Dear Dr. Huan Hsiang,

While I have been attending an international meeting of scientists in Quebec, called by Bertrand Russell, I met my friend Professor Jerome Wiesner, head of the Research Laboratory for Electronics, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Cambridge, Mass., who also attended this meeting. He told me on this occasion that Governor Adlai Stevenson is going on a tour around the world and might be able to visit China if invited to do so by the Chinese Government, and he asked my advice on how to communicate this information to the Chinese Government. I told him that I had met you last January, in London, and could take up the matter with you.

As you may remember, I went to see you with a letter of introduction from Joseph Needham, of Cambridge, England, to discuss with you a project aimed at setting up a Biological Research Institute, with Russian and American cooperation, for developing some method of birth control that may be adequate for the needs of the less industrialised nations. I shall return to this point in a subsequent letter, after completing the consultations in which I am at present engaged on this side of the Atlantic.

In the meantime I should appreciate your informing me whether you have been able to take any action in connection with Governor Stevenson's projected journey. You may wish to send a copy of your letter directly to Professor Jerome Wiesner, to whom I am sending a copy of this letter.



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

Dear Dr. Huan Hsiang:


Your letter of April 30th was forwarded to me in Boston. When I wrote you from Quebec, I acted on the initiative of Prof. Jerome B. Wiesner, who spoke to me subsequent to a conversation which he had with Governor Stevenson. Because I am not fully informed on all the details of this matter, I think it best that Prof. Wiesner write to you directly.

Prof. Wiesner is out of town, and I may not see him before he returns to Boston. I am therefore leaving with his secretary copy of the correspondence which you and I have had in this matter, with the request that he contact you directly and supply you with information requested in your letter of April 30th. I assume that he would want to talk to Governor Stevenson upon his return to Boston and prior to writing to you. For this reason, you may expect a short delay before hearing from him.

Perhaps I should add, for your information, that Prof. Wiesner is Director of the Research Laboratory of Electronics of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Cambridge, Mass., and he is also a member of the President's Science Advisory Committee in Washington, D.C.

Dear Dr. Huan Hsiang:

I wrote you on May 8 in answer to your letter of May 30, and I am now writing again in connection with the same matter.

In the meantime, I have been informed that the situation has changed since I first wrote you from Quebec on April 11, and that no useful purpose would be served at this time if you were to extend the invitation suggested in my letter of April 11.

Right now, I personally am quite distressed by the political executions that have taken place in Hungary. It is difficult for me to see what good anyone may have thought that they would do, and only too easy to see the harm that they are going to do.

I might have to fly to Moscow for a two-weeks visit and should I return to America by way of London, I would make a point of calling on you, if your time permits. I have not lost interest in the problem of control of family size which we discussed on my last visit to London and am still seeking ways and means for making progress on this problem.
