Along for the Ride Coming to terms with her dad was quite a trip for Lisa Kron

Lisa Kron is chatting amiably outside the La Jolla Playhouse on a recent morning when -- whooooosh -- a tiny, feathered torpedo goes screeching past, missing her nose by a wing's width.

The little visitor is either a) a disgruntled hummingbird, or b) an emissary dispatched straight from Metaphor Central.

Odd and random events, it seems, have a way of dive-bombing into Kron's life from out of the ether -- and Kron has a way of cobbling these experiences into monologues and theater pieces whose glue is confessional humor and a highly adventurous stage sense.

The latest example of Kron's solo tale-spinning is "2.5 Minute Ride," which premieres Tuesday at the La Jolla Playhouse. Directed by her onetime drama professor, Lowry Marshall, the piece is about the annual pilgrimage by Kron's family to an amusement park in Ohio -- but not exactly. It's about her brother's wedding, and her saucy dreams of Dean Martin, and being a lesbian in the Midwest -- but not quite those, either.

What "2.5" is really about, amid the laughs and the scattershot storytelling, is Kron's father, and her coming-to-terms with their relationship: "It's my way of making a legacy for him," as she puts it.

In the piece, Kron (pronounced "krone") tells of taking a trip to Poland with her dad to visit the Auschwitz concentration camp, where his own parents met their deaths at the hands of the Nazis. The Poland vignettes -- sometimes chilling, sometimes wickedly humorous -- bob around like mines in the narrative, and their impact, on paper anyway, draws deeply from their contrast with the rest of the material.

"Lowry and I always talk about what I believe to be the missing chip in my head; I have a hard time looking at a big picture," Kron says, explaining her writing technique. "I have a hard time constructing a plot, for instance. So I always tend to write in these short spurts and then layer them."

It's the same method that brought Kron success with "101 Humiliating Stories," her previous solo show, produced in her adopted home of Manhattan and nominated for a 1994-1995 Drama Desk Award. That show, though, was more whimsical, more campy, more . . . fabulous. It boasted story titles like "Geeky Celebrity Encounters" and "Embarrassing Behavior as a Temporary Employee," and had Kron biting nails over the prospect of returning to Michigan for her high-school reunion as a self-professed "big lesbian."

With "2.5," Kron and director Marshall have trimmed away much of the staginess. The show promises to be quieter and more meditative, yet in many ways cut closer to the bone.

"In previous performances, I've written as a vehicle for performing, and I've felt that my talents lay in that area, much more than as a writer," Kron says. "In our weeks of work, what I've come to realize is that the reverse is true here. The writing is sort of the point of this

"We realized that the more we did -- the more staging we did, the more kind of physical illustration of the story I did in the telling of it, that we were actually losing by doing that, instead of gaining."

Marshall sees ample opportunity for Kron to exploit her physical-comedy talents in the show. "But I agree that what's important here is the story, and her relationship to it. . . . We've been sort of like Edison in our rehearsal period. We've discovered thousands of things that don't work in order to find out what does."

Family follies

Kron's script is laced with gentle sendups of her family ("They say they don't like to be depicted as eccentric, but secretly they love it, I think") and its adventures in Middle America. The annual voyage to the Cedar Point theme park, and Kron's attempt to document it as part of a video tribute to her dad, become recurring themes. The place is like the family's Lourdes; Kron's kin is, in their own slightly hyperbolic words, "so crippled up we can hardly walk."

"In addition to being crippled they are also in great, great pain," Kron tells us in the script. "They gasp and moan with pain all day. It is in this state that my family, once a year, tackles a 15-acre amusement park." The "sad truth," she also confesses in "2.5," is this: "My family comes to Cedar Point for the food." (A culinary tip: "Health food in the Midwest is anything in a pita. Like a Big Mac in a pita would be considered health food.")

An anxious moment in the story comes when Kron takes her father on the Mean Streak, "a new wooden roller coaster with a 2.5-minute ride." Problem is, midway through, dad doesn't look so well.

"2.5 minutes is a really long time on a roller coaster if you're having a good time," Kron writes. "If you think the experience is killing your father, it's a really, really long time. For a split second I can see Mary (Kron's videographer friend) selling the video to `A Current Affair.' The lead-in will go: `Bizarre murder! Lesbian forces blind Holocaust victim on roller coaster. Kills own father.'

