INTRODUCTION.

The primary objectives of this patrol were to complete the 1965 Census Revision for the KARUAMA Tax from both areas and investigate reports of a new settlement in the AKAIFU Valley.

These tasks were carried out and are covered in the body of this report. A report on the progress of the MARIBOI settlers in the MEKEO Census Division is

Varying receptions, from fairly enthusiastic to apathetic, were accorded the patrol throughout the area.

NATIVE AFFAIRS.

a) Census Revision.

1. KARUAMA Census Division.

Census attendance in the Division was, with one outstanding exception, fairly good. The exception in this case was KWAPA village, population 20 (5 families), which has been rebuilt some hours walk away from its old site.

On the day appointed for census a verbal message was brought by a youth to the census point, MOSIBI, that the people of KWAPA would not attend census as they were preparing to visit relatives in the neighbouring FILUTU Census Division. No action was taken at the time but in the next patrol to the area the census evaders will be dealt with.

The figures are little unchanged from the last revision: - the Crude Birth Rate has dropped slightly from 3.2 to 2.73 and there has been a corresponding drop in the Crude Death Rate from 0.7 to 0.55. The Rate of Natural Increase seems to steadied at 2.18.

Of the male labour potential 32% are absent at employment, almost all of them being employed in the District at either BEREINA, KAIRUKU or PORT MORESBY. Approximately one third of these absent workers have their families with them so the absence of such a large numbers of males from their villages is not causing as many hardships in the village as might be expected.

11. LOWER KUNIMAIPA Census Division.

Attendance at Census in this Division was, in the main, very good.

The Crude Birth Rate is at 2.92 only fractionally better than that of the KARUAMA, however the Crude Death Rate is comparatively high at 1.51 giving a Rate of Natural Increase of 1.41. The population in this Division has remained fairly static for the past 4 years and gives has remained fairly static for the past 4 years and gives every indication of continuing to do so for some time yet.

of the male labour potential, 28.7% are absent work. Of this number 19.2% are employed within the

District and the remaining 9.5% are employed outside, mainly in the WAU - BULOLO area. Approximately one with them.

b) Tax Collection.

1. KARUAMA Census Division.

Tax collection went fairly smoothly and most natives that had hoped to avoid paying tax by proceeding to MORESBY were intercepted at KAIRUKU. Apart from this nothing else worthy of note occurred during the collection.

People were able to meet their Tax ebligations (10/- p/h/ p.a.) easily and it is my belief that the tax rate could easily be raised without causing any undue hardships on villagers.

A sum of £72.0.0 was collected.

11. LOWER KUNIMAIPA Census Division.

As for the abovementioned Division collection here also went smoothly with no incidents of note. The people of this area are well able to afford the 10/-per annum and the rate could be raised without creating difficulties for the people.

A total of £104.0.0 was collected from the area.

e) Settlements - AKAIFU Valley.

In accordance with your minute 67-3-1 of the 5th October, 1965, the AKAIFU Valley was visited to determine whether or not migrant groups from the KUNIMAIPA had in fact settled in a Forbidden Settlement Area.

The groups were contacted on the 23rd and 24th of November, 1965. An officer from BEREINA, Mr.P.HOLMES C.P.O., was also present.

Results of the visit are as follows ;-

the first being OWISA (altitude 2,110' a.s.l.) situated on the banks of the AKAIFU River some 75 hours walk south of KOIFA (altitude 4,900' a.s.l.) in the KUNIMAIPA Valley. OWISA consists of gardens and three houses.

The second settlement is known as UNIALAI (altitude 830' a.s.l.) and is about $3\frac{1}{2}$ hours walk downstream (south) from OWISA. This settlement boasts two houses, some gardens and one small coffee nursery containing 65 to 70 plants.

A further half hours walk downstream is GI gardens, two houses and one cave which is used as a dwelling place. GI has 5 small coffee nurseries, each approximately the same size as the nursery at UNIAKAI. approximately the same size as the nursery at UNIAKAI. GI is some $3\frac{1}{2}$ hours walk distant from MAIPA in the BUSH MEKEO Census Division.

All three settlements are within the area declared as a Forbidden Settlement under a notice dated 14th November, 1951, and published in the Government Gazette of 29th November, 1951 (page 1569 of Laws of the (Annotated) Vol. II).

The settlements also lie within the boundaries of the LOWER KUNIMAIPA Census Division of the GUARI Administrative Area.

