

Louis Loeb main speaker for 12 annual meeting of the Friends of the UCSD Library

Louis M. Loeb, general counsel for the New York Times for some 40 years, will be the main speaker for the 12th annual meeting of the Friends of the UCSD Library Thursday, November 18, at the La Jolla Country Club.

Loeb, a partner in the New York law firm of Lord Day and Lord until his retirement in 1971, will reminisce on his experiences in representing the paper.

The annual meeting will combine dinner with the election of officers for the Friends which supports the various libraries and library programs at the University of California, San Diego. The program is scheduled to start at 7 p.m. with a pre-dinner social hour set for 6 p.m. Reservations may be made by sending a check for \$7.50 per person, payable to "The Friends of the UCSD Library," to the Office of the Librarian, Central University, C-075, UCSD, La Jolla, California 92093.

Loeb, a resident of La Jolla, attended Phillips Exeter Academy and graduated from Yale College in 1919. He received a bachelor of laws degree from Columbia Law School in 1922. Columbia conferred an honorary doctor of laws degree on him in 1970.

Loeb served as president of the Association of the Bar of the City of New York from 1956 to 1958 and was awarded the medal of the Association in 1970, only the sixth time it was awarded. He served as chairman of the Mayor's Committee on the Judiciary for New York City and was a member of the American Bar Foundation, the New York Bar Foundation and the American Law Institute.

He is an associate member of the San Diego Bar Association, the University Club of San Diego and the Chancellor's Club of UC San Diego.
