

Native Affairs - It appears that the natives are in a most happy position with plenty of spending money yet still maintaining their subsistence crops. The practice of village officials dispensing justice and the impositions for fines are to cease forthwith. Village officials may arbitrate should both parties be agreeable The native situation appears to be most satisfactory. Education - The position of the Naipucs village school appears to be most satisfactory. Medical and Health - The health of the people, and medical attention given them and their acceptance of it appears most satisfactory. I concur in the remarks concerning Mr. Carlaw.

Anthropology - The notes have been extracted on Native Customs File at this office. and placed Fecks - An extract is forwarded to you under Japanese War Graves - This is dealt with under separate memo. Despite the good work of Government officials, and the missions, the noral values of the natives remain quite low, as instanced by the relatively high incidence of adultery and assent. The natives brought many cases to the patrol officer to settle of which thirteen were settled under the h.AZR. The officials were given prison sentences ranging from two to five months, in addition to these cases, a number of minor disputes decling with pics; being fries; illagated or a very few tro bis makers, the military from the area are a lew The people met with on the patrol were most helpful and sverywhere efforts had been meds to show that the process presence was appreciated. In Some villages, the rest houses had been lavishly decorated with flowers and leaves.

One disturbing factor however, is the number of younger men, who are working for various interest away from their own villages dompletely neglect their wives and children and form ner associations elsewhere.

Acet native males, except those who live had most contact with Europeans, still know how to make outrigger cances, most of which are fitted with sails, in whose use they have become experts. Paddles are still an essential and the patrol saw several which were wery gaily painted. The old native art of carving wooden figures for their singsings are unfortunately dyin, out, but a few of the older men still make "Puspus" armlets and on the island of Neitab a few men still make native money "kis" a necklet of very small shells which is still used as bride price. Several rishing nets made of native materials were seen by the patrol.

In all villages the Blue Ensign was raised and short talks were given on its significance.

On the whole, however, the patrol was Tavourably impressed with the native situation in all its aspects.

As has been stated earlier, the people of both the Morth west and south West Coasts of New Antiver and Lating an intreased intreast in their gardens. The Morth West Coast has comparativel / poor soil, a raddish yellow soil and much of the land is taken up with swarps, host of the people on this coast live on the islicands and their garden areas are divided between the island clearing and plots well back in the footnills. Fish such sair, tapica, tare and sweet potatoes are the main items of diet.

A raised coral sinth forms the base of the South West Coast and the soil here an alluvial loam is comparatively much more familia. The rainfall too is much greater, which results in a greater channely and variety of food. Will tare, sak as an awest bottstees remain the main crops, most natives grow beans, tomatoes, melons chinese cabbage and shallots.

Though there are a number of Trace stores on their food supplies, hear found to the native rall on these for their food supplies, hear items to the native ladger still come from the gratum or the year.

As in most parts of the Maine, pigs, fowls and a few ducks are the only livestock measure by the natives and most of these are of bastard stock hopelessi, indeed and underfed.

at Naipucs village there is an area school run
by an intelligent teacher Boski Tom and a student teacher. This
school was visited by the fatrol and every effort was made to show
both teachers and ordits, or when there are as in interest in their
well being and progress. He teachers have shootinged the public to
plant and tend their \un gardens, and the school is now almost self
supporting. The public are also taught to build their own dances.
The buildings built and maintained by the surrounding villagers, and
the school area are kept very clean and heat.

In the villages, the schools are run by the
Methodist and Catholic missions, as most of the teachers have themself
only reached about grade to by European standards, the emount of worthwhile knowledge imparted is very limited. Still all are trying and

ILLAGES AND VILLAGE FFICIAL Lost villages were clear and well kent although it was obvious that some had been cleaned just prior to the patrols arrival. Some villages, on execunt of good sixing in the past and the recent planting of flowering shrubs and variogated bushes were very attractive. The most attractive villages are gaue, Neiteb, nelewaig Pativini and Majouce.

The housing on the whole is quite satisfactory and it was pleasing to note that only a few natives were reprimended for showing general lack of interest in their villages.