Her father survived just fine -- and Kron grudgingly acknowledges that by writing this piece, she stepped off the creative roller coaster perhaps better for the ride.

"It was therapeutic, although I hate to admit that," she says. "I dearly hope that the result is not that you see my therapy onstage. I think that's the most inexcusable thing in a solo performer."

She pauses for a moment, pondering the impulses that led her to create the show, as though not quite sure she can explain them. "I hate to say these things in an interview because they sound so grandiose in a certain way, but . . . there's work that you do because you're doing your work, and then there's other work you do that's sort of written in blood. This feels written in blood to me.

"I have this feeling that when I'm done with this, I'll never perform again, in a certain way, that it'll

be drained out of me. That the whole reason I ever needed to tell stories was to tell this one, in a certain way."

Then the self-satirizing comic in Kron bursts through all the knitted-brow seriousness: "It's horrible if you write that, because then the expectation is so, `What the hell is this, "Bury My Heart at Wounded Knee?" Who the hell does she think she is?' She laughs heartily, and adds:

" 'You've never heard of her before, but don't miss her swan song!' "

Song and dance

Kron may not be a household name, but she's earned her share of notice in New York. She moved there in the mid-'80s after her college days in Michigan with a vague idea of becoming an actress, but "I'm just not cut out for the whole auditioning thing. It's just not in my personality."

Eventually, Kron hooked up with the WOW Cafe, a lesbian theater collective. For her first performance there, she did a schtick centering on a Victorian novelty song that Marshall (who now teaches at Brown University) had provided her. The show went over so well that Kron wound up bagging an engagement at the cafe, alternating with something called the "Hiroshima Beach Party."

"These shows were so magical, they were so great, and I thought, I'm so talented! I thought, all I have to do is stand onstage and talk off the top of my head. I have got the gift!

"And then about six months later, I booked another show, and it was a disaster. I really spent the next seven years trying to learn the skills to re-create what I had done spontaneously on those two nights."

Kron honed her solo skills with the works "Facing Life's Problems" and "All My Hopes & Dreams" (which she performed at San Diego's Sushi space in 1991), and became equally well known as part of the comedy troupe The Five Lesbian Brothers (which performed here, also at Sushi, in 1993).

It was through the Brothers' production "The Secretaries" at the New York Theatre Workshop, and through Kron's early reading of "2.5" there, that she became acquainted with Playhouse artistic director Michael Greif, paving the way for the world premiere in La Jolla. (Greif staged the original production of the Pulitzer Prize-winning musical "Rent" at the workshop before moving it to Broadway.)

Marshall became the director of "2.5" through another of those odd and random events: She and Kron share a birthday, and Marshall called her old student out of the blue on that day, just as Kron was in the middle of seeking someone to help guide her new show.

"I think we have complementary skills, and I have a great passion for what Lisa has written and for the ideas that are there," says Marshall, who is a playwright and lyricist in her own right.

Kron wanted to find a director who would resist "the real temptation to make it into something big and theatrical. Even though I was afraid of not doing that, somewhere I knew it wasn't the right thing. And Lowry knew that from the beginning."

The two are mostly mum on what the production will look like, although they nod a bit wearily when monologuist Spalding Gray and his "Swimming to Cambodia" are mentioned.

"We're desperately trying not to pattern it after that, but I think that's an inevitable comparison people are going to make. I love `Swimming to Cambodia.' I'm a big admirer of Spalding Gray. I don't especially want to be compared to him in that way. It's a person sitting there with a text, telling a story -- but there was nothing to do about that."

Physical similarities aside, though, it's hard to imagine anyone's sensibilities being quite like Kron's. Even in the darkest moments of "2.5," when she returns to the death camp with her father, her writing has an uncanny way of mixing chills with rueful chuckles.

"You all know what this looks like," the script reads at one point. "Why am I describing it to you? You've seen the movies. You saw `Sophie's Choice.' You've seen the pictures of the bodies. Don't you people watch PBS? It's on every 15 minutes practically. I don't need to describe this to you. I feel like a cliche."

It's a daring mix, and she admits she's not entirely confident it'll all hang together. And for Kron, that's exactly the point.

"I think if I were feeling confident, there'd be a problem," she says. "For me to feel off-balance means I'm on the right track. If I knew where I was going, I would've been there before."

campaign already knew he was Gay.

