

"Frontiers in Medicine" offered by UCSD Extension

"Frontiers in Medicine," a ten-week course investigating the exciting field of medical research, will be offered by the University of California Extension, San Diego, beginning Sept. 25.

The program, designed for the layman, will consist of ten lectures by prominent UCSD medical researchers who will discuss new developments in their respective fields.

Dr. Clifford Grobstein, Vice-Chancellor for Medicine and the Biological Sciences and Dean of the School of Medicine, will open the program on Sept. 25 with the topic, "Medicine as Frontier."

Other topics include "Frontiers in Pathology," "Frontiers in Surgery," "Pediatric Immunology and Allergy," "Advances in Understanding Heart Function," "Blood Flow--The Stream of Life," "Brain Mechanisms Underlying Perception," "Sensory Receptors and the Language of the Brain," "Microbes and Men: Peaceful Coexistence" and "Organization and Distribution of Medical Care Services."

"The course is being offered to interest and inform the general public of the breakthroughs in medical research," said Mrs. Marjorie Schneider, course coordinator. "What we are actually presenting is a rare opportunity for the people of San Diego to hear about the developments in modern medicine firsthand."