The outstanding personality in the area patrolled is Posiker, belief of Naipues village. A born leader and a man with a been insight into the native mentality, he has snoothaged the natives of currounding villages and the people from his village to build and maintain the Government area school and add post at Naipues. He has a large house and has an extensive garden area under outtivation. The people realize the qualities of his leadership and an inspection of the village area, reveals well built houses, large gardens and a most of an analysish it. While endorsing Mr. Butcher's general remarks, I feel that, directed into the right channels, Singarau can be of great value both to his people and to the Administration.

An interesting and well-written account of a well-conducted potrol; Mr. Butcher's reports are always informative, and indicative of his enthusiasm and painstaking work.



The recorded information proved very helpful, but the only thing the officer brought to the notive of the village officials and the assembled natives was the unjust decisions given in some disputes. The village officials were instructed enter all disputes in the record book but were to refrain from mettling cases. The Blue Ensign was flown in every village the patrol visited and a short talk was given on its significance. The natives joined in the ceremony of raining the flag and it was pleasing to note the number who took part in this solemn, but short aeremony. #### LEGEND OF THE DOG AND WALLABY

Once upon a time when all the animals could speak, certain natives went into the bush to cut timber to build a house. They saw a dog and a wallaby and they beckened and asked these two animals to help them to build a house. The animals agreed and joined the party. They reached the spot where the house was to be built and so all of them started to cut timber, except the dog. He went to sleep under a bush. The wallaby had a few clues on hew to build a house and so he directed the natives what to do. When the house was completed they prepared a feast and all of them went to have their fill. The dog got there before the rest of them and had a good feed. When they all had finished the dog and wallaby took a few pieces of meat and tare and put it away in little baskets. The dog told the wallaby that as they had finished building the house they might as well go "me. The wallaby agreed. While they were packing the dog started to eat his share of the food, when he had finished the food he told the wallaby to hand over the rest as he wanted to carry it for the wallaby. The wallaby agreed and so they started for home. After some time the dog felt hungry and started to eat the wallabjes share of the food. When the wallaby found out what had happened he was angry with the dog and an argument took place. The wallaby then said "If we live together dog I will spill your blood". The dog then chased the wallaby into the bush, and to this day the wallaby and dog cannot live together, that is the reason why the dog lives a demesticated life while a wallaby lives in the bush away from civilisation.

No wrecks were seen by the writer on this patrol, but the natives from MATANIU village state that a Japanese transport was sunk just off the reef off LUNGATAN Plantation.

#### JAPANESE WAR GRAVES

The natives report that no dead Japanese troops were buried here, but that all sick and wounded Japanese were taken to Kavieng.

#### RHINOGEROUS BEETLE

The writer enquired into the activities of the Rhinocerous Beetle in this area and was informed by the natives and by Mr.J. White that there was hardly any destruction caused by them. The main cause of the trouble on plantations are by grass-hoppers, who completely destroy the leaves on coconut palms. Grasshoppers had completely destroyed two small plantations belonging to the natives. These plantations are situated at Meterankan village and Tiopotukrvillage. Nothing has been done by the natives, but the palms seen seemed to be sprouting new leaves.

#### LAND ANDINANCE

In all cases were plantations were inspected improvements in accordance with the Land Ordinance had been carried out.

#### WELFARE OF FAMILIES OF NATIVES ABSENT FROM THEIR VILLAGE

The provisions of this Circular Instruction were brought to the notice of the natives seen. The natives seem to be adhering to this instruction rather strictly. No complaints were made to the officer.



LAW and ORDER. The interest taken by the people in the N.A.R. indicated a real desire of the people to follow out the Law as laid down for their benefit.

NATIVE AFFAIRS. The attitude of the natives seems to be first class. Concur in the recommendation that more coconut palms be planted.

Housing appears to be most satisfactory and the general standard of living appears above that of the average New Guinea native. The case of Vilau-Vilau is dealt with under separate memorandum.

The acquisitiveness of the mission societies in temporal affairs is no new occurence.

AGRICULTURE AND LIVESTOCK. Diet from gardens appears to be satisfactory.

EDUCATION. A youth from this island is being educated in Townsville.

MEDICAL AND HEALTH, appears to be first class. On a recent inspection I enquired concerning midwifery cases, and it was found that it is now common practise for the women to have their children in Administration hospitals. This is indeed "a feather in the cap" for the medical assistant.