To this day, Castillo jokingly admits, "because the staff all talks among themselves, I don't think I've had to come out to anyone who comes on new yet."

So, while coming out to his colleagues doesn't play much of a role in Castillo's workday, lately, the fact that he is the only openly Gay member of Filner's staff has presented its own set of challenges.

Because the congressman voted in favor of DoMA, a federal bill that bans recognition of same-sex marriages, Filner's allegiance to Gays and Lesbians has been called into question. Never mind his vote to allow Gays to serve openly in the military, or his sponsorship of the bill that would have protected Gays from workplace discrimi-

man himself, Castillo has handled his burden well. "I have broad shoulders," the aid quipped, "figuratively at least."

In one instance, Filner was scheduled to address the San Diego Democratic Club, which was by perception an attempt to begin healing the rift that had been created by "the vote." However the congressman was summoned back to the Capitol for meetings with Pentagon officials. In his stead, Castillo was sent to apologize for Filner's absence.

In what turned into a large-scale kvetching session, the audience was at times hostile toward Castillo and angered at the Congressman's position. Castillo was put in the awkward position of having to answer for, then defend Filner's position on same-sex marriage. "It's an emotional issue. It's a high profile issue and people feel strongly about it, myself

included," he said in the crowd's defense. However, Castillo admits that even he was surprised at the crowd's vehemence. "I knew it was going to be a catharsis for some people. I just hope it helped."

Of his role of advisor on LGBT issues, Castillo says it's a job he doesn't have to do much. "Bob is very good on our issues. I make sure he has all the

SAN DIEGO — It's that time of year again when closet doors across the country are pushed (and kicked) open to commemorate National Coming Out Day on October 11. As is our yearly tradition here at *Update*, we decided to take a look at what area colleges and universities are doing to acknowledge this day.

Grossmont College got a jump on National Coming Out Day with a week's worth of activities that started on October 7 with a display on campus in the Quad area for Gays and Lesbians who have made a historical impact. Since October is National Gay and Lesbian History Month, we asked Tim Holmberg, head of Grossmont's Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual group on campus, if the display was something that would be up for the month. "No, we couldn't get the

school to do more than a week," said Holmberg. As of press time the group was planning on holding a rally on campus that would feature community leaders but preliminary plans had yet to be finalized. There will be a showing of *Torch Song Trilogy* on October 10 in room 220 starting at 6:00 p.m. The showing is free and open to all those interested. Student in Serious Condition After Fall

SEATTLE — An 18-year-old University of Washington freshman is in serious condition at the Harborview Medical Center, after falling from a third-story window at the Alpha Delta Phi fraternity house early last Wednesday. William Price, a pre-engineering major who recently pledged the fraternity, suffered fractures to his fifth and sixth vertebrae and faces permanent paralysis. Price was seen sleeping at 2:50 a.m. and appeared to be fine, although a witness heard him crying for help at 3:30 a.m. Although Price is conscious and talking, he has no recollection of the fall and details of the incident remain unclear.

Three OU Students Homeless After Fire

ATHENS, Ohio — Three Ohio University students are homeless after a fire swept through their apartment Thursday afternoon, causing an estimated \$60,000 in damages. The fire department believes the blaze started in the apartment's living room, and university officials said the cause was likely a lighted candle. The fire caused an estimated \$40,000 in damage to the structure of the building, and damage to the apartment's contents is pegged at \$20,000. The university offered the students temporary housing and food, which the students refused.

Campus Shut Down After Power Outage

PALO ALTO, Calif. -Stanford University suffered a four-hour blackout Thursday after a 12,000-volt switch gear failed at the Cardinal Cogeneration Facility. The facility supplies electrical power and steam for heating to the campus. The failure occurred at 7:26 p.m. and prompted an automatic safety-system to trip all the plant's circuit breakers. The cause of the failure has yet to be determined, although the plant has since resumed

Coming Out Day At UCSD Part of a **National Tribute to Sexual Freedom**

DIVERSITY: An array of people rallied to show support for alternate lifestyles

Celebrating their sexuality and freedom of choice, people of all sexual orientations showed up for the UCSD National Coming Out Day event on Oct. 10 in the Price Center.

The UCSD Lesbian Gay Bisexual Association (LGBA) organized this year's event, while the Associated Students supported it through funding.

