

Foster Rhea Dulles will address UCSD audiences

Foster Rhea Dulles, famed historian of American diplomacy, and cousin of both John Foster Dulles and Allen Welsh Dulles, will lecture on "American Policy in Eastern Asia - Beyond Vietnam" on Thursday, March 28.

The lecture, which is free and open to the public, will begin at 8:00 p.m. in room 2722, Undergraduate Sciences Building at UCSD.

Professor Dulles is presently Visiting Distinguished Professor of American Diplomatic History at the University of New Mexico. He has served on the teaching faculties of Smith College and Swarthmore College, and for 25 years was Professor of History at Ohio State University, where he now holds an emeritus position.

Professor Dulles received an A.B. degree from Princeton and a Ph.D. from Columbia University. He has taught at the Salzburg Seminar for American Studies; at the American University of Beirut, and at various Indian universities on a lecture tour under the auspices of the Educational Exchange Service of the State Department.

He participated in a State Department cultural mission to the Soviet Union in 1949 and, in 1961-62, served as a Fulbright lecturer to the University of Tokyo.

Professor Dulles has a number of publications to his credit, among them, "America in the Pacific," "China and America," "America's Rise to World Power," "Yankees and Samurai," and "The Imperial Years."
