

An Ordinance fixing water rates of the San Diego  
Flume Company

The Board of Supervisors of the County of San Diego,  
do ordain as follows:

**Section 1.**

That the rates or compensation to be collected by the San Diego Flume Company, a corporation engaged in the business of supplying water for irrigation and other purposes to the inhabitants of the County of San Diego for the year commencing April fifteenth 1891, are hereby fixed as follows:

1. All water furnished by said company under this ordinance shall be furnished and delivered to the purchasers or users thereof, at the main flume or aqueduct of the San Diego Flume Company.

2. It shall be the duty of said company to furnish the water sold hereunder in a continuous flow from the time it is taken and paid for, to the expiration of the time limited for the operation of this ordinance, for the compensation hereinafter provided for

3. The maximum compensation allowed said Company shall be and is hereby fixed at the sum of one hundred and twenty dollars (\$120.00) for each inch of water furnished hereunder for not less than one year after the establishment thereof by this ordinance, and until established anew or abrogated by the Board of Supervisors, as provided by statute.

**Section 2.**

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after April 15th 1891; and the rates herein fixed shall continue until this ordinance is revoked or the rates herein fixed changed in accordance with law.

**Section 3.**

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Gentlemen:-

The Joint Committee appointed by your Honorable body with James D. Schuyler and James P. Goodwin under joint Resolution Number 5, passed May 19th, 1890, and being hereto attached have completed their labors and submit the following:

Your committee has held eight sessions and after giving close attention to all matters connected with the subject of obtaining cheaper water for the city and its inhabitants unanimously submit this report with recommendations.

FIRST:- Your committee finds from the books of the Auditor that the sum of \$326000 in bonds may be voted for the purpose of laying a system of water pipes and necessary reservoir without exceeding the limit prescribed by law for municipal indebtedness; the report of the sub-committee of this committee is also attached showing the probable cost of an entire system of water pipes for the city; also the documents containing two propositions from the San Diego Flume Company and an agreement in the sum of one hundred thousand dollars to faithfully perform all the conditions of the proposition; also a communication from the Pamo Water Company.

After a very careful consideration we recommend for your approval and adoption the first proposition of the San Diego Flume Company, being as follows:

"The San Diego Flume Company will furnish the City of San Diego and the citizens thereof all the pure mountain water needed for public or domestic uses in said city on the following terms to wit:

To accept the rates now established by said city & to go into effect on the 1st day of July, 1890, for all domestic uses and to furnish all the water for municipal purposes, to wit: For City buildings, flushing sewers, sprinkling streets, fire hydrants and irrigation of City park, such quantity of water not to exceed three hundred millions gallons annually, said water for municipal purposes



to be furnished for thirty thousand dollars, payable in equal monthly installments.

"The proposition is based upon the construction of a water distributing system to be constructed by said City of San Diego connecting this said Flume Company's pipe line and leased to the said San Diego Flume Company for a term of years, for the use of which the said Flume Company agrees to pay an annual rental equal to ten per cent of the cost of said distributing system, said payments to be made quarterly from the time of commencing the use of said system.

"Further we agree to abide by this proposition and hold ourselves in readiness to execute to said city a legally binding contract any time within sixty days from this date.

"It is however understood that any reduction in water rates as now fixed to take effect July 1st, 1890, or any reduction in the amount to be received by said Flume Company under the stipulations of this proposition without the consent of said Flume Company shall release it from any and all obligations herein contained."

We also recommend that an ordinance be prepared according to law by the City Attorney for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of said city the proposition of voting the issue of bonds in the sum of \$326000 for the purpose of laying a system of water pipes and necessary reservoirs; we further recommend that all moneys received as rentals from said San Diego Flume Company should said proposition be accepted, be set apart as a special fund for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and the redemption of the same and for the repair and extension of said water pipe system and that the interest and payment of the bonds take precedence over any repairs and extension of said system.

To the Water Committee of the City Council:-

Gentlemen:

The undersigned, directors of the San Diego Flume Company, desiring to join the City in the present movement to secure for the municipality and the inhabitants thereof, a plentiful supply of pure water at such rates as will lead to its abundant use in irrigating lawns, trees and public parks, as well as to a large reduction in insurance rates, hereby make the following propositions which we are ready to embody in a form of a preliminary or permanent contract; the contract between this Company and the San Diego and Coronado Water Company having been determined, to take effect on July 5th, 1890.

Proposition No.1. The San Diego Flume Company will lease any water distributing system which the City may construct connecting with its present pipe line, and in consideration of said lease, this Company will furnish the City during the term of such lease, all the water required for municipal purposes, to wit: For City buildings, flushing of sewers, sprinkling of streets, fire hydrants and irrigation of City parks; such quantity of water, however, not to exceed Three hundred million (300,000,000) gallons of water in any one year. This Company also agrees to supply the inhabitants of the City at such rates as have been fixed by the last ordinance, which takes effect July 1st, 1890, but it must be understood and inserted in any contract or lease that the fixing of any lower rates without the consent of the Company, shall release it from any and all obligations under such contract.

Proposition No.2. In case the City wishes to construct its own water system and do its own distributing to customers, we will furnish the City the entire supply of water to be distributed by such plant or system at ten cents for each and every thousand gallons of water so furnished.

Gentlemen:

The undersigned Directors of the San Diego Flume Co. hereby propose to obligate ourselves to furnish the City of San Diego and the Citizens thereof all the pure mountain water needed for public or domestic uses in said City on the following terms, to wit: To accept the rates now established by said City & to go into effect on the 1st day of July, 1890, for all domestic uses and to furnish all the water required for municipal purposes, to wit: for City buildings, flushing of sewers, sprinkling of streets, fire hydrants, and irrigation of City Parks, such quantity of water not to exceed three hundred million (300,000,000) gallons annually, said water for municipal purposes to be furnished for thirty thousand dollars per annum payable in equal monthly installments. This proposition is based upon the construction of a water distributing system to be constructed by said City of San Diego connecting with said Flume Co.'s pipe line and leased to the said San Diego Flume Company for a term of years, for the use of which the said Flume Company agree to pay an annual rental equal to ten per cent of the cost of said distributing system, said payments to be made quarterly from the time of commencing the use of said system.