Lucy Silvay, a psychiatrist and consultant at the Lesbian Gay Bisexual and Transgender Community Center, addressed the crowd on the subject of homosexuality in

both her and today's generations.

"You are between two cultures... amidst bastions of homophobia," Silvay said. "Parents are still the same as when I was a kid, so you do not have the advantage of asking them how to come out in the open."

Silvay encouraged homosexuals and bisexuals to come out into the open and promote the visibility of the gay community.

Silvay also mentioned that many homosexuals and bisexuals were hesitant to "come out" because they were concerned about the issue of personal safety.

"Same sex couples are the only group that is stigmatized throughout the world," Silvay said. "They are not being socialized into the gay culture to which they belong."

Two Test-Prep Corporations To Merge Today

EXAM: Hyperlearning, Princeton Review announced today their intent to produce hybrid prep class

With the number of medical school applications far surpassing available slots, many students with an interest in attending med school look to Medical College Admissions Test (MCAT) prep courses to improve their admissions numbers. Pre-med students at UCSD preparing for the MCAT have one less option for prep classes today than they did previously.

Hyperlearning, Inc., the largest provider of MCAT prep classes in San Diego, today announced its merger with The Princeton Review, which is the fastest growing national test-preparation company. Hyperlearning is now the medical division of The Princeton Review and will run Princeton Review MCAT test-prep classes at eight California locations.

'The new MCAT course blends the strongest areas of Hyperlearning's program — the intensive science review - with Princeton Review's test-taking techniques, verbal programs and large volume of old tests and review materials to create the finest review course out there," San Diego Princeton Review Director Sonya Petrie said.

Hyperlearning is currently the single largest provider of MCAT prep courses in California, with over 50 percent of the market here in San Diego. Prior to the merger, there were five companies in San Diego that offered MCAT prep classes, including Kaplan, Columbia Review, Princeton Review, Hyperlearning, Inc., and USD's test-prep services. Approximately 500 students from UCSD are now enrolled in Hyperlearning classes.

Offering test-prep classes is a big business nationwide. The combined revenues of the two largest national companies, Kaplan and Princeton Review, totalling in the hundreds of millions of dollars annually. Within test-prep services, MCAT courses are one of the fastest growing segments.

From 1990-95, the percentage of those applying to med schools who were accepted decreased yearly. In 1990, 54 percent of applicants were accepted. In 1991. the percentage shrank to 49, and last year, that number fell to only 35 percent.

The reason behind this trend is that the overall number of applications per year is rising, while the number of available slots has remained essentially constant. Pre-med students looking at this trend are turning to prep classes in ever-increasing numbers in

Despite competition with the

Associated Students, an all-campus lounge has been set aside for graduate students in the space that was formerly occupied by the Women's Resource Center.

The lounge, sponsored partly by the Office for Graduate Studies and Research (OGSR), officially opened its doors on Sept. I to the nearly 4,000 graduate students at UCSD.

"Getting the space was not easy," Vicki Mayer, president of the Graduate Student Association (GSA), said. "Basically, [the decision to give the space to the GSA] was highly contested."

According to Mayer, the biggest opponent to the graduate student lounge was the A.S., who wanted the area for an Internet lounge.

A.S. President Coleen Sabatini was unavailable for comment.

The new lounge offers seating for 30 students, a kitchen,

Macintosh computer, two Internet terminals for free e-mail access, three magazines and a free fax

The lounge also provides a place for posting flyers for student committees and organizations, conferences, job announcements and voter registration information.

In addition, a conference room is under construction, and the GSA plans to add a television in the near future.

The center provides "all the things people need to get ahead, even dental insurance plans," Mayer

The center's organizaers also aim to facilitate graduate student interaction.

"Up until now, [graduate stu-

dents] really haven't had a center of their own. Basically, they are expected to be in labs, in class teaching students or at home studying," Mayer said.

"Our purpose is to encourage different departments that never have any contact with each other to get together. For example, a literature major can get an opportunity to socialize with an engineering major," she added.

Graduate student Chad Harris has not visited the new lounge yet, but says he will "definitely look forward to visiting it and meeting fellow colleagues that I wouldn't normally have an opportunity to as-

sociate with." Other organizations on campus

are also allowed use the lounge for their own purposes. Currently, the Lesbian Gay Bisexual Association holds meetings there on Mondays at 7:00 p.m.

