Transgender Day of Remembrance



Can I get married too? Conversations on the struggle for marriage equality, its implications, and "What's Next?"



Breaking Barriers: Different Imaging on Sexual Orientation



She was the first person I met who understood that the most important part of a campaign is writing and directing the musical. She's my muse.

I could never list all of the ways she is beautiful. She is a combination of art and brilliance and style and passion, knowledge and life, brewed into energy that always gives, energy from which I thrive, because I need her, like ocean water.

And one day it dawned on me that we would be so explosively good together – unstoppable, like weather, or social justice, or gravity, as we gravitate toward the gifts we find in each other's conversation... or midnight kisses. This realization is more than my greatest of wishes.

There are things I used to think and feel that I'm carefully learning to tear apart. Among them, how I rarely dared to share or even hear my heart. She heals my heart.

On one hand, I have all of the messaging that has created the silence, and hiding, the conditioning for me to flee from anything that sought to get close to me, imagining that what I did not have, I did not need.

On the better hand, she stands. And she's more than I can dream. She speaks. She listens to me.

And through this she has begun with me on a journey to rediscover love, that is nothing short of a revolution next to what I used to know. With her, I grow. I think of where I sought to be in a relationship defined by care. With her, I'm there.
