

California Spring with Mustard Plants and Renoir by Odette Filloux

It's the season when the hills of Southern California spring up with the yellow hues of the mustard plants. In my native country, on a Mediterranean shore, they also used to flower at about the same time, withthe same exuberance and lightness. We called them in French, "ravenelles" and the "elle" sound at the e seemed to insist on their buoyancy, as it carried them up into the spring breeze.

For me there is nothing more joyous than the sight of these dark green and already slightly browned hills suddenly becoming alive with the yellow flowers and the tender green leaves of the mustard plants.

But more than the color what enchants me the most is the newly gained intricacy of the landscape which, with their blossoming, has instantly acquired a third dimension: that of depth and volume. The plant which is neither too tall nor too dense allows the light to filter through it, and with the soil as its background, is given space to breathe. The eyes of the onlooker can wander in and out, reflecting upon the various distances, never a prisoner of a single viewpoint. And each year, at some point in time, will always come to my mind, superimposed onto the California landscape, one of Renoir's painting or is it Monet's?, or maybe both? ** It represents a hilly field slightly inclined towards the viewer, with a child running down through the blossoming flowers. In the painting like in the landscape, the same feeling of depth, is made tangible by the rendering of the fluffy and light yellow of the scattered flowers, and allows you choices of perspectives. As if liberated, you experience a sense of freedom as your roving eyes delight in the various possibilities of tones, shapes and depths. You are reminded that indeed the world is not flat! It is not dull, lifeless and stale (even when it is projected on a flat canvas... thanks to the hands of a master painter).

And, as you look back once more to the rounded hills and contemplate them in their spring splendor, forgetting the painting, you are led anew to your own delight soon to realize that you too are the master of your world, as you recreate it through your personal viewing, from this offered multiplicity and depth, into a unique vision, all of your own.

It's only because of this writing that, after so many years, I finally made the effort to identify the painting. I found out that it was indeed a Renoir. I had seen it no doubt a long long time ago at the "Jeu de Paume" in Paris which was then housing the Impressionists; today the painting called "Chemin montant dans les herbes", Path climbing through the grass must be at the Quai d'Orsay.

When recently I looked at a good reproduction of it, I realized that I had retained in my mind only certain portions of the painting: the hilly field, the yellow flowers, and one single child walking down through the grass. Obviously those were the features that I had needed in my recollection to allow me to pair the painting with the landscape, and I believe that it is because the landscape and the painting both enabled me to apprehend "space" in its essential third dimension of depth, with in both cases a similar feeling of joy, ease, and lightness, that I came over the years to always associate them one with the other.

Conclusion of **Letters from Hungary:** Hungary's National Day.

Let me describe the appearance of the police. They wore black shirts that said Rendorseg (the Hungarian word for police) and Police on the back. They had black helmets with plexi shields in front, and a neck protector in the back like Darth Vader's. Black pants. Rigid leg protectors ankle up to a knee-cap extension. Shields half see-through plastic, half black. Protective vests like the US bullet-proof vests. Actually quite scary when they are shoulder to shoulder with shields up. Lots of people in the (not too big) crowd had cameras, snapping photos of the police.

We went into a Turkish restaurant and ordered dinner. We could hear whistles etc. outside and watched the police out the window. When we were finished with dinner we went outside, up to the corner to see what was happening. Now traffic was stopped. There was apparently some trouble around the corner and people started running. Two old ladies trundled by, saying in an agitated way, dictator, dictator! We then saw people with streaming eyes, the police had fired tear gas. We ducked into a KFC restaurant with some other people, including a mother carrying a crying little girl. A guy in the restaurant told us the police were spraying pink paint at the demonstrators and other people on the side of the street (to identify them later?). The police re-formed right in front of the KFC with a tanker truck (the paint) and a jeep with small rocket launcher mounted - the teargas launcher. Ahead of all this were three policemen with rifles. The government had already stated that they would fire rubber bullets if need be.

The manager of the KFC, a young woman, locked the doors of the restaurant and turned off all the lights. We all looked out the windows at the unfolding scene. We could see the demonstrators a block away. It was the police's intention to push them back block by block, and they proceeded to do

that. When they came to an intersection they formed a square, so that all four sides of the intersection had police facing down the street. I am currently reading a book about Julius Caesar and this is all just as Caesar describes the battalion of a Centurion (100 legionaires with shields and swords)! We could see people with vests on labelled PRESS and a number, taking film and talking to the police. It may be that many of the "police" were actually soldiers brought in for this purpose.

When the bulk of the police were at least a block away, the manager unlocked the doors and we left. We never did see the demonstrators up close at all. The smell of tear gas was in the streets, and on the main street near our apartment it was pungent and stinging.

At 9:30 pm tonight I watched one half hour of a special presentation of the demonstration. In the whole half hour there was no footage of the demonstrators, only of the police and their actions. Either the Press were not allowed near the demonstrators, or this station deliberately did not show any footage of the demonstrators. The demonstrators tore down some wood scaffolding and set these on fire which firemen put out. **Judith Wesling**

The Center is at the hub of the growing University Center neighborhood. When I arrived at the private luncheon and tour preceding the dedication, I was greeted by the Community Relations Coordinator, Alejandra R. Soltelo-Solis. She told me that she had received an Oceanids Student Award, and was thrilled and grateful to have been chosen. As I chatted with this engaging and accomplished young woman I felt very proud to be an Oceanid. I was also grateful for efforts of the Oceanids who work to raise the funds for the six Undergraduate Service Awards every year. I admire Carol Schultz for her dedication in overseeing the Fellowships and Student Service Awards over the years. Oceanids make a positive difference in student's lives.

The Student Services Center was designed to serve the needs of current and enrolling students at both the undergraduate and graduate levels. It is also the first stop for the more than 40,000 visitors to the campus each year. Gathered on this site are the Triton Center, the offices of the Registrar's, Central Cashier's, Financial Aid, Admissions and Enrollment Services Information Technology, Student Business Services, Graduate Studies, Associate Vice-Chancellor of International Affairs, Assistant Vice-Chancellor/Director of Admissions and Enrollment Services. Sexual Assault and Prevention Resource Center, Academic Integrity Coordinator, Student Research and Information, Vice-Chancellor Student Affairs Resource Analysis Student Policies and Judicial Affairs, the Student Office of Human Affairs, the Community Law Project, the Student Conduct Coordinator, and two restaurants. It is an amazingly vital, cohesive, and energetic addition to the University.



It is also a "green building" with tiles made from recycled glass, and partitions and countertops from recycled plastic. I loved the color palette that featured toned gold and blue, especially the dyed concrete floors. It is a jewel, with amazing views from the top terraces.
