

Poet Carl Rakosi will read selections from his works for New Poetry Series

Poet Carl Rakosi will read selections from his work at 4:00 p.m. Wednesday, March 5, in the Student Center Lounge at the University of California, San Diego.

The program, which is free and open to the public, is the fourth of five readings in the UCSD New Poetry Series during the Winter Quarter.

Published collections of his poetry include "Selected Poems" (published by New Directions in 1941), "Amulet" (1967) and "Ere-Voice" (1971). His poetry has also appeared in "The Paris Review," "The Nation," "The Massachusetts Review" and "Sumac"

Rakosi has been associated with the "objectivist" movement and his work appeared along with poetry by Louis Zukofsky, George Oppen and William Carlos Williams in the "Objectivists Anthology" in 1932.

Although he is best known for his poetry, Rakosi has served as a director of the Jewish Family and Children's Service in Minneapolis for a number of years and has been engaged in private practice of psychotherapy since 1955.

The next program in the reading series will feature Adrienne Rich at 4:00 p.m. Monday, March 10, in the Recital Hall of UCSD's Mandeville Center for the Arts.