A grand-opening party for the lounge, open to administration and GSA representatives, will be held on Oct. 24 at 4:00 p.m.

The lounge is open on Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and can be pre-booked for other times. For more information, contact Vicki Mayer at 534-6504.


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
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

















Panel Will Discuss U.S. Elections

an effort to gain an edge on the competition for coveted med school spots.

Hyperlearning was founded in 1988 by three UC students with UCSD connections in a garage off of La Jolla Shores Drive.

The Princeton Review was founded in 1981 and currently has 500 test-prep locations in over 60 cities. In addition to the MCAT, the Princeton Review offers classes on the LSAT, GMAT and GRE, among others.

According to Chris Volpe, director of Hyperlearning in San Diego, the new MCAT prep class that Hyperlearning will offer will differ from the current class in several ways. Most significantly, students will have greater flexibility in scheduling class hours, and will have the choice of either a 105 or 75-hour lecture schedule.

Hyperlearning will be offering a free multimedia presentation at UCSD on getting into medical school admissions in today's admissions climate from 5-7 p.m. on Tuesday, October 29, at the Liebow Auditorium on the UCSD Medical School campus.

"The Princeton Review is a fast-growing, aggressive company whose philosophy fits with ours," Smart said. "Both companies have long histories of innovation, and you can bet your butt that we're going to be coming out with a bunch of new stuff."

Ph.D., spoke on behalf the Karibu organization, a center for social support, education, and HIV-prevention that primarily targets African-Americans.

Vanhoose told his own story of racism in both the gay and mainstream communities.

"When I marched in a gay pride parade in 1977, our cry was 'Gay, straight, black, and white, same struggle, same fight," Vanhoose said. "When racism rears its ugly head in the gay community, many of us don't get the support we need."

After the speakers kicked off the event, the stage opened for audience members to give personal testimony.

"No one should feel isolated and closeted for their beliefs," said Robert Nguyen, a member of the LGBA. "This is a day where I am able to stand before you and say that I am completely proud of who I am. Every day is Coming Out Day!"

In addition to several gay and lesbian audience members who took the stage, heterosexuals also spoke.

"We are up here to support our gay friends," said one woman who attended the event with a friend. "We are straight but not narrow."

Coming Out Day has been in existence for over 10 years, with the goal of promoting openess and acceptance for the gay community.

The celebration was held as part of a series of upcoming events organized by the LGBA, including an Oct. 12 dance at the Pub.

LA JOLLA — "Hi. My name is John and I am gay," announced third year Warren College student John Maze Thurs., Oct. 10. Standing before a yellow prop door representative of "the closet," on a raised platform, Maze celebrated National Coming Out Day by proclaiming his homosexuality to a crowd of approximately 200 peers gathered at the Price Center Plaza at the University of California-San Diego (UCSD).

GAY BASHING HAS NO PLACE IN RELIGION

If this election season illustrated anything, it is that politicians are still too eager to pronounce on issues of personal morality and personal choice. Take the issue of homosexual marriage. On September 21, under cover of darkness, President Clinton signed the Defense of Marriage Act, which gave states the power to deny recognition to same-sex marriages sanctioned in other states.

The bill also defined marriage as a union between a man and a woman, effectively denying partners of a homosexuals spousal Social Security benefits. Ironically, the government is quite willing to make all homosexuals pay Social Security taxes, but they are not willing to let homosexuals collect the benefits they are due.

Politicians claim that their views of marriage are backed up

by a Judeo-Christian religious tradition dominant in this country that monolithically condemns homosexuality. But does the Judeo-Christian tradition really condemn homosexuality?

I recently attended a meeting sponsored by Campus Crusade for Christ (CCC), the central theme of which was that homosexuality is a sin that can be remedied like any other. Much of the reasoning (or lack thereof) behind this gay-bashing stems from a false and distinctively American conception of Judeo-Christian ethics.

What does the Bible say about homosexuality? There are two references in the Holiness Codes of Leviticus. Leviticus 18:22 states that it is an abomination for a man to lie with a man as he would with a woman. Leviticus 20:13 states that if a man lies with another man as he would with a woman, he shall be put to death.



True relgion does not divide people. We should aspire to attain "unity" rather than use religion to alienate and oppress others.

