough food off two weeks, after that they have to jurchase food in altage and this makes the whole project uncconomical.

PERSONAL Tax. Tax was collected throughout the Inland division from all vil ages, with the execution of SURO and RAMU who are in the SIAU council and REBIAS and NUMBER who were selice exempt.

I feel that all villages should be able to pay the tax rate in 1965 and have savised villagers accordingly.

CENSUS.

Census figures for the entire Altape West Coast Census Division and for that portion of The Altape West Coast Inland Census Division which I patrolled are attached.

The constal villages of Sissano and Warspu have an increase in excess of 3%, this to a large extent could be attributed to the Aid post at the Sissano Mission from where the sister attends the majority of births.

MUMUPU had an 11.4% increase, 5.6% was births over deaths and the remainder migrations in.

Except for those villages specifically mentioned under III. Health the remained of the division show a small natural increase.

PERSONNEL.

Const 1st/C NIRACRU. Has been on the patrol since short after we arrived at Sissano. A conscientious NCO, however appears to take much he hears for granted and desmot pass the

Const. AWASE. Has been with the patrol since the start. Does not operate very well in his own area where he tends to become to involved in the local politics. A transfere is needed.

Const PALEP. Joined the same time as NINAGRU. Reasonably efficient,