11. The settlers are drawn from three villages in the LOWER KUNIMAIPA Census Division viz. KOIFA No.1,

They are fully aware that the AKAIFU Valley is an area forbidden to them as they have already quitted the area twice (once in 1952 and again in 1958) under instructions from Administration officers.

The people pointed out that they were not defying the Administration and nor were they settling permanently - they were exercising their right of ownership over the land for fear of encroachment by the BUSH MEKEOS from MAIPA. The settlers spend up to one week in the valley and return to the KUNIMAIPA, working their visits in the fashion of a roster so that there is always someone in the valley to keep the gardens under surveillance.

tii. The priests at KAMULAI Mission, particularly Father P. MORANT M.S.C., claim that these visits to the valley are claiming a considerable number of lives. The natives recognise the area as a "bad place" for centracting malaria but a perusal of village census statistics does not appear to bear this out e.g.

As can be seen from the figures above, apart from KOIFA No.1, the Rate of Natural Increase by these villagers is higher than the overall rate for the Census Division.

Most of the part-time settlers are drawn from KOIFA No. 2 village.

iv. Whilst at MAIPA (BUSH MEKEO) I was approached by the Local Government Councillor and his Committee Member regarding the settling of KUNIMAIPA peoples in the AKAIFU Valley.

They claimed that settlers, being unsophisticated bush-men, were defecating in the river and thereby contaminating the MAIPA peoples' drinking water. There were no other complaints but the Counciller

suggested that it would be a good idea if the settlers were told by the Administration to return to the confines of the KUNIMAIPA Valley.

F

The MAIPA people may have designs on land in the upper reaches of the AKAIFU, if not for gardening, then at least for hunting and this possibility is the prime reason for the part-time settlers presence in the area.

There is no permanent settlement in the true sense of the word and the people do not appear to be adversely effected by conditions in the valley, consequently no action was taken by the patrol to return the people to the KUNIMAIPA with orders NOT to frequent the AKAIFU Valley.

All matters of Administration will continue to be done in the KUNIMAIPA villages but I would suggest that if the area is to remain forbidden to permanent settlement by these people that the planting of coffee be, if not actively discouraged, then not encouraged.

4) Settlement - MARIBOI.

This settlement was part subject of GUARI Patrol Report 3/64-65 of 16th July, 1965.

Of the original 50 settlers 18, 10 males and 8 females, have returned to the KARUAMA which is virtually mosquito free.

The day prior to my arrival the Clerk of the MEKEO Council conducted conducted a census for the purpose of enrollment of all eligible adults on the IMOUNGA Electoral Roll. A former Village Councillor, DAKAI AUGAI, has been appointed Council Committee Member and has the following of his fellow MARIBOI settlers.

The MARIBOI settlers are now part and parcel of the KAIRUKU Sub-District, administered from BEREINA and participants in the MEKEO Local Government Council.

e) Villages.

In both Census Divisions the people are by choice, stil/living in scattered hamlets, each family choosing to remain close to its gardens and pigs. There are no villages as such and so called pigs. There are no villages as such and so called pigs are only small hamlets recognised as census villages are only small hamlets recognised as census points and supplemented by a Rest House and perhaps a church.

Fears of sorcery and theft of property are the main reasons for the absence of villages. Until neighbouring groups learn to trust each other and neighbouring together in a reasonable degree are capabple of living together in a reasonable degree of harmony the Administration will continue to be

plagued by villager's complaints of petty wrongs and

The standard of housing is generally poor, the people still adhering to the practice of living on dirt floors with their pigs shut up in one end of

Rest Houses and Barracks were found to be generally good and in all villages ample supplies of water and firewood were forthcoming. Fresh foods were fairly plentiful considering the virtual drought since April.

f) Village Officials.

The standard of Village Constables in both areas is poor, most of them lacking in both interest and ability. Indeed, some seem only to have accepted the position so that they might be considered in a favourable light when applying for a Special Arms Permit.

The most outstanding Village Constable of the KARUAMA is undoubtably AUWARI LAIAM of KAPATEIYA and his counterpart in the LOWER KUNIMAIPA is AMAPIA ZOPO of KOIFA No. 2.

Reports on Village Constables are covered in Appendices 4and 5, together with recommendations.

g) Special Arms Permits.

A section on this matter has been included because in every village without exception the patrol was deluged with applications for Special Arms Permits.

A check was made in each village of the number of Permits held and the Census Revised. Quotas for each villages were calculated on the basis of 2 permits for every hundred in population. Several villages were found not to be up to quota and some were found to be in excess. Most already held the proper allocation.

