This event is free and open to UCSD faculty and graduate students.

Dialogues in Sexuality Studies is a new quarterly series designed to bring together UCSD faculty members and graduate students from across campus who are interested in the growing interdisciplinary field of Sexuality Studies. Each event features two short presentations—one by a faculty member and one by a graduate student from different disciplines whose work bears productive similarities. To encourage the collaborative spirit of the series, the two presentations will be followed by open discussion over an informal buffet dinner.

The inaugural event will feature presentations from:

Fatima El-Tayeb is Assistant Professor of African American Literature and Culture at UCSD. Her research interests include African American Popular Culture, Diaspora Studies, Film Studies, (Black) European History, and Queer Theory. She will be presenting new work from her current book project, which looks at minority of color activism in Europe .

Meghan Duffy is a Ph.D. student in the Department of Sociology at UCSD. Her research interests include sexuality and social movements. She holds a B.A. in English from the University of Maryland, College Park. 

"Neoliberal Risks: Mediating Disability in a Moment of Danger"

Tuesday, November 14th, 2006 4pm at The Cross Cultural Center

Professor McRuer's recent book, *Crip Theory: Cultural Signs of Queemess and Disability* (NYU Press) offers a major revision of the social model by showing the significant role that sexuality plays in the construction of disability. He recognizes the historical bond between homosexuality and disability that has existed since the midnineteenth century and shows how the stigma of deviant sexuality has been compared to cognitive and physical impairment.

Crip Theory looks at various sites in which ideas of normalcy or averageness are naturalized within society. In many cases, these sites (scientific, pedagogical, juridical) are underwritten by political and economic structures that ensure that able-bodiedness or heterosexuality be taught and reinforced through institutional forms. He then interrogates the extent to which this discourse of normalcy depends upon non-traditional bodies and sexualities that underwrite and support the compulsory character of heterosexuality and ablebodiedness. Moreover, he shows how queer and crip identities are aligned in order to complete the process of demonization.

# Transgender Day of Remembrance

Monday, November 20th, 2006 12noon at The LGBT Resource Center



Please join the LGBT Resource Center on Monday, November 20th as we honor and recognize the Transgender Day of Remembrance. Throughout the day, the conference room will be reserved as reverent space for reflection and discussion regarding the ongoing violence that affects our transgender community.

At 12 noon, there will be a community discussion in the LGBT RC Conference Room regarding issues related to the transgender community and transgender violence.

The Transgender Day of Remembrance was set aside to memorialize those who were killed due to anti-transgender hatred or prejudice. The event is held in November to honor Rita Hester, whose murder in 1998 kicked off the "Remembering Our Dead" web project and a San Francisco candlelight vigil in 1999. Since then, the event has grown to encompass memorials in of cities across the world. For more information. please http://www.gender.org/remember/day

The broader San Diego Community will also recognize the Transgender Day of Remembrance. A candlelight march departs at 7pm from the Center in Hillcrest, 3909 Centre St., and is followed by a remembrance ceremony at the Center. The ceremony features a moving reading of the names of transgender people who have died due to violence, and speakers Belinda and Tony Flynn, San Diego parents who have fought on behalf of their transgender child and nationally known Transgender activist Monica Helms. ### **Friday Night Movie**

"But I'm a Cheerleader" November 17th, 2006 at 4pm



Come and join the community on Friday afternoon to view "But I'm Cheerleader", starring some names public.

On display at UCSD will be three sections of the Quilt that have emerged from San Diego organizations and individuals as San Diegans responded to the AIDS crisis, both in the early years of the epidemic and through the present day. Each "block" (or section) of The AIDS Memorial Quilt measures approximately twelve feet square, and a typical block consists of eight individual three foot by six foot panels sewn together. Virtually every one of the more than 40,000 colorful panels that make up the entire Quilt memorializes the life of a person lost to AIDS.

