I had the pleasure of my Dr Gowsins Letter to hear that you were well oh could I but say all here was so fit indeed I cant however take all acc^d: as my time from the poor Creatures will admit me to give you, Sally is allowid from room to room poor Tom is on the turn but so frettfull no one can make him take any thing or keeps in bed but myself poor Dr D is between ill & after 2 days appearance by Phillis or my keeping her in bed all this day its out as thick & lumpy as ever the small pox came out on any one & cant keep up poor little thing to last ought that offer'd her, Molly has been days complaining, as I took her for my bedfellow, I cant say I've had a nights sleep since you went what with my fears for you & her restlessness, & today its out thick on her oh Tom my did you not see or was you blind & could have expected otherwise when you left me my case is hard yet I must not complain I've been ill ever since Sunday, the only comfort is I am not with those scared had 6 weeks ago & nought to comfort me but very room with a sick child except you who lies forsaken for my Lodging is here & there however let it pass whatever I meet w^m shall for the future Lye in my breast & I submit to my God for his will to be done with me as he sees fitting, I wont upbraid you at any of my complaints more before you but offer up my
