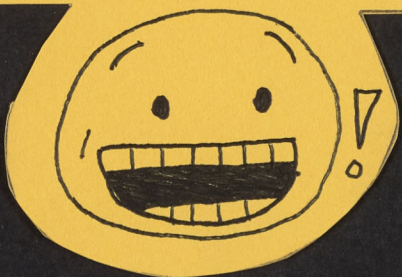

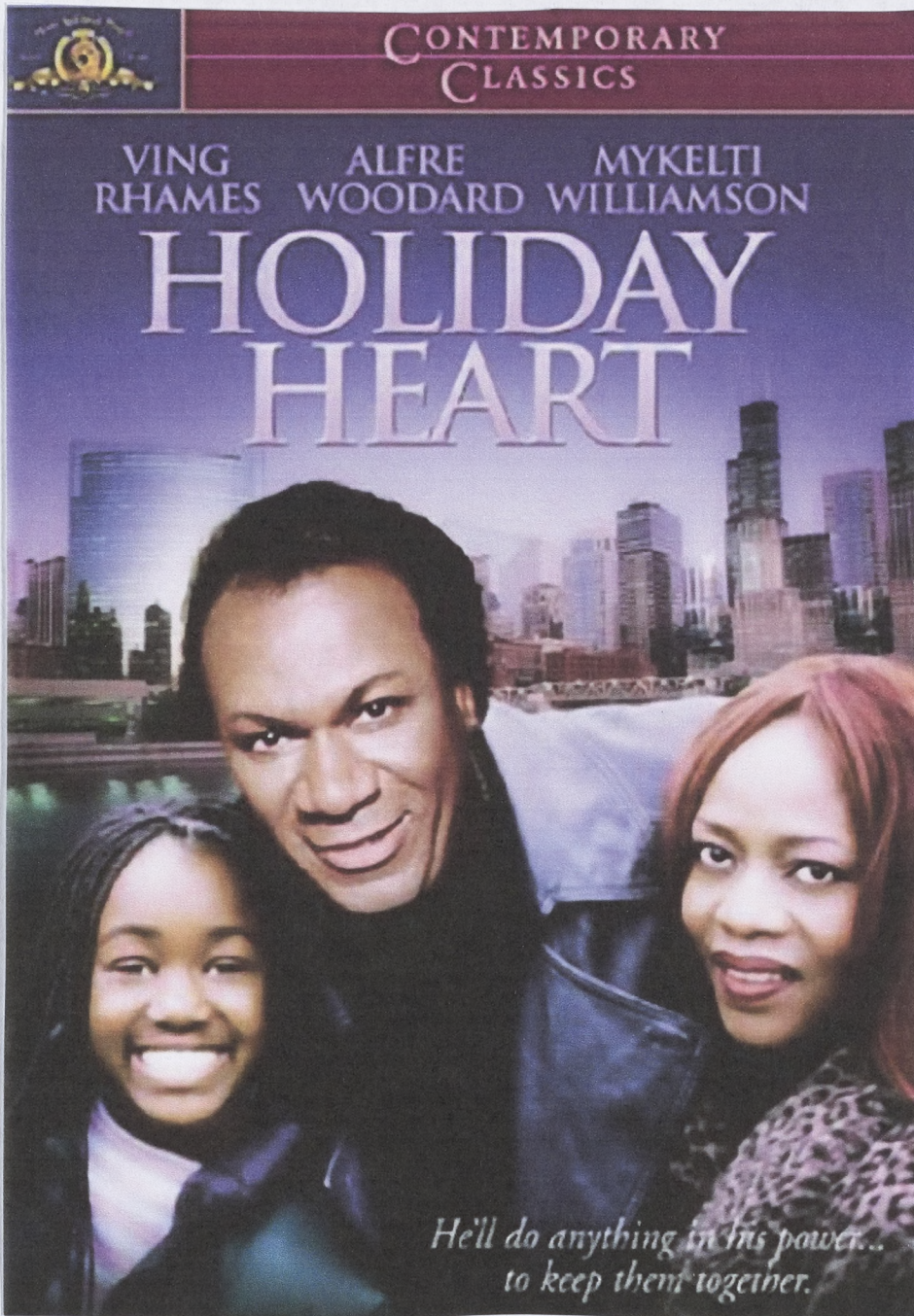

Holiday Heart

Robert Townsend directs an all-star cast featuring Ving Rhames, Mykelti Williamson and Alfre Woodard. Based on the wildly successful stageplay by writer Cheryl L. West, *Holiday Heart* is a "poignant" (The Hollywood Reporter), heartfelt drama about how love can overcome addiction and prejudice. Openly gay choirmaster by day and female impersonator by night, creatively talented Holiday is a lonely man living with a broken heart until he befriends a bright young girl and her drug-addicted mother. Helping them off the street and into an empty apartment across from his, Holiday quickly forms a special bond with them. 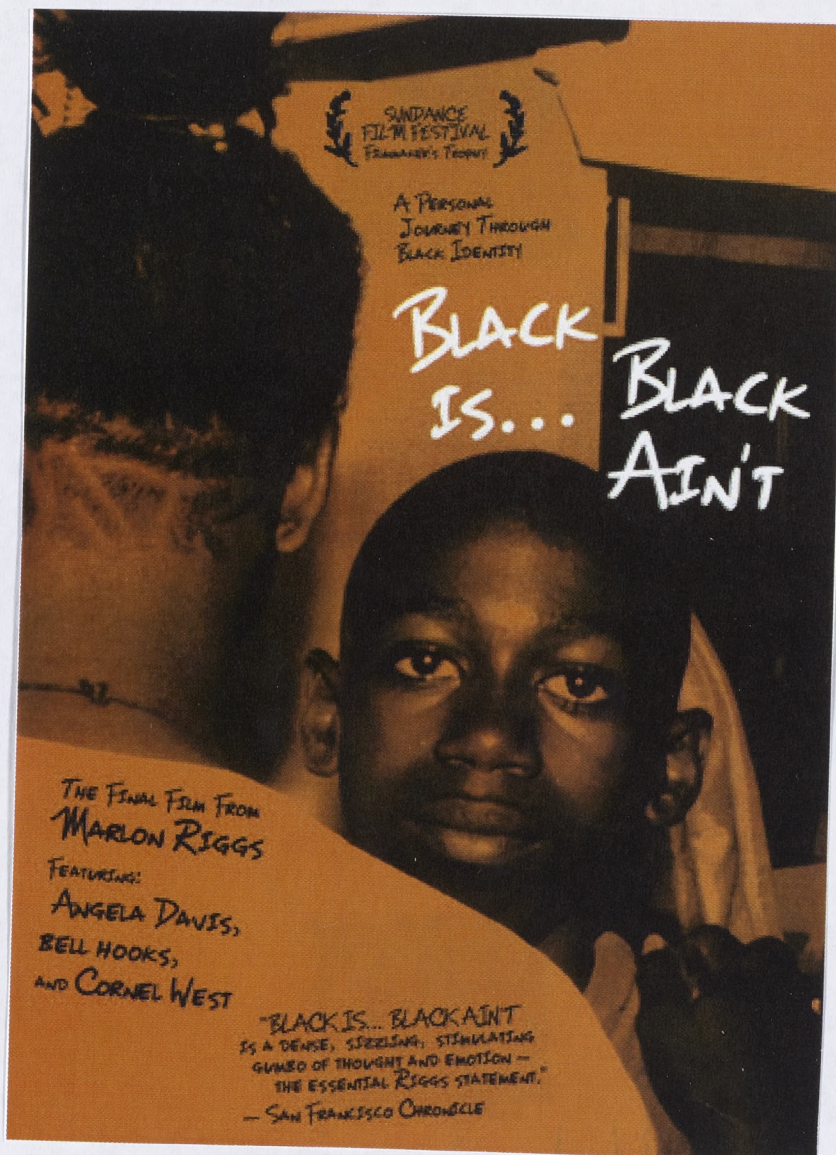

American culture has stereotyped black Americans for centuries. Equally devastating, the late Marlon Riggs argued, have been the definitions of "blackness" African Americans impose upon one another which contain and reduce the black experience. In this film, Riggs meets a cross-section of African Americans grappling with the paradox of numerous, often contradictory definitions of blackness. He shows many who have felt uncomfortable and even silenced within the race because their complexion, class, sexuality, gender, or speech has rendered them "not black enough," or conversely, "too black." The film scrutinizes the identification of "blackness" with masculinity as well as sexism, patriarchy and homophobia in black America.