Applications were called for from those villages not up to quota, the successful candidate selected and recommendations made to TAPINI regarding the leave of the second selected and recommendations made to TAPINI regarding the issue of a Permit.

Shotguns are regarded more as a status symbol than an instrument to help supplement food supply.

h) Law and Order.

The people of both Divisions are, in the main, fairly law abiding. Five Courts for Native Matters were convened - three for assault and two for sorcery - the most correct of the most cor the most common offences.

Many minor squabbles were settled by arbitration but the people still insist on bringing to the attention of patrols squabbles that have been heard by previous Officers in the hope of a reversed decision. ROADS AND BRIDGES.

KOOFA to MAIPA - Native Track.

This track is used very little and it would be a laborious task to convert it to a bridle path suitable for use by horses.

The construction of a vehicular road by this route would be fraught with many difficulties and if a road link to the coast from the KUNIMAIPA or GOILALA this route is hardly worthy of consideration.

KAMULAI - KOSGAREN - LAVIDAKO - IMOUNGA - INAWAUNI Road.

This bridle path is well used by both forse and foot traffic. It is well defined, gently graded and not beyond widening for vehicular use.

However, if a road from the GOILALA to the coast were to be built I would suggest that it be routed up from INAWAUNI through LAVIDAKO to KOSGAREN and then be branched off to KAPATEIYA and LOPIZO. From LOPIZO it could be routed through the top corner of the PILUTU Census Division to TORORO in the LOLOIPA Valley (on the main TAPINI - GUARI Road).

KARUAMA Census Division Bridle Paths.

The system has been roughly described under the preceding heading. The path from GUARI proceeds via KAMULAI Mission down the right of the TAPALA River until crossing it at KOSGAREN. At KOSGAREN the road divides, one arm proceeding downstream of the TAPALA along the left bank into the MEKEO. and the other arm going in a northerly direction to LOPIZO.

From LOPIZO toward ZANIYALAVAVA, som212
miles distant, Father Abel MICHENAUD M.S.C., intends to
build a bridle path. Already he has pegged the track from
LOPIZO to the gap leading into the ZANIYALAVAVA valley
(approximately) and local natives without pay or
Administration assistance have built a bridle path along
half this distance. If work continues at the same rate
the bridle path to ZANIYALAVAVA could be completed by
Christmas, 1966.

Roadworks are in progress between ZANIYALAVAVA, LARAMAITA and TORORO and from TORORO to TAPINI the road is open to vehicular traffic.

LOWER KUNIMAIPA Census Division Bridle Paths.

The system of bridle paths in this Census Division, although good, still has one link to be completed. From KAMULAI it is possible to take horses as far as GOILAPU, but from there to KOMU native tracks as far as GOILAPU, but from there to Home and leads into the has been in use for some time and leads into the UPPER KUNIMAIPA Census Division with a branch-off to GUARI.

AIRSTRIPS.

AIRSTRIPS.

The only proposed airstrip in the area is being built at SUASI under the part time supervision of the Reverend H.A. BROWN of the L.M.S. MORU (GULF District). The site is a bag one with a poor approach but Mr. BROWN hopes to eventually carve a 2,000' x 200' strip out of the hillside.

Spasmodic work on the project has been underway since 1957 and it is hard to see just what work has been done even though water pawer and railed hand carts are employed.

Mr. BROWN also indicated that he intends to settle permanently at SUASI in the near future and complete the airstrip. About 2400 is held for the project - £100 from an American donor and £300 donated by Mr. BROWN himself (being the design fee for a set of 4 postage stamps).

MISSION ACTIVITY.

In the KARUAMA Census Division only the Catholic Mission is represented. The priest provides a limited first aid service to natives of his immediate

In the LOWER KUNIMAIPA Census Division both the Catholic Mission and the L.M.S. are represented. The Catholics have established themselves at KAMULAI with a school teaching up to Standard III. Medical services are also provided.

The L.M.S. have a too hold at SUASI and only provide a rather limited educational service.

HEALTH AND HYGIENE.

On the whole the people of the KARUAMA are better served by medical services than the people of the LOWER KUNIMAIPA. The KARUAMA boasts two Aid Posts, one at DAK'LAWAURO and the other at LOPIZO and also has the Mission Station at MEIPA.

In the LOWER KUNIMAIPA, apart from KAMULAI Mission, there is only one Aid Post (at KOMU) and this has not been manned for some three months.

CONCLUSION.

Very little can be done economically for the peoples of the areas patrolled until they themselves elect to live in larger communities. This will enable communications, particularly the bridle path system, to be developed at a more rapid rate allowing relatively easy access to markets.
