PEOPLE-TO-PEOPLE OFFERS TREAT

In summer 2001 Ann Lyle Van Atta, M.A., participated in a ten-day art historical research/study group to the Mogao Caves (High Desert Caves) near Dunhuang in Gansu Province, PRC. The Palo Alto-based Silk Road Foundation, the Chinese Studies Department of University of Michigan, and the Dunhuang Research Academy of Lanzhou University, PRC, organized this study. On MARCH 13 AT 1:00 in the International Center she will present slides, details from her field notes, and photographical texts to illustrate aspects of extant paintings of Buddhist morality tales, deities, and the Mahayana Paradise in these caves. Chinese and Central Asian monks, pilgrims and others that once inhabited this river valley dug more than five hundred caves by hand-labor and painted them during the fourth to the fourteenth centuries. More than half of these caves were constructed during the Tang era, seventh to tenth centuries.

THE MAASAI OF KENYA

Our program for this month takes us to the land of Kenya in East Africa. It will focus on the Maasai people who live in the southwestern part of Kenya. This is an area known to many as the 'Second Natural Wonder' of the world because of the millions of animals living here and coexisting with the Maasai people. The program will include a brief history of the Maasai, a discussion of their unique cultural practices, and a look at the conflicts between their traditions and the modern world.

Our speaker will be Ole Koriata Samparuan (Moses). Moses was born in Narok, Kenya, and he grew up in several villages as the family followed the migratory way of life before finally settling at Naropil and Maasantare villages where they currently reside.

After attending primary and high school in Kenya, Moses came to the U.S. to study and graduated with a B.S. in International Business Administration from USIU and an M.S. in Electronic Commerce from National University.

While still a student, Moses co-founded the Maasai Indigenous Project, a not-for- profit community based organization working diligently to assist the Maasai people in improving their quality of life, especially in education, water and basic health care

SOME NOTES ON FEBRUARY'S SOUNDING BOARD

Dr. Gabriele Wienhausen, who is the Provost of the new Sixth College, gave a very well received talk about the new college. The January issue of Bear Facts had a short article introducing Dr. Gabriele Wienhausen and describing the focus the college will have on the inter-relationships between art culture and technology. New modes of communications will be studied and the college will have a wireless infrastructure.

Dr. Weinhausen started her talk by commenting that when she came to UCSD in 1981, she was helped by a tutor from the Friends of the International Center. She then spoke briefly about her background and her family, and then went on to talk about the College System that we have at UCSD. She pointed out that the undergraduate population is approximately 17 to 18,000 and the goal is to limit the enrollment at each college to somewhere between three and three and a half thousand, so that both the administrative offices and the living environment are of a more personal nature. As many of you know each college is housed in a different part of the campus, and each college has its own educational philosophy and undergraduate requirements. When students choose a major, they enroll in the courses offered by that department, and then interact with students from the other colleges.

Dr. Weinhausen pointed out that the need for a new college at UCSD was because of the enormous growth in the college-aged population (which has been called "Tidal Wave 2") and that when a new college is setup the first person on board is the Provost. Committees are given the job of developing the educational philosophies for the college, and Sixth College will focus on how art, culture and technology interact. Dr, Weinhausen pointed out that artists are often the first to embrace new technologies, and the curriculum will focus on what makes humans develop culture and how and what technologies developed. It is hoped that the interdisciplinary approach will help develop those who can ask questions and appreciate diverse ways to look at things. Hopefully students will understand modern technology and its implications.

Sixth college was born Wireless (courtesy of a grant from Hewlett Packard) and each student will have a hand-held computer.

Why Engineers & Chemists don't write recipes

Chocolate Chip Cookies:

Ingredients:

- 1. 532.35 cm3 gluten
- 2. 4.9 cm3 NaHCO3
- 3. 4.9 cm3 refined halite
- 236.6 cm3 partially hydrogenated tallow triglycer ide
- 5. 177.45 cm3 crystalline C12H22O11
- 6. 177.45 cm3 unrefined C12H22O11
- 7. 4.9 cm3 methyl ether of protocatechuic aldehyde
- 8. Two calcium carbonate-encapsulated avian albumen-coated protein
- 9. 473.2 cm3 theobroma cacao
- 10. 236.6 cm3 de-encapsulated legume meats(sieve size #10)

To a 2-L jacketed round reactor vessel (reactor #1) with an overall heat transfer coefficient of about 100 Btu/F-ft2-hr, add ingredients one, two and three with constant agitation. In a second 2-L reactor vessel with a radial flow impeller operating at 100 rpm, add ingredients four, five, six, and seven until the mixture is homogenous. To reactor #2, add ingredient eight, followed by three equal volumes of the homogenous mixture in reactor #1. Additionally, add ingredient nine and ten slowly, with constant agitation. Care must be taken at this point in the reaction to control any temperature rise that may be the result of an exothermic reaction. Using a screw extrude attached to a #4 nodulizer, place the mixture piece-meal on a 316SS sheet (300 x 600 mm). Heat in a 460K oven for a period of time that is in agreement with Frank & Johnston's first order rate expression (see JACOS, 21, 55), or until golden brown. Once the reaction is complete, place the sheet on a 25C heat-transfer table, allowing the product to come to equilibrium.