Founded in 1987, the AIDS Memorial Quilt is a poignant memorial, a powerful tool for use in preventing new HIV infections, and the largest ongoing community arts project in the world. As the epidemic continues claiming lives around the world and here in the United States, the Quilt continues to grow and to reach more communities with its messages of remembrance, awareness and hope. Along with the AIDS Quilt, UCSD will sponsor a number of other events in recognition of World AIDS Day. A morning vigil will take place from 7 a.m. until 9 a.m. at the Price Center Ballroom open to anyone for private reflection and remembrance. Throughout the day at the Quilt display, more specific multi-media presentations will be ongoing. A photography exhibit "Living Proof: Courage in the face of AIDS" by Carolyn Jones will be on display, as well as a Wall of Remembrance for those to reflect on those who have been affected.

Red ribbons and condom "roses" will be handed out at UCSD's Library Walk throughout the day. A Path of Remembrance will be on the grounds near Library Walk documenting the 25 years of HIV/AIDS with 25 milestones for participants to traverse.

At 3 p.m. at the Price Center Ballroom, a dramatic telling of the impact of HIV/AIDS on people's lives will be performed. This powerful presentation will draw on the lived experiences of UCSD community members and their personal journeys within the pandemic.

The film "A Closer Walk" will be screened at the Price Center Ballroom continuously from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m. "A Closer Walk" is the first film to provide a definitive portrayal of humankind's confrontation with the global AIDS epidemic. Directed, written and produced by Oscar nominee Robert Biheimer, and narrated by Glen Close and Will Smith, the film explores the intricate relationship between health, dignity and human rights. Also screening continuously will be an AIDS quilt multimedia retrospective, and a history of HIV/AIDS events over the last 25 years.

The Wall of Remembrance will be available for members of the community to reflect personally on the effects of HIV/AIDS on their own lives and those close to them. Similar to others walls, if participants bring pictures and artifacts to place on or near the Wall of Remembrance, they will not be returned. Combined with the Wall of Remembrance will be a photography exhibit highlighting the lives of members of the community affected by HIV/AIDS.

On Friday, December 1st the University of California, San Diego Medical Center will host a World AIDS Day Conference. The event will be from 7:30am until 4:00pm at the Medical Center's main auditorium. The conference will address a range of issues throughout the day, including the impact of AIDS in Africa and a review of HIV treatment: Past, Present and Future. The cost to attend is: UCSD Employees \$35.00, Students \$20.00 and general community members \$40.00, and includes course materials,

like RuPaul Charles, Clea DuVall, Natasha Lyonne, Melanie Lynskey and Cathy Moriarty.

During an embattled childhood and teenage years as a gender outlaw, Feinberg began a search for others struggling to assert an identity. What s/he found was a long tradition of individuals fighting back against injustice from Joan of Arc to the Welsh peasants who cross-dressed to protest taxes, from the Black and Latina drag queens who led the

### New Class Announcement for Winter 2007! COMT 175: Intergroup Dialogue Facilitator Training

Mondays, Winter 2007, 2pm - 4:50pm 4 units

This highly interactive course is designed to provide foundational skills and knowledge needed to facilitate multicultural group interactions, particularly intergroup dialogues. Topics include group facilitation skills; social identity and group development; systems of privilege and oppression; intergroup communication; conflict intervention; and community building techniques. Students who successfully complete COMT175 training may apply to serve as peer facilitators of intergroup dialogues at UCSD that address socioeconomic class, sexual orientation, race and ethnicity, gender, nationality, and other social identities.

Intergroup Dialogue facilitation requires an individual who exhibits the desire to teach, learn, and grow with others. The course will help you develop important life skills in communication, group dynamics, teamwork, facilitation, and other valuable areas. These skills are essential for leadership in a diverse democracy, especially for students preparing for careers in teaching, social work, community or organizational leadership, and other professions that require working with people in multicultural settings.



### Impure Science: AIDS, Activism, and the Politics of Knowledge by Steven Epstein



"In the short, turbulent history of AIDS research and treatment, the boundaries between scientist insiders and lay outsiders have been

crisscrossed to a degree never before seen in medical history. Steven Epstein's astute and readable investigation focuses on the critical question of "how certainty is constructed or deconstructed," leading us through the views of medical researchers, activists, policy makers, and others to discover how knowledge about AIDS emerges out of what he calls "credibility struggles."

