FOLLOWING IS A BRIEF DISCRPTION OF OUR INTEREST GROUP ACTIVITIES

BRIDGE

The Day Bridge Group meets the first and third Tuesday during the Academic year. The meetings are held in the homes of the members and a simple luncheon is served. This year those who join the Day Bridge Group will be asked to contribute one dollar as a donation to the Library Fund.

GOURMET SUPPER

The Gourmet Group meets once a month (usually the first Friday) in a member's home to enjoy a social hour followed by dinner prepared by the host couple-with perhaps a helper from the group assisting them. A maximum price has been established by the group (\$2.50 per person), and it is amazing to find that really delicious food and wine can be served within this budget.

PEOPLE TO PEOPLE

People to people was organized in accordance with the ideals of the national People-to-People program to promote scientific, cultural, and material exchange with similar institutions abroad. Our project has been an exchange with Escuela Superior de Ciencias Marinas, Universidad Autonoma de Baja California at Ensenada along with collections of books for special programs.

Last year's special events included a University Family Home Architectural Tour (to raise funds for the year), a fun day in Ensenada as guests of faculty wives of ESCM, and the annual May visit to SIO by faculty, wives and students of ESCM. As a result of last year's programs aimed at reappraisal of aims and possible activities, interests, and women power, we plan to add a different activity to our present exchange program-which is taking a new and exciting form.

CONTEMPORARY ISSUES

These are after-dinner meetings without husbands. The goal of this group is to facilitate comprehension of topics to be picked from the many issues in the foreground at present. Speakers of competence in the selected areas will help the members with inquiry and discussion.

LUNCHEONS

Beginning in November, the OCEANIDS Luncheon Group intends to present a monthly series of luncheon meetings, to be held every second Wednesday, at which significant topics will be presented by invited speakers and discussed by the members. In addition, tours will be conducted; these will include local scientific institutions and museums. We hope to present a truly exciting and contemporary series of meetings in which individual members can play a significant part.

Members will be notified of time, place and topic approximately one week prior to luncheon.

COMMUNITY CONCERNS

If you are interested in your local community this group may be just what you are looking for, and we would like to hear about your favorite cause and you can listen to ours. The group meets about once a month to discuss matters of interest to the San Diego area. In the past we have studied the community education report, the canyon college plan of Judy Munk, the high-rise question, the San Clemente Canyon freeway plan, and attended city council meetings. What we will do in the coming months depends upon the interest shown at the first meeting. 10 a.m. Wednesday, 9450 La Jolla Shores Drive (The R Bus stops at the door'.) We hope to be over in time to join the luncheon group for their meetings.

SEWING

The sewing group was among the first of the interest groups launched by the OCEANIDS in the early days of UCSD (UCLJ). Its primary aim is simply sociability, although if someone has a special talent to display or a special interest to develop, meetings could be so oriented. There are no demands made, no qualifications expected, and the proficiency in needlework may range from sewing on buttons to advanced tailoring. SCULPTURE FOR MEDICAL SCHOOL

"Talmudic Conference," a piece of sculpture depicting seven Jewish scholars reading and studying around a table, has been presented to the School of Medicine at the University of California, San Diego, by Mr. and Mrs. Al Lichtenberg of Sherman Oaks.

Mr. and Mrs. Lichtenberg worked together on the sculpture. Mrs. Lichtenberg is an accomplished artist; Lichtenberg, now 71 years old, began attending sculpting classes at a park only 1 1/2 years ago. Lichtenberg said his wife and his Jewish upbringing inspired him to choose that particular subject for their sculpture. "I was brought up in a very orthodox home," Lichtenberg said, "and I saw the men reading and studying at the temple for many years."

Lichtenberg said he hoped the sculpture would inspire the young medical students who must study so hard to achieve their goal. Lichtenberg has a son who is a doctor. Lichtenberg valued the piece at \$675 on the basis of prices paid for other pieces of their work. The Lichtenbergs are now making only Jewish pieces.

INTERNATIONAL CENTER NEWS

The University International Association and Chancellor Mc Gill will give a reception honoring new foreign students and scholars and their wives. This annual party brings together UCSD's foreign scholars and the many townspeople and faculty members who have shown a special interest in helping them and their families by offering initial housing and friendship, teaching English, making loans, and organizing sight-seeing trips. The San Diego Consular Corps is also invited to the reception planned during United Nations Week. Food from various countries will be served and guests will be entertained by international folk dancers. The place is the University House; the time 8 o'clock on October 25. Hopefully, next year's party will be at UCSD's own International Center.

The first stage of the plan for the International Center of the UCSD campus has now been reached. Over \$130,000 has been committed, which will allow the first one-storied building to be erected. This is a culmination of a fund raising campaign inaugurated by the International Center Board in 1964, when it closed the International Center on Eads Avenue in downtown La Jolla and began to make plans and raise funds for a permanent building on or adjacent to the UCSD campus. A very small group of La Jolla professional women, Zonta International, provided the first Center in 1961. The Zontians have given many money raising events for the Center and have continued to work on this project with the University International Association and many members of the community over the last eight years.

Many donors from La Jolla, San Diego, Rancho Santa Fe, as well as from Dallas, Texas, and other parts of the world have contributed to the International Center. The late General Rodriguez, former President of Mexico, was the first large donor. Recent gifts have come from Leif Sverdrup of St. Louis. Leif Sverdrup is the younger brother of the late, famous Norwegian explorer and oceanographer Harold Sverdrup, former Director of Scripps Institution of Oceanography. Cecil and Ida Green and P. H. Johnston are responsible for the very large gifts which make 1968 a major milestone in reaching the goal for an International Center. Additional funds are still needed to complete the International Center complex. A large fashion show is being planned for early spring to raise money for furnishings.

The Center will be available for use by the foreign scholars and students, now numbering 400, on the UCSD campus. Naturally, it will also be open to all other UCSD students and interested townspeople, for it is hoped that the Center will be a truly international meeting place.

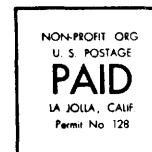