Dear Oceanids:

Chancellor Dynes asked me to respond to your letter of January 2, 2003 asking him to reconsider opening University House for your fall event.

He wishes you to know of his very high regard for Oceanids and his deep appreciation for what you have done and continue to do both as an organization and individuals. The issue, however, is not one of regard or of tradition; it is one of fairness and consistency.

Though Oceanids was among the first and remains one of the most prominent, other volunteer organizations have come to the support of UCSD over the years. Each contributes in their own way and each – whether it is on the basis of the size of their membership, dollars raised, or other direct or indirect benefits – can make a legitimate claim for the use of University House. When it became clear that the demands on University House far exceeded its capacity (staff time, expense, etc.), a new policy had to be forged to more strategically and fairly determine the use of the house. Oceanids, on the basis of its long traditions, was exempted from that new policy in the first four years of Chancellor Dynes' tenure. However, other organizations began to question the fairness of that decision. They included complaints from members of Oceanids who were also members of other volunteer organizations. Others were able to point out that they were as worthy as Oceanids based on various criteria. In the fact of debate and disagreement, the Chancellor realized that the only way to resolve the issue was to apply a consistent standard across the board.

It was on that basis that we informed you of the original decision and that basis has not changed. We ask you, as some of our oldest and closest friends, to understand that we do not intend to slight or offend or show any lack of appreciation. We ask you to avoid viewing this through the filter of personal slight and see that every sound organization must govern through the consistent application of fair and balanced policies.

We apologize for any inconvenience we have caused or anything we might have done to convey that this was anything other than a very difficult decision to make.

IN MEMORIAM Vera Vacquier

Long-time Oceanid Vera died peacefully on Monday evening, January 13, 2003 at the home of her son and daughter-in-law, Vic and Judy Vacquier from heart failure. She was 2 months short of 98 years old. Vera had been living with her children since June 2001 and had been pretty stable until last August. She had one stroke in September and another in October, which left her unable to walk or talk in sentences. Below, a summary of her life by her son, Victor D. Vacquier.

One interesting life

Vera Vinogradoff Vacquier, March 19, 1905 to January 13, 2003

We know little about the family origins of Vera's father, Dimitri Ivanovich Vinogradoff. Her maternal grandfather was Nicholas Lvoff, a General in the Tsar's Army who had 12 children, one of whom was Vera's mother, Eugenia. He was the commanding general of the Moscow District.

Vera was born in Germany where her father was getting his second graduate degree in engineering. She had one brother, Eugene Vinogradoff, two years younger than she. She grew up to age 12 in Moscow surrounded by all the aunts, uncles and cousins in General Lvoff's household and surroundings. When the Tsar was forced to step down and the provisional government came into power, Aleksandr Kerenski, the head of the Russian Duma (senate), sent Vera's father for one year to the Bell Telephone Laboratories in New Jersey to learn how to design a modern telephone system for Moscow. My grandfather had the good sense to take his wife and two children. They came to the US by crossing Asia to Japan, then Vancouver and then to New York. By the time they had reached Japan the Tsar had been shot and the provisional regime had been overthrown by the Bolsheviks. Except for one uncle and one aunt who fled to Belgium, her entire Russian family was killed during the civil war between the White and Red Russians. The Russia they had left no longer existed, thus there was no reason to return. The Provisional Regime had deposited the salary for Vera's father in one lump sum in US dollars in a bank in New York City. The Vinogradoffs lived three years on this money in a boarding house in Manhattan and a rented house in Brooklyn; all four learned English. There were so many Russian refugee friends living in NYC that it was like old home week. We have a picture of Vera, age 12, riding in the motorcycle side car of Igor Sikorski (who built the first helicopters and lived in the basement of their Brooklyn house). Another close family friend was Vladimir Zworykin (the RCA engineer who is called "the father of television"). At The Friends School in Brooklyn Vera made life-long friends with several girls, both Russian and American. English was her fourth language after Russian, German and French. She kept all but the German her entire life. It was 1921 and Vera heard that beautiful countryside existed close to NYC. So she made her father give her \$600 dollars, she lied about her age to a car salesman, and made him promise to teach her how to drive if she would buy a car from him. The deal cemented, on weekends thereafter, the Vinogradoffs, with 15-year-old Vera driving, headed for the countryside in New Jersey. Neither parent ever learned to drive a car. After three years of living in NYC and Brooklyn, the family moved to Pittsburgh in 1922. Vera stayed in Pittsburgh for college, graduating from Carnegie Mellon in 1927. She married in 1931. My sister, Vivian, was born in 1934 and I in 1940. The War broke out and in 1941 we moved to Long Island. We grew a large Victory Garden and collected fat and rags for the war effort. Vera was an expert at buying gasoline on the black market for our 12 cylinder 1936 LaSalle. We left Long Island in 1953 and moved to Albuquerque. Vera was secretary of the Home Economics Department at UNM during those years. In 1957 we moved to La Jolla where she remained for the rest of her life. At UCSD she taught for 20 years in the English in Action Program, tutoring the wives of foreign students and postdocs. In the 60s she taught Russian at La Jolla Country Day School. She was in the Oceanids Book Group and Café Français and the La Jolla Historical Society. She was a member of St. James-by-the-Sea Episcopal Church. She was a pink lady at Scripps Memorial Hospital for at least a decade. She traveled to Europe, the Orient and the South Pacific Vera was a remarkable survivor. She came to America as a Russian refugee and like millions of others embraced everything American. She considered herself 120% American. Vera took roomers into her home who were students or postdocs, some of whom stayed for years and became life-long friends. She survived losing her closest friends simply because she outlived them all. She survived not driving any longer when I disabled her car when she was 90 so that she would not get into a wreck and possibly hurt someone. (She was angry at me for years for doing this to her.) Vera knew