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LAW AND ORDER

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It was very pleasing to note that there was no case brought before the writer to be settled under the N.A.R. Many minor disputes were settled on the spot in the presence of the village natives. Many natives came from adjoining villages to listen in to the proceedings. Such interest shown by the natives, reflect a genuine interest and confidence in what the government is doing for them. Government officials requested the writer to read out and explain to the assembled natives various sections of the N.A.R. that have been most abused. The request was complied with much to the satisfaction of all concerned.

#### NATIVE AFFAIRS

The natives showed keen interest in the patrols visit and no effort was spared to make the patrol feel at home. The Rest houses were gaily decorated with flowers and some of the most beautiful orchids the writer has seen. Food was plentiful and the natives brought various sea foods and vegetables as gifts. The writhanked them for their kindness and made them feel that their hospitality was much appreciated. The police boys accompanying the patrol were well looked after by the natives and a welcome hand was extended to them wherever they went. The writer extended to them wherever they went.

As the natives in this area own a lot of coconut

palms, they are keenly interested in the co-operative acciety. Nost of the copra produced is sold to their society, the remainder is sold to the various chinese stores in the area. There are three loading points used by the co-operative ships in this area, these are situated at KULIBANG, UNUSA and UNGALIK. The writer told the natives that it would be a wise move if they planted more coconuts as most of the palms

seen were very old.

The housing in this area is from average to excellent and only a few natives were reprimanded for neglecting their houses. The houses seen were built on conventional lines, post for foundations, bamboo and pangal blinds for walls, saksak for the roofs and limbom floors. Some houses had sawn timber floors and corrugated iron roofs. One house in the area belonging to IONE of UNGAKUM village has to be mentioned in all fairness to the native concerned. This house is constructed of solid sawn timber post for the foundations, sawn timber floor, flat iron for the walls and corrugated iron for the roof. The rooms are divided by masonite boards and for the final touch louvred glass windows have been installed. The native was congratulated for being so progressive. He informe me that he built his house from the money received from selling

European type eating and cooking utensils, well as furniture are to be found in every house. These articles are purchased from the various stores in the area and are also brought home by the natives who have been working on plantations or for the various firms in the territory.

In every village a record book was being kept.
This proved very helpful to the patrol as such data as births, deaths, pregnancies and village disputes were entered in them.

The natives of METEMIN village informed the writer that VILAU VILAU Luluai of METEMIN village was taking advantage of his official position and making the natives work his copra for him without any form of payment. This matter was investigated and found to be true. As the natives did not wish to charge Vilau Vilau the matter was settled out of court and the said Vilau Vilau was made to pay the natives the monies due to them. Previous to this complaint to pay the natives the monies due to them. Previous to this complaint Vilau Vilau was given four months gaol for adultery with various women of the village. Owing to his habit of conducting various affairs with women, fifty per cent of the village natives have migrated to other villages in the area. The remainder of the natives of PATAKANCIA (Metemin) village, request that the government relieve Vilau Vilau of his official position. The writer explained to the assembled natives that this request of theirs would be forwarded to the District Commissioner of the New Ireland District for further action. In the meantime the officer suspended Vilau Vilau and the fulful has been placed in charge of the village.

Native Affairs (Continued)

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In several villages the mission village teachers have the mistaken idea that they are in charge of the village and thus try to take over from the government appointed village officials in the xx running of village affairs. In most cases these mission teachers do not belong to the village in which they have been stationed. pointed out to the mission teachers, that they were not to interfere with the polities of the village and that they were to abide by the laws of the government just like the other natives. Any interference from them would result in them being reported to their religious head in the area or that they would be charged under the Native Administration Regulations.

Pictures of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth 11 were given to every village visited. The natives took particular interest in the pictures, especially the native women, who considered the picture of the Queen holding Prince Charles as the best. A short talk on the Royal

Family was given to the natives.

The Blue Ensign was flown in every village and it was pleasing to note the large number of natives who took part in this solemn ceremony.

In general the Native Situation is quite satisfactory and the officer was favourably impressed with what he saw.

#### AGRICULTURE AND LIVESTOCK

All villages on the mainland have a sufficient supply of Native foods and the gardens inspected were quite big. Tare is the staple diet with Sego as a standby in times of drought. The island natives are less fortunate as the soil does not seem to good. The soil is very porous as it is mainly composed of sand, being rather unsuitable for growing vegetables. Supplementing Tare are such vegetables as tomato, beans, chinese cabbage, pumpkin, sweet potato and a few edible native greens. There is any amount of Fish, crabs, shellfish, oysters, lobsters and sometimes turtle to be had here. Sea

foods play a big part in the diet of the natives.