Further we agree to abide by this proposition & hold ourselves in readiness to execute to said city a legally binding contract any time within sixty<sup>(60)</sup> days from this date.

It is ~~not~~ however understood that any reduction in water rates as now fixed to take effect July 1st, 1890, or any reduction in the amount to be received by said Flume Co. under the stipulations of this proposition without the consent of said Flume Co. shall release it from any and all obligations herein contained.

Proposition No. 2. In case the City wishes to construct its own water system and do its own distributing to consumers we will furnish the city the entire supply of water to be distributed by such plant or system at ten (10) cents ~~per~~ for each one thousand gallons of

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Joint Resolution No. 3.

Whereas, in the opinion of the Common Council of the City of San Diego, the question of obtaining a bountiful water supply at cheap rates, for fire protection, domestic uses, and other purposes within the City, is of the utmost importance, and

Whereas, under the existing law in the matter of fixing water rates yearly, it is utterly impossible to fix such rates to the satisfaction of both consumer and distributor, which causes this question to be continually agitated to the great detriment of the best interests of our city, all of which goes to convince the Council of its duty to solve, if possible, this water question, by originating some plan by which the City can become the owner of its water distributing system, and procure cheap water, thereby doing away with the annual water rate agitation, and

Whereas, the Mayor in his annual report and message recommends that this water question be taken up by the Common Council and duly considered,

Therefore, be it resolved by the Common Council of the City of San Diego, that the Water Committee of the Board of Aldermen and the Water Committee of the Board of Delegates, together with J. D. Schuyler of the Board of Public Works and James P. Goodwin, City Attorney, be and they are hereby appointed a Special Water Committee for the purpose of investigating said question, and at as early a date as possible report to the Council such recommendations, plans and suggestions as to said Committee seem proper as a solution of this important question.

Board of Public Works.

San Diego, Cal., June 5th, 1890 .

To the Water Committee.

Gentlemen:

We your sub-committee appointed to lay out a comprehensive system of water distributing mains for this city, hereby submit a map on which we have laid a system that we consider ample for a population of 50,000 inhabitants in the area covered, with a capacity of 10,000,000 gallons daily. It is characterized by three large mains 18 inches in diameter down into the heart of the city, with 12 inch distributing cross mains every four blocks on the east and west streets, and no pipe smaller than four inches. We have estimated on bringing a 30 inch wooden stave pipe from what we call the initial point, i.e., at the intersection of the central avenue of Teralta with the east boundary of the Pueblo, which is the present terminus of the Flume Co.'s pipe down to the north line of the Park, or the eastern prolongation of that line. Thence west along the north line of the Park with 24 inch pipe to the central boulevard, continuing west to 5th st. with 18 inch, and south through the Park to 16th st. with an 18 inch pipe. From the south end of the 30 inch line an 18 inch wood pipe is projected south to 30th & A Sts. and down 30th St. into Reed & Hubbell's Addition. From these 12 inch mains cross mains connect with the 16th & 3d St. mains. The system is more comprehensive than present necessities call for, and a large portion of it may advantageously be omitted, but we think its large capacity and abundant supply for all purposes will recommend it to the good sense of ~~this~~ committee, and although subject to modification we deem it in general the plan which should be adopted, and so recommend. It only remains to select what portion of the system may be constructed with the funds available.

ADJOURNED MEETING.

Office of the Board of Trustees of the City of  
San Diego, Cal., July 21, 1886.

The Board of Trustees of the City of San Diego met at half past seven o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Present: Trustees J.G. Sloane, W.W. Stewart, Wm.H. Carlson, Chas.S. Hamilton, and G. Frank Judson, and Clerk H.T. Christian.

President of the Board Chas.S. Hamilton in the chair.

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By unanimous consent the Board now take up for consideration the proposition of the San Diego Flume Company to furnish the city with water for municipal purposes. A written agreement between said Company and the city is now read, by which the said Flume Co. agree to furnish the city, delivered at a place to be designated by the Board on the City Park or at a place within one half mile thereof 700,000 gallons of water per day at the rate of ten cents per M. gallons, and said city to pay for not less than 700,000 per day, for a term of years (stated in blank) and said Company to have eighteen months in which to comply with its contract, &c.

Trustee Judson, seconded by Trustee Sloane, moves that the city enter into said contract. During discussion of the matter the President of the Board reads a letter from Geo.D. Copeland, President of the San Diego Flume Co. withdrawing the proposition of the Company. Upon further discussion of the matter Trustee Stewart calls for the vote upon the motion of Trustee Judson and asks that the ayes and nays be called and recorded thereon. The motion being put, the vote stood Trustee Sloane, Yea; Trustee Stewart, Nay; Trustee Carlson, Nay; Trustee Hamilton, Nay; Trustee Judson, Yea; the motion was thereupon declared lost. Trustee Carlson states that this matter had been in the hands of the Committee on Fire & Water, and as a member of that Committee he had examined into the question some, but that the proposition was of considerable magnitude, and he desired further time in which to make further investigations, and as the Flume Co. demanded that the Board take action thereon at this meeting, he was under the circum-



stances in duty bound to vote against it, and would now give notice that at the next meeting of the Board he would move a reconsideration of the vote just had.

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On motion the Board adjourns to Monday, July 26th, 1886, at 7:30 h.p.m.