One can't feel too sad over the death of a person who lived so long in good health. She had enormous vivacity and spunky energy; a real pizazz about life. Her favorite thing was meeting people and bending their ears. She was a wonderful grandmother. We encourage all her friends to smile about her and celebrate her long and interesting life. There will be a memorial service Saturday, April 5, 2003, at 2:00 pm at St. James By-the-Sea Episcopal Church in La Jolla.

Agua Caliente is located in the Carrizo Valley Region of Anza-Borrego Desert State Park.

It is best known for its heated springs, which have long attracted visitors eager to soak in their soothing therapeutic mineral waters. Spectacular vistas and miles of trails that meander through the park's canyons and across its hillsides are additional attractions. Centuries ago, the Kumeyaay Indians were initially attracted to the springs at what we now call Agua Caliente ("hot water" in Spanish). Spanish explorers, miners, then pioneers, soldiers and prospectors eventually made their way here as well.

The seismic activity that long ago shaped the Tierra Blanca Mountains to the west and created the fault that runs beneath both parks, also enabled water to come to the surface and form the park's natural springs.

A wide variety of wildlife is attracted to the springs, including foxes, coyotes, bobcats and mountain lions. The abundant water supply also supports lush plant life, such as mesquite, willows, Washingtonia palms, and acacias. Depending on the season's rainfall, wildflowers and succulents sometimes put on a colorful show in early spring.

A telescope to view the stars and planets away from city lights will be available. We will sing around the campfire, so bring your musical instruments and voices.

Proposed by-law changes

TO BE VOTED ON AT THE SPRING LUNCHEON ON MAY 29, 2003

Article I.

For some time now we have required all correspondence note that we are **UCSD Oceanids.**

We propose that we change Article I to read:

The name of this organization shall be **UCSD Oceanids** (not just Oceanids, as written).

Article III.

We have different dues categories.

We propose that we change Section I of Article III to read:

Membership shall be open to all persons interested in UCSD. Membership shall be contingent upon payment of dues. (This leaves out the word "annual". This also reflects a change in the wording from "associated with" to "interested in" to comply with University guidelines.)

Article VII.

Nominations and Elections
Section 1. currently reads:

The Nominating Committee shall consist of five (5) voting members and one alternate: Three non-Board members and one alternate shall be elected by the general membership at the annual Spring meeting. Two board members shall be elected by the Board at the first meeting after the installation of new officers. The chairperson shall be elected by the members of the Nominating Committee. All committee members shall serve on the Oceanids Board. The committee shall report its slate of candidates, in writing, to the general membership at least 30 days prior to the election.

It has been noted that in recent years we have been having difficulty establishing a nominating committee that follows our by-laws. To reflect what has proved to be a more effective nominating committee we propose a change in the by-laws with regards to the make-up of the committee.

<u>Proposal:</u> The nominating committee shall consist of five (5) voting members and one alternate: Two members and one alternate not currently serving on the Board of Directors and one continuing nominating committee member shall be elected by the general membership at the annual Spring meeting. At the first meeting presided over by the newly elected President, two current board members shall be elected by the Board of Directors to the nominating committee. The chairperson shall be elected by the members of the Nominating Committee. All committee members shall serve on the UCSD Oceanids Board of Directors. The committee shall report its slate of candidates, in writing, to the general membership at least 30 days prior to the election.

Article VIII.

Section 2: It is proposed that we accept both <u>standard mail-in</u> and <u>electronic ballots</u> when an amendment is to be voted on by a UCSD Oceanids member not present at a regular meeting.