Becoming an Ally

What is an Ally?

An ally is a member of the agent social group who takes a stand against social injustice directed at target groups (Whites who speak out against racism, men who are anti-sexist). An ally works to be an agent of social change rather than an agent of oppression. When a form of oppression has multiple target groups, as do racism, ableism, and heterosexism, target group members can be allies to other targeted social groups they are not part of (lesbians can be allies to bisexual people, African American people can be allies to Native Americans, blind people can be allies to people who use wheelchairs).

Characteristics of an Ally

- ❖ Feels good about own social group membership; is comfortable and proud of own identity
- ❖ Takes responsibility for learning about own and target group heritage, culture, and experience, and how oppression works in everyday life
- ❖ Listens to and respects the perspectives and experiences of target group members
- ❖ Acknowledges unearned privileges received as a result of agent status and works to eliminate or change privileges into rights that target group members also enjoy
- ❖ Recognizes that unlearning oppressive beliefs and actions is a lifelong process, not a single event, and welcomes each learning opportunity
- ❖ Is willing to take risks, try new behaviors, act in spite of own fear and resistance from other agents
- ❖ Takes care of self to avoid burn-out
- ❖ Acts against social injustice out of a belief that it is in her/his own self-interest to do so
- ❖ Is willing to make mistakes, learn from them, and try again
- ❖ Is willing to be confronted about own behavior and attitudes and consider change
- ❖ Is committed to taking action against social injustice in own sphere of influence
- ❖ Understands own growth and response patterns and when she/he is on a learning edge
- ❖ Understands the connections among all forms of social injustice
- ❖ Believes she/he can make a difference by acting and speaking out against social injustice
- ❖ Knows how to cultivate support from other allies.

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Breaking Barriers: Different Imaging on Sexual Orientation

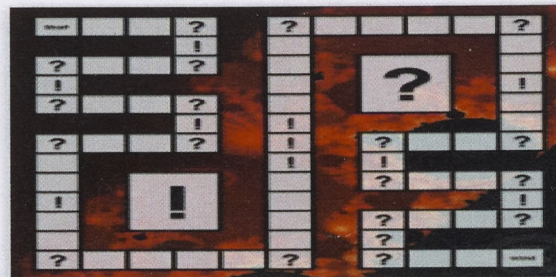

John (Song Pae) Cho

“Faceless Things: South Korean Gay Men, Internet, and Sexual Citizenship”

Date: Friday, March 4, 2011

In this presentation, Cho will examine the connections between the internet and globalization of sexual cultures in one of the most wired and internet-savvy hotspots in the world, South Korea. The explosion of new media (mobile phones, electronic message boards, etc.) has sparked a revolution on this tiny, crowded, and resources-poor but information-rich peninsula. No group has felt its impact more profoundly than South Korean LGBT communities, who have relied on this media technology to covertly express

their sexual identities in a country notorious for regulation of information and sexual conduct. In chronicling two very different ways that South Korean gay men have taken up the internet, Cho will highlight the formation of non-state-sanctioned sub-communities within the Korean nation – ones based more on affect, taste, and lifestyle than on generation, ethnicity, or gender. He will also further a transnational dialogue on what it means to be gay today in face of strident market reforms, neoliberal governance, and global circuits of Internet-mediated queerness.

John (Song Pae) Cho is a doctoral candidate in socio-cultural anthropology at University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign. His research focuses on Korean gay men, internet, and sexual citizenship within the context of South Korea's transition from a late-developmental model of economy, directed by the state, to a global/neoliberal one, driven by individual desires and consumption. Cho's selected publications include “The Wedding Banquet Revisited: ‘Contract Marriages’ Between Korean Gays and Lesbians” (*Anthropological Quarterly*, 2009) and “Korean Gay and Lesbian Movement: 1994-2008: From Identity to Community” (co-authored with Kwon Kim Hyun-young), forthcoming in the edited volume of *Korean Social Movements: From Democracy to Civil Society* (Routledge).
