### Objective

In an era where factors such as globalization, anti-immigrant sentiments, war, sexism, homophobia, transphobia, and other forms of hate based on gender and sexuality resonate in queer peoples' lives, this conference hopes to generate community by fostering dialogue between students, scholars, activists, and professionals. Whether through academic scholarship, activism, artistic expressions, or community organizing and outreach, we dream of a queer homeland where human, women's, trans, and queer rights have no impediments. As the inaugural conference of the National Association of Chicana and Chicano Studies (NACCS) Joto Caucus, we seek to provide a safe space where participants can relate to one another in resisting the legacies of oppression gueer ethnic individuals face and celebrate in the many forms of empowerment our queer predecessors have taught us. While this conference is sponsored by a predominately Queer Chicano caucus, we welcome participation from all queer communities struggling to create a space of equality, equity, safety, inclusiveness, and empowerment regardless of ethnic background, gender orientation, or nationality.

### Theme

In the spirit of the above mentioned objective we invite abstracts/proposals for workshops, panels, and roundtables from graduate and undergraduate students, faculty and community members, activists, and professionals. Applications, abstracts, and proposals are currently being accepted for interactive workshops, roundtable discussions, and academic paper panels. Please note that while traditional academic panel presentations will be entertained, the number of scholarly papers accepted will be limited. Additionally, please note that all presentations (workshops, roundtable discussions, and academic panels) will be granted one hour of presentation time; caucus members suggest that workshops and roundtables utilize the whole hour, and that scholarly panels consist of no more than three speakers. The program committee will group single presentations into panels of three with a total presentation time, including questions and dialogue, of 60 minutes. A moderator will be provided for each panel; conference organizers suggest a reading time of twelve to fourteen minutes for academic and scholarly papers. Please note that presentations are defined as follows:

Workshops (hands-on group facilitation)
 Roundtables (open discussion on selected topics)
 Paper panels (academic research presentations, reports, scholarly papers, or debates)

### Submission

Please submit an abstract /proposal of 250 words describing the theme, goal, or activity planned for workshops, round tables, or paper presentations. For scholarly panels, please limit proposals to one page of text including abstracts of papers or a statement of purpose. Proposals for panel and paper presentations should include information regarding how these scholarly works are relevant to the conference theme and goal. 

LaGrace Volcano's most recent photographs examine the ways in which intergendered and intersexed subjectivity allow us to envisage the body anew. Yet his work implodes binary imaginings not only by emphasizing the differences of transgendered or intersexed bodies, but by queering the 'normal' body as well. Crucially though, the bodies he photographs are not objects held at a distance but rather are celebrated, as LaGrace Volcano aptly puts, as "sites of mutation, loss, and longing." Documentation of the loss of his friend, writer Kathy Acker to cancer, and the transformation of his lover Simo Maronati's abled body into a disabled one, expands the category of gueerness to include bodies that are not necessarily homosexually marked but are nevertheless queerly positioned in relation to the normative. In the end, he always innovatively complicates the relationship between subject and object as LaGrace Volcano makes visible the ways in which he himself is deeply implicated in the project of chronicling the meanings of queer bodies and communities, both as a transgendered intersexed person and as an artist and activist.







Yesterday the San Diego LGBT Community Center (The Center) commended San Diego Mayor Jerry Sanders (R) for joining with the City Council in supporting the marriage equality case currently before the California Supreme Court. His action followed the Council's Sept., 18th 5-3 decision to join other California cities -- including Los Angeles, San Francisco, Oakland, San Jose and Long Beach -- in supporting this case by signing a friend-of-the-court (amicus) brief. He made this announcement in an emotional news conference at 5pm yesterday.

"Mayor Sanders' action today means a great deal to so many San Diegans who have labored for years to make our city a beacon of fairness and equality. By signing this measure, Mayor Sanders has demonstrated the deepest level of political courage. He has again displayed his steadfast commitment to do what is right and just above all else, showing the type of civil rights leadership that San Diegans of all political stripes should celebrate," said Dr. Delores A. 