There are a very few domesticated pigs in the area and the natives occassionally go hunting for wild pig in the bush. A few fowls were seen, but they were of very poor stock.

The natives were told that they were to keep

their eccount paintations clean at all times.

#### EDUCATION

There is no government school in this area, but quite a number of students attend the government school at UTU Kavieng or Mission higher schools at Rabaul. In every village there is a mission school and information required by the Department of Education is attached to Appendix "B".

#### MEDICAL AND HEALTH

The natives seen on patrol appeared to look healthy and much credit is due to the untiring efforts of Mr.I Carlaw. A few girili cases were noted and these were sent to the aid post at Taskul and Metemin for treatment.

The aid post at Metemin and Meteiai were inspected and were found to be spotlessly cleam. Village natives living close to these aid posts make use of them.

General sanitation in this area was from

average to good.

At the time of this patrol the European Medical Assistant, Mr.R. Carlaw was doing a medical patrol, so not very much can be added to the medical side of this report.

#### WILLAGESAND WILLAGE OFFICIALS.

On this patrol most of the villages seen were kept clean and tidy, though a few had been cleaned prior to th patrols arrival. The great majority of villages have good to excellent sites and some of the natives have taken great pains to put colour into their villages.

Villages and Village officials (Continued)

The housing on the whole is quite satisfactory and it was pleasing to note that only a few natives were reprimanded for showing general lack of interest in their villages.

There is no outstanding personality in this area and all village officials seen were from average to good. These men are doing a reasonable job and appear to be keeping their peoples interest well in mind.

BUARI, Luluai of MAMION village tendered his resignation owing to old age and ill health. His resignation was accepted and the officer asked the assembled natives to nominate a native to take the place of BUARI. The natives nominated PASINGANTUREMAI, headman of MAMION village for the position of Luluai. The writer instructed PASINGANTUREMAI to act as Luluai of MAMION village, till such time as confirmation came through from headquarters.

#### ROADS AND BRIDGES.

The road running through the TSOI islands is in very good condition and the natives look after their section of the road with a certain amount of pride. Only a small stretch of road between UNGAKUM and KAUWILIKAU villages is in bad condition, this being due to the hauling of logd by the tractor belonging to the Department of Works and Housing.

The road running along the North East Coast of New Hanover is in fair condition and the natives were told to spend a bit more time repairing bad stretches and bring it into conformity with the roads of the rest of the islands. Every effort was made to encourage the natives to improve their sections of the road.

#### MISSIONS

The Methodist, it man Catholic and Seventh Day Adventist missions are responsible for the evangelical work in this area, with the Methodist mission predominating. The religious welfare of the Methodist is in the hands of the Reverend. B. Chenoweth who operates from Kavieng and the Roman Catholics in the hands of the Reverend Father Otto, who resides at Lavongai. The S.D. A. Flock are visited regularly by European members of their mission, who come from Rabaul or Mussau islands.

Despite the denominational differences in various villages, the natives seem to be living in harmony.

#### ANTHROPOLOGY

After taking the census of Patlagaga village, the writer was discussing the subject of gardens with a few of the elders of the village when he acticed a strange looking stone impliment lying on the verandah of the house belonging to native ARGERE. Being curious the writer picked it up and made a closer inspection and Jound that it was cut out of rock. It had a definite shape and evidently had been used a fair bit as the stone was quite smooth. The writer asked angele where he found the stone and langele informed me that he found it in his garden. Angele also stated that there were a few stones around, but the native children threw tixan them away after playing with them. Further enquiries into the matter from various natives in the village showed that this area had a few more stone impliments lying around. The natives brought these impliments to the writer, whe asked them if they knew where these stones had come from. The natives replied that they had no idea, but remember being told by their great grandfathers that these stones could be found all over the place and that they themselves had no idea who used these stones or where they had some from. The writer then asked the natives if they would let him have the stones impliments as he would like to find out more information on the subject. The natives agreed. The writer will be forwarding these stone impliments to headquarters and any information received on the subject vill be much appreciated.