However, according to biblical scholar Bernhard Anderson, the holiness codes were intended as a

way for Jews to separate themselves from other nations, and to show they had a special relationship to God. Prohibitions against homosexuality among the Israelites were merely ways in which the Jewish people attempted to differentiate themselves from other nations.

Another argument used against homosexuality is that homosexuality doesn't lead to procreation. According to the Genesis creation account, God created males and females to multiply on the earth. Old Testament law views any male discharge as the spilling of life. Notice that the prohibition on the spilling of life doesn't condemn lesbian sex because women do not spill seed. But if we were to follow the Old Testament, both a heterosexual couple using contraceptives and any single man without children would be sinning.

If religious groups choose to

acknowledge these commandments, then why don't they acknowledge all the other commandments? There are over 600 more laws in the Old Testament that they should follow as well. Are we still supposed to stone adulterers? Should we kill everybody who has ever cussed out their parents (Leviticus 20:9)?


Christians also cite two ambiguous passages in the New Testament about homosexuality: 1 Corinthians 6:9-11 and 1 Timothy 1:10. The Greek words used is these passages are unclear. Some, but not all, scholars translate them as "sodomite" or "homosexual."

New Testament scholar Robin Scroggs suggests that the words most likely refer to pederasty, where a man takes an active sexual role over a passive call-boy. Scroggs relates the words to pagan practices and male prostitution in

What if Mrs. Clinton is indicted? What if the entangling web of Whitewater closes in on the presidenc? The most intriguing question then is whether the president will pardon those involved in Whitewater to save his own skin. Given Clinton's capacity for denial and his tendency to brand attacks by his opponents as moral and political outrages, it wouldn't be surprising to see the president go on live national television and announce to the American people that he intends to prevent paralysis of the government by partisan persecutions by pardoning all those involved in Whitewater. But Whitewater isn't the only scandal Clinton has to worry about. He still faces a sexual-harassment lawsuit from former Arkansas state employee Paula Jones. Jones claims that in 1991 Clinton invited her up to his hotel room and made unwanted sexual advances. Jones also claims that Clinton dropped his pants and asked for oral sex.

The interesting thing about this case is that there is significant evidence to back up Jones' claim. At least four people heard Jones relate this account within a day or two after it allegedly occurred, years before she actually filed suit. temples. Like the ancient Jews, these prohibitions are best understood as attempts by Christians to separate themselves from the practices of their Roman oppressors.

The New Testament references are prohibitions against abusing the sexual rights of others. The Bible probably refers to acts of sexual domination, rape, child abuse, lust and pagan worship. Biblical writers appear to have had no understanding of mutual, consensual, loving relationships between adults of the same gender

like those that exist today.

Still another argument against homosexuality is that it is physically and biologically wrong. Following this argument, our bodies should be treated like temples. However, we don't condemn people for eating junk food or staying in the sun too long. Why should we condemn those who find happiness in loving, homosexual relationships?

People wrongly use the Bible to substantiate their own prejudices. The Bible has been used to justify wars, anti-semitism, slavery, crusades, racism, discrimination against women and many other atrocities. The Bible must be read in context, with skepticism, using logic and experience. The Bible We should not keep judging each other on the stereotypes of race, gender, sexual orientation or religious affiliation. Love should not be conditional on these factors.

must be considered within the context of biblical writers' culture.

It is wrong for groups such as the Christian Coalition to abuse the Bible by using it as an authority to judge or condemn others who are different. Instead, they should look at the other passages of the Bible that say to love God, to love others (even your enemies), to help those in need, not to judge others (because everyone has faults) and to act humbly.

The CCC meeting claimed that homosexuality is about destructive and unhappy behavior. On the contrary, many if not most homosexual relationships are loving and positive.

If homosexuals are unhappy it is only because society rejects them simply because of their sexual preference. If homosexuals fall into destructive behavior it is probably because they are made to feel guilty for being who they are. If homosexuals are happy with

themselves and love each another, how is that destructive? Why shouldn't they be able to marry?

We should not keep judging each other on the stereotypes of race, gender, sexual orientation or religious affiliation. Love should not be conditional on these factors.

I should point out that I attended another meeting about homosexuality and religion sponsored by Hillel, the campus Jewish organization. Their guest was Rabbi Sacks-Rosen, who is gay, and who commented that the word "religion" originates from a word "to unite." True religion does not divide people. We should aspire to attain "unity" rather than use religion to alienate and oppress others.

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
