Letter from France

Somehow I expected to have plenty of time to write to you regularly while living the peaceful life deeply ensconced in the rural Lauragais (just south of Toulouse). However, my hyper-active friend Helene has me visit every medieval village and Cathare castle in the area, and makes me walk for hours along unmarked trails through the muddy fields, woods and hills that make up the Lauragais.

It has been raining a lot since we arrived here eight weeks ago. We did not find a house to rent for the three months we are here and stayed in a "chambre d'hote" (bed and breakfast) in the "Chateau de Varennes" (a 16th century castle , beautifully furnished, breakfast served on Limoges and Cristoffle) until we found a "gite-rural" (furnished apartment, minus sheets and towels) in a lesser castle, "Chateau de Lafont", whose owner loves to decorate in clashing patterns and random furniture, for example a huge bellows as coffee table. It is set in a beautiful "Parc" (wooded grounds) and is VERY quiet.

The fun part of staying in a gite is that you have a kitchen and thus can buy all the wonderful food available on the Saturday mornig market in Lavaur or Revel. The chatelaine at Les Varennes taught me how to prepare a local dish, the cassoulet, a casserole made with large white beans, confit de canard (duck-preserve), fresh Tolosan sausage (first grilled over an open fire) and tons of duck fat and pork rinds! This lesson took place in her gigantic kitchen located in the caves of the castle with a fireplace large enough to roast a steer.

The people in the Southwest are very friendly. Whenever Richard and I stroll through a village we find someone to chat with, and invariably we get good advice on what to see, where to eat or find the best bread to buy. It is wonderful to be here and we hope to come back rejuvenated and full of fresh ideas.

Ellen B. Weller - Recipient of the Frieda Daum Urey Scholarship 2000-2001

Music is magic. There has never been a time in my own memory when I was not somehow involved in music. I played piano at age 3, flute in junior high, took composition and played saxophone in high school. I attended California State University at Northridge, which still offers a fine jazz program, and I was placed in their highest ensembles. I was zipping through the Bachelor's of Music program in Performance. Everything seemed to be falling into place.

My bubble burst, however. I developed acute tendonitis. Hand surgery failed, and I shifted my major to composition. I continued my education at Queens College in New York City, where I graduated Summa Cum Laude in composition, and began the graduate program in composition. However, Mother Nature had planned another job for me, and I found myself alternating copying music parts with nursing my first son, Danny. I cut back to part time school, but after my second boy, Charlie, was born, we decided that it was too much to continue with my Master's program, so I dropped it, finished with everything but the final Thesis composition.

In 1988, faced with huge debt, two kids, no real job, I gave up the dream of "making it" in New York, and we moved back to San Diego, where I worked as office manager and computer specialist. I was swimming in a sea of choices, with no apparent direction other than getting by. But once again, music drew me back into its realm. I eventually finished my Master's work, and I graduated in 1992. Knowing that my two young boys were watching made the experience so much richer.

My husband now tunes pianos for the San Diego School District, enabling me to go back to school. I balanced school with being home at 2:00 for my kids after school, since I had missed their early years while I was working full-time. I developed and presented several creative music and jazz programs to schools all over San Diego. I rediscovered the magical qualities of music through teaching children. My students taught me more than I could ever have learned on my own, and they sparked a curiosity about the role music plays in our lives.

After a hiatus of six years out of college, I entered UCSD's music program in Critical Studies and Experimental Practices, I found to my surprise, people just like myself - musical explorers trying to understand music's role in our lives and in the lives of others. I met my life mentor, the late Dr. Margaret Dilling, who opened the door to a field that was custom made for me: Ethnomusicology, the study of music in culture.

Now, I am working on finishing my dissertation following a project I worked on in conjunction with the City of San Diego Commission for Arts and Culture. We put together a directory of world musicians and dancers of the many traditions practiced by San Diego's rich and diverse population, many of whom are immigrants, others rediscovering and continuing their ethnic heritage. This work continues, and I have given papers detailing this process, which is being admired and copied by other municipalities across the country. The relationship between a large American city such as San Diego, and its immigrant music-makers forms the core of my dissertation, which is currently titled, "Needs, expectations and desires: Government Support for Ethnic Music-making in San Diego."

I work as pianist/musician for the San Diego Society for Humanistic Judaism, I perform Jewish music with the Second Avenue Klezmer Ensemble, and I volunteer at public schools. We have formed the Weller Family Band, a hard-hitting New York style jazz band featuring my husband Bob on piano, 14-year old Charlie on drums and trumpet, 17-year old Danny on double bass and me on sax and flute. We recently played to a large audience in Balboa Park as part of their Jazz in the Park series, and will be cutting a CD this month. My house may look like a disaster, with drumset, piano, bass, amplifiers scattered across the living room floor, but there is a sense of magic, a connection to another world we create together and share with others.

I have learned two things in life: apparent failure almost always leads to opportunity, and what you give to other people always comes back to you ten-fold, maybe not right away, but eventually. Receiving the Frieda Daum Urey Scholarship is a prime example of those principles. Your generosity has contributed significantly to the attainment of a life-long dream of mine, now within reach. Upon completion of my degree in the Fall of 2001, I plan to continue to make music, and to act as facilitator for others to create and perform their own special and unique music, whether children or adults, ethnic or classical music, improvisors or Broadway shows. I have much to give back to the San Diego community, and organizations such as the Oceanids blaze the trail by their example of giving needed support to unlikely candidates such as myself. The real thanks to you will be in whatever small amount I can give to others through music; however, for the short term, I wish to leave you with a tiny bit of magic, created from the bond between you and me. It will say "thank you" in the language I know best - music.

"It Takes a Women's Club to Make the Academic Village"

Southland Women's Conference hosted by California Institute of Technology on April 18, 2001.

What a wonderful title for the 2001 Southland Women's Conference! Oceanids Barbara Starkey and Maxine Bloor attended along with representatives from 10 Southland California Universities and Colleges. Dr. David Baltimore, President of California Institute of Technology welcomed the participants at the opening of the Conference. Valerie Elachi, President of the Cal Tech Women's Club, presented a panel discussion entitled "It Takes a Women's Club to Build an Academic Community". The participants included Dr. Alice S. Huang, the wife of President David Baltimore. She is a senior councilor for External Relations for California Institute of Technology. Dr. Huang's professional work is in the field of virology. Dr. Huang explained how the Cal Tech Women's Club provided a basis of friendship and connections with the community when she and her husband first arrived at Cal Tech a few years ago.

The Cal Tech Women's Club maintains many of the same activities and goals and interest groups as does Oceanids. They have experienced growth and challenges with the continuing evolution of women's clubs on their campuses. Also they offer friendship and support throughout the academic community and welcome members from faculty, staff and academic programs.

Presently there is no campus volunteering to host the 2002 meeting of the Southland Women's Conference. Thus Roberta Weaver, University of Southern California, initiated an email communication network comprising a representative from each of the campuses participating in this year's Conference. A designated representative from each of the 10 participating campuses will receive BEAR FACTS. In return Carole Ziegler, our President, will receive copies of newsletters that are published on the other campuses.

Further announcements about plans for the 2002 meeting of the Southland Women's Conference will be published in BEAR FACTS as they are received.