Epstein shows the extent to which AIDS research has been a social and political phenomenon and how the AIDS movement has transformed biomedical research practices through its capacity to garner credibility by novel strategies. Epstein finds that nonscientist AIDS activists have gained enough of a voice in the scientific world to shape NIHsponsored research to a remarkable extent. Because of the blurring of roles and responsibilities, the production of biomedical knowledge about AIDS does not, he says, follow the pathways common to science; indeed, AIDS research can only be understood as a field that is unusually broad, public,







- There has been a notable increase in the amount of Faculty and Alumni that have frequented the Center.



# AIDS Quilt at UCSD in recognition of World AIDS Day

On Thursday, November 30<sup>th</sup> 2006, the University of California, San Diego will recognize World AIDS Day with a public viewing of the AIDS Memorial Quilt. The Quilt will be on display at the Price Center Ballroom on the UCSD campus from 7 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. For a map and directions to the Price Center Ballroom, please visit http://maps.ucsd.edu. The event is free and open to the public.

On display at UCSD will be three sections of the Quilt that have emerged from San Diego organizations and individuals as San Diegans responded to the AIDS crisis, both in the early years of the epidemic and through the present day. Each "block" (or section) of The AIDS Memorial Quilt measures approximately twelve feet square, and a typical block consists of eight individual three foot by six foot panels sewn together. Virtually every one of the more than 40,000 colorful panels that make up the entire Quilt memorializes the life of a person lost to AIDS.

Founded in 1987, the AIDS Memorial Quilt is a poignant memorial, a powerful tool for use in preventing new HIV infections, and the largest ongoing community arts project in the world. As the epidemic continues claiming lives around the world and here in the United States, the Quilt continues to grow and to reach more communities with its messages of remembrance, awareness and hope. Along with the AIDS Quilt, UCSD will sponsor a number of other events in recognition of World AIDS Day. A morning vigil will take place from 7 a.m. until 9 a.m. at the Price Center Ballroom open to anyone for private reflection and remembrance. Throughout the day at the Quilt display, more specific multi-media presentations will be ongoing. A photography exhibit "Living Proof: Courage in the face of AIDS" by Carolyn Jones will be on display, as well as a Wall of Remembrance for those to reflect on those who have been affected.

Red ribbons and condom "roses" will be handed out at UCSD's Library Walk throughout the day. A Path of Remembrance will be on the grounds near Library Walk documenting the 25 years of HIV/AIDS with 25 milestones for participants to traverse.

At 3 p.m. at the Price Center Ballroom, a dramatic telling of the impact of HIV/AIDS on people's lives will be performed. This powerful presentation will draw on the lived experiences of UCSD community members and their personal journeys within the pandemic.

The film "A Closer Walk" will be screened at the Price Center Ballroom continuously from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m. "A Closer Walk" is the first film to provide a definitive portrayal of humankind's confrontation with the global AIDS epidemic. Directed, written and produced by

Oscar nominee Robert Biheimer, and narrated by Glen Close and Will Smith, the film explores the intricate relationship between health, dignity and human rights. Also screening continuously will be an AIDS quilt multimedia retrospective, and a history of HIV/AIDS events over the last 25 years.

The Wall of Remembrance will be available for members of the community to reflect personally on the effects of HIV/AIDS on their own lives and those close to them. Similar to others walls, if participants bring pictures and artifacts to place on or near the Wall of Remembrance, they will not be returned. Combined with the Wall of Remembrance will be a photography exhibit highlighting the lives of members of the community affected by HIV/AIDS.

On Friday evening, the Chinese Language Film Society proudly presents *To Live is Better Than to Die* which chronicles one Chinese family's heartbreaking experience in an AIDS village where 30% of the community was infected selling blood. The screening will be at 6:00pm in the IR/PS Auditorium, Eleanor Roosevelt College. The film is about an hour.
