

Professor Derrick R. Cartwright joined the SDMA on September 4, 2004, as only its seventh director in the institution's 78-year history. Cartwright has received international recognition for his contributions as an educator, scholar, and museum administrator, including a three-year tenure as director of the prestigious Hood Museum of Art at Dartmouth College.


Cartwright was born and raised in San Francisco. He studied art history and graduated with honors from the University of California, Berkeley, and received his master's degree from UCLA. He completed his doctorate degree at the University of Michigan in 1994. He has published numerous articles and catalogue essays on the history of public art in the United States, 18th and 19th century American painting, photography, contemporary art, and Franco-American cultural exchange.

NORTHERN INTERCAMPUS MEETING AT SANTA CRUZ

On Wednesday, March 29, 2006 I spent a lovely day at the UCSC Recital Hall at the Music Center attending the northern intercampus meeting. After our welcome by May Clark, the UCSC Women's Club President and Denice Denton, the UCSC chancellor, we were treated to a few songs from the newly formed UCSC Women's Club Chorus, Fiat Musica. Next, Adrianne Steinacker, a UCSC Astronomy lecturer, spoke on "Worlds in Limbo: Icy Bodies Beyond Neptune". It was a fascinating presentation on the history and politics of astronomical discoveries. Burney LeBoeuf, Associate Vice Chancellor for Research, spoke on "Life in a Harem: The Female Perspective", results of long term studies of elephant seals revealed multiple strategies consistent with findings in other animals and the harems of the Ottoman Empire. Next on the agenda was "Where's The Moneyand What Should I Do With It?", a panel presentation with representatives from the four northern campuses, and myself. After I registered for the meeting, May Clark asked if I would like to represent UCSD on the panel and I accepted. From the presentations I learned that all the campuses are close in the amount of funds they raise. For instance, dues for three of the northern campuses range from \$22-25. UCSF dues are \$40. Berkeley does offer both single dues for \$25, and couples dues for \$30. UCSF throws a Phantom Ball every year. Invitations are sent out to a ball that requires no gown, makeup, baby sitter nor leaving home. All that is required is a donation to their scholarship fund. Another club,I think it was UC Davis threw a no-frills tea party. Club members are sent an envelope with a tea bag and request for a donation to the scholarship fund. UCSF has also started charging a \$50 fee for listings in their newsletter for housing for rent sabbaticals. This has brought in several thousand dollars. Other fundraisers at the campuses included an Antique Extravaganza at Berkeley and home tours. Besides raising funds for scholarships and fellowships, UCSF and Davis also have loan funds. That money is loaned to students on a short-term basis. Since the funds revolve as loans are repaid, the funds for that remained consistent once they reached a certain level. The panel discussion was followed by lunch, where I was able to continue the discussion with the panel members. They were very impressed by the number of Interest Groups in the Oceanids. Following lunch there was a wonderful concert performance of Schubert's Piano Trio in E-Flat Major by very talented science students at UCSC. It was a very special treat.

The closing presenter was Frank Zwart, Associate Vice-Chancellor, Physical Planning & Construction spoke on Building UC Santa Cruz, "A Whirlwind Tour of theUCSC Campus and Its History". Despite the rain, it was a delightful, entertaining and informative day, and I hope to return next year. I invite more Oceanids to join me. It also made me wish that the southern campuses were still meeting; perhaps we can revive the annual meetings, but limit it to the southern UC Campuses.



Pat Kampmann and Eleanor tum Suden are our guides through the financial jungles. **Next meeting: May 18** Many years ago when I asked my mother-in-law why she and Dad would not come for a visit from Long Beach for more than 3 days, she replied: "Guests are like fish. After three days fish begins to smell." I was, at the time, somewhat taken aback, I remember. But if I would like them to, why wouldn't they? Were they not comfortable at our house? Later I found out that they themselves did not like houseguests for longer than a couple of days. It was too much of an interruption in their daily lives, too much work, too much entertaining.

The people who know me are aware that I -or before my husband's death- that we have and had a lot of houseguests. And since many of them come from Europe they do not come just for a couple of days but for a couple of weeks at least. So here are a few ways how I deal with my company:

RULE # 1

Do not let people come whom you do not know and/or whom you do not really, really like. Simply say, it is not convenient, you are busy, have other guests, won't be there, etc. Be brave! An exception may be very close relatives, i.e. parents or siblings. If they want to extend their stay to a for-you-unreasonable time, be firm and say, that longer than is too much for you, you have your routine, you can't handle having even the nicest guests for more than...., and then stick to it.

But let's say your prospective visitors are really good friends (and you also know the spouses well and like them also!! I once had the unfortunate experience in the very beginning of my life here, that a lovely friend of mine wanted to come for 4 weeks. I did not know her husband well and let them come. Her husband was a know-it-all, arrogant and overbearing, and I swore that I would never do that again. So know the accompanying partners well!). But let's say you are really looking forward to their visit:

RULE #2

Make them independent. Loan them your car (after a trial drive), or let them rent a car, give them a city map, a public transportation map, write a list of things they can do in San Diego in one day, and a list of sights they can visit with a car in a couple of days. But let's say they want to hang out at the beach, or lounge on your patio and get that special La Jolla tan, show them where the beach towels are and the boogie boards, show them the nearest way to the beach on the map and let them do their own thing. Put up the lawn chairs in the patio and let them be.

Very important: Give them leave to use the items in your refrigerator, let them get their own drink if they are thirsty, their own pretzels or sandwich, if they are hungry (you have shown them where the glasses, the plates and the silverware are). Believe me, it will make life a lot easier. I usually make the breakfast and we have dinner together (either I cook, or they cook, or they take me out), but for lunch everyone is on his own. Most guests like the independence, feel less of a burden and like you for it. But beware! Too much help can be confusing. That brings us to

RULE #3

Do not let them put away the dishes from the dishwasher unless they know every nook and cranny of your kitchen. Otherwise you may have to look for that special sieve or spaghetti server for the rest of your life. Do not let them fill and start the dishwasher and the washing machine on their own if it bugs you to waste electricity and have the machines run half-full. If they want to cook, great, but have them check with you what they need, otherwise you might end up with too many jars of that special mustard or bottles of peanut sauce or balsamic vinegar of which you have already plenty left over from the guests before. And finally, here is

RULE #4

Enjoy your guests. Go with them on the outings if you have the time. It is great for them to have someone along who knows her way around. Don't worry about order in your household for the time they are there. You will have time to be a neatnik again when they are gone. Take things in stride, but if some things bother you, tell them as soon as possible.

Let them spoil you. Let them cook, vacuum, mow the lawn (say quietly at breakfast, I guess I will have to work in the yard today; and when they ask, can I help, let them), let them go grocery shopping, allow them to pay for the wine or the expensive steak they are longing for. Let them set the table and clean up (if they are a little slow in that department, get up from the table and say you have to check your e-mail and it would be great if they could clear the table. They will catch on quickly.)

Most of all have fun with your guests.

Warning: if you have problems delegating, giving up control, changing your daily routine, maybe you should really treat your guests as fish.
