

Peter Everwine to read poetry

Poet Peter Everwine will present a reading of his works at 4 p.m. Wednesday, Nov. 16, in the Revelle Formal Lounge at the University of California, San Diego.

Everwine, who describes his own work as "the perfect marriage of form and content . . . he was silent," is the author of "In the House of Light," "Collecting the Animals" and "Keeping the Night." In 1972 he received the Lamont Poetry Award and the following year was a nominee for the National Book Award. He has also been awarded fellowships by the National Endowment for the Arts and the Guggenheim Foundation.

A contributor to the Fresno poetry movement, Everwine has taught at Fresno State for several years. He was born in Detroit in 1930 and was raised in western Pennsylvania, attending many schools before becoming a writer in Fresno.

The New Poetry Series is sponsored by the Archive for New Poetry, the Departments of Literature and Visual Arts and the University Events Office. All readings are taped and become a part of the Archive located on the eighth floor of the UC San Diego Central University Library.
